TWO goals in 15 minutes dashed the Hatters' hopes at Brisbane Road this afternoon.

Orient's Gerry Queen scored after 67 minutes. Then in the 82nd minute Barrie Fairbrother made sure of victory with a fine header.

Goal-hungry Orient, just two points behind Luton had been kept at bay by the Hatters — thanks to some fine work from substitute goalkeeper Keith Barber, standing in for the injured Graham Horn.

Making his debut for Luton was record-signing Alan West, who signed for £80,000 from Burnley on Thursday. He came into the side at No10 and young Peter Cruse was left out of the first 11 and given the job of substitute.

There was a late shock for Luton when goalkeeper Graham Horn had to drop out at the last minute. He explained just before the kick-off: "I hurt a shoulder late in the match at Grimsby and I failed a fitness test yesterday afternoon.

Keith Barber stepped in to take over the position he lost after the first match of the season.

Jimmy Ryan, who injured his neck against Swindon last week, returned. Gordon Hindson was left out.

Orient had new goalkeeper John Jackson from Crystal Palace in the side. He replaced old servant Ray Goddard.

With Luton and their London rivals pushing and jostling each other in the top places of the Second Division, a large crowd was expected for today's match.

But when the teams ran out there were still huge gaps on the terraces.

Then there was a fantastic incident. The Luton goal-mouth looked like a battlefield of hacking feet as Orient tried to force the ball over the line.

He made two tremendous saves at the feet of forwards and then palmed one effort on to the post before being awarded a free kick.

Some good football by Luton ended with a throw on the left which Garner hurled into the goalmouth. Butlin's first attempt to nod it on failed but he got a second bite and from his cross, West almost screwed the ball home.

Then Barber missed a rightwing corner which was fortunately headed behind for another flag kick by Faulkner.

Barber again did well for Luton after Bullock had turned quickly past John Ryan and banged in a first timer which the Town goalkeeper did well to get behind.

But he was finally beaten in a minute later by a fine low shot from Queen. One effort had been blocked and the ball found its way back to the former Palace man who hit it hard and low from the middle. hard and low from the middle of a crowd of players near the edge of the box.

Fairbrother clinched the victory for the Londoners eight minutes from the end when he headed in a fine cross from Waller.
