What really pleased me about the games against Carlisle and Bristol City was the way the players kept on trying to play attractive, attacking football.

I've said it before and I'll say it again—goals must come back into the game if we are to increase


A lot of the present day troubles in football stems around fear—fear that you might be sacked if your team loses. This leads to the more negative type of soccer.

## CLUBS TAKE TO THE AIR—AND THERE'LL BE MORE TO FOLLOW

Even some go-ahead Fourth Division clubs have now disposed with arduous coach travel and taken to the air.

"We tried an experiment last season when we flew to Workington" said Lincoln City secretary Dick Chester.

"We hired a 78-seater Viscount, took off from Castle Donnington, won the game 3-0 and we were back home in a total time of 13 hours. And we were able to take some supporters with us so we were very pleased."

Yet all this enthusiasm about air travel shouldn't obscure the fact that many clubs have been investigating the travel system now well established at Luton... travelling by private train, hired from British Rail.

## **Least Tiring**

"This suits us down to the ground," says Harry Haslam. "From the players' point of view, it is the least tiring form of travel. We eat when we like, we get off the train when we like."

"But one of the best aspects of hiring a train is that we are able to take 400 or so of our supporters with us, at a price which couldn't be matched travelling any other way."

What other clubs have not always been able to match however is the good behaviour of the Luton fans and the efficiency with which the whole operation is mounted—and supervised by club stewards—from beginning to end.

Not many clubs can afford to hire aircraft in the style of Liverpool, but even fewer clubs

can guarantee to take a train full of supporters to any ground in the country and be certain that when it is returned to British Rail sidings it will be in exactly the same condition as when it left.

Travel, whether he likes it or not, is very much part of the professional footballer's life. Sometimes it means slogging through five countries to play three matches as happened to the England Under-23 squad during their close season tour. Sometimes it means arriving home from Workington or Exeter at 3.30 am on Sunday morning, but which ever end of the soccer scale you are, it's all part of the game.

## £700 bill

Convenience, expense and speed are the governing factors. One first division club from the north rang up a bill of £700 going to play at Ipswich last season . . . including two nights in London hotels.

Needless to say, questions were asked! Liverpool, who are recognised as the aristocrats of many aspects of the game, fly to Ipswich, Norwich, Southampton and Newcastle, use train and coach for most of their matches and coach for the local ones.

"There's sure to be an increase in the number of clubs flying to games," says manager Harry Haslam.

"The problem at the moment is the number of airports available to take chartered aircraft. There aren't enough of them yet... which means that you sometimes have to do quite a bit of travelling at the other end."

## **Luxury Coach**

Ipswich use the local RAF Wattisham air base when they fly although most of their journeys are done by luxury coach.

Hull City manager Terry Neill is very enthusiastic about flying to games. "From where we are it is a great advantage. We usually hire two or three small aircraft from a local company. We can't carry large 'skips' or things like that but it is easy enough to travel light."

Hull have flown to Portsmouth, Bristol, Swindon, Cardiff—and regularly to Watford from where they can slip into London or to Luton easily enough.

Bobby, who has been playing League soccer for the last 12 years, has recently opened a sports shop in Wolverhampton and he tells us that many people come in asking for . . . Town's new strip.

Bobby, who was born in Smethwick, started his professional career at Wolves where he made 277 appearances. It was a glittering spell during which time he gained eight full England caps and made 15 appearances for the Under-23's.




