

VERDICT

This is what cup ties are all about. Underdogs Port Vale grabbed a second half goal and hung on to it as their biggest crowd of the season roared them on.

Luton were a bit unfortunate. They had a first half gale-driven deluge in their faces which the Midlanders used to the best of their ability.

In the first half the ball was rarely out of Luton's half and they were all too glad to go in all square at half time.

In fact the weather was so bad that referee Ken Burns admitted during the inter-val that he had almost abandoned the match.

But it went on and as Luton began to look a bit brighter, Port Vale won a series of corners and big centre-half Harris headed them ahead. In the 83rd minute Jimmy Ryan equalised for the Town to silence the home team chants.

It was one of Luton's best midfield moves, with the ball being pushed through and Ryan beating Boswell with a sharply angled shot.

What a relief it was for the Town who had brought on Tom Finney as second half substitute for Aston.

Luton were also without Don Shanks, who missed yesterday's team talk because of a dental visit and was dropped by Harry Haslam for disciplinary reasons.

JIMMY RYAN kept Luton's Cup hopes alive this afternoon with an equaliser just seven minutes from the final whistle. Fourth Division Port Vale went ahead early in the second half — and the Hatters waited until the 83rd minute for Ryan to save the day.

Centre-half David Harris put Port Vale ahead in the 59th minute with a fine header. Then, as Luton's hopes faded, John Ryan pushed

He brought John Ryan back to his old right-back position in favour of Shanks — whom I can only assume was injured. And No 8 and No 10 West and Husband, changed places.

Finney was named as substitute in place of John Ryan who has had to settle for the No 12 shirt in recent weeks.

When the Hatters ran out on to the huge Port Vale pitch everybody but Husband was wearing a track suit top. Perhaps the striker wanted to show off his new number.

Then a long clearance by Port Vale sent centre-forward Williams racing through. The ball bounced awkwardly for him and Faulkner did a good job in diving across in front of him to enable Horn to get to the ball. the ball.

A free kick which followed a foul by Anderson was headed low at goal by Summerscales. Horn looked a bit fumbly, but he collected the ball at the second attempt.

John Aston's first left wing run came in the ninth minute. He got in the cross but a defender headed away for a corner. Jim Ryan took it, but it was headed clear.

Then Aston's legs were taken from under him by Brodie. Thomson hit the free kick which was headed on by Butlin and Anderson got in with a header. It went straight at the goal-keeper who gathered easily.

Then a high ball had the Hatters' in a rare old mess. Horn got under it, but his attempted fist out was unsuccessful and there was a lot of hacking about before the ball was cleared.

Brodie went down with a leg injury, but he continued after treatment although he was limping badly.

Williams made another good dash but was tripped by

This was underlined in the 35th minute when a short goal-kick by Horn was kicked out of play for a corner by John Ryan. The flag kick was headed behind — much to Ryan's relief.

Luton's attack became non-

existent, but at the other end, Mountford, with the wind behind him, headed a right-wing cross wide.

The heavy rain eased off in the second half and the skies lightened.

Port Vale still had plenty of attacking ideas and after a rather slow build up Lacey thumped a left-footer wide.

Finney was full of en-thusiasm and the referee had to have a word with him after he had tripped Williams. From the free-kick a misplaced shot by Horn went out to the right and Horn again had to leave his charge to kick into touch.

From a right wing corner Horn made the save of the match in the 58th minute. The ball was headed on to Mountford who dived at it to head at goal. Somehow Horn got his left hand to the ball to push it past the post.

But Luton's luck did not last. A minute later Port Vale won another corner from the right and big centre half darris charged in to head low past Horn. John Ryan tried to clear the ball, but he could only help the ball over the

A good tackle by John Ryan prevented Woodward centering after a left wing run. From the throw the same Luton defender was only too glad to thump the ball over the stand to relieve the pressure.

Luton came closest to scoring in the 70th minute. A tremendous dribble by Anderson, with the help of Husband, ended with Anderson breaking through and shooting — only to see Boswell pull of a cracking save and turning the ball round for a corner.

Following the corner, Luton really put on the pressure with three headers and a shot being saved by the plucky Port Vale keeper.

After Faulkner had missed his tackle on the tearaway Woodward, the Port Vale man somehow managed to trip himself as he entered the box. But he got the free kick which was hit high and wide of the

With Brodie off the field for further treatment, Luton nearly equalised.

Jimmy Ryan's corner was cleared and West chased back to try a surprise shot from the far corner of the box. He hit

the crossbar. Then Brodie called it a day and was substituted in the 76th minute by Tartt.

It looked all over for Luton until Jimmy Ryan equalised. In fact there were just seven minutes left when John Ryan pushed the ball through for his namesake who glided it cleverly past Boswell.

Port Vale can consider themselves a bit unlucky because their enthusiasm drove them forward for the biggest part of the match.
