

COTTAGE COMMENT

Three successive wins, against Sheffield Wednesday, Notts County and Preston, have helped to consolidate our mid-table position and those optimists amongst us have started to talk about an outside chance of promotion.

We will do nothing to discourage optimism but we would frown on getting too excited until we string a few more wins together. Certainly the situation is wide open and we notice that Barry Davies on Match of the Day the other Saturday said that someone like Fulham could still make a late run. Jimmy Hill denies he was holding a gun on him at the time.

Naturally we think we are good enough to make that magic late run. Our performances this season, particularly against First Division opposition, have been very encouraging and with a little more consistency and a little less injury we would be much better placed.

Perhaps consistency is with us, for our 1-0 win at Preston was achieved on a very poor pitch and against opposition trying desperately to find form. These are the sort of circumstances which demand discipline and self-motivation and, happily, we had enough of both to deserve the win. Alan Slough scored our goal with a lovely diving header after John Lacy had headed on a corner. It has been this sort of match which has been our undoing on many occasions and to have come through it well speaks highly of our consistency.

We will soon find out if it can last. Tonight's game with Luton is the first of a batch of fixtures against promotion contenders. Luton have an excellent chance of going up and before last Saturday were lying second. Their visit is quite a reunion. Not only is it Alec Stock's former club but it is now managed by Harry Haslam who worked with us a few years ago.

On Saturday we play Carlisle here and the Northern club are well in touch with the leaders, too. Then we

play at Sunderland who are in a similar position to us, and on Tuesday 19 March we entertain the League leaders Middlesbrough.

We are proud to be the only side to beat Middlesbrough at Ayresome Park this season — so we are on the "double", which would be quite an achievement.

After that we face Nottingham Forest, Bristol City and West Brom, three sides who have hit the headlines in 1974 and cannot be ruled out of the promotion race.

So you can see that if our winning run can be extended over the next month or so we will be not only improving our position but knocking off points from teams above us.

It is a tall order but if we are good enough we have ample chance to prove it against the best teams in the Division. Whatever happens, there is certainly plenty of life left in the season thanks to the extra incentive of the three-up, three-down system of relegation and promotion.

Speaking of relegation — we are also going to have a say in that. We play Crystal Palace, twice, Portsmouth and Swindon during April. The Palace matches come at Easter and should be very interesting, especially in view of their recent revival.

Incidentally we play Palace here on Good Friday morning (kick-off 11.15 am) and the return game is on the evening of Easter Tuesday at Selhurst Park.

Belated congratulations to John Dowie who went to Belgium last week with the Scottish Youth Squad to play in the UEFA Youth tournament. John was chosen for a previous trip to the Canary Islands but unfortunately we were forced to ask for his withdrawal because we needed him for first team duty.

Welcome to first team football to another bright Fulham youngster — Barry Friend a winger recently signed from Leatherhead who made his début as substitute for Jimmy Conway at Preston. Barry is on his second period with the club and it looks as if he is here to stay this time!

LUTON TOWN: BUSY RECLAIMING LOST TERRITORY

Within six years of appearing in the 1959 FA Cup final, Luton Town had fallen all the way to the Fourth Division. In some seven weeks time they could conceivably have regained all their lost territory.

The 'Hatters' started back by winning the Fourth Division Championship in 1968 and two years later they had climbed again.

Back in the Second Division once more it seemed logical that before long Luton would win further promotion to give a new interpretation of the old saying that what goes down must, ultimately, go back up.

Two more points from their last match, at home to Crystal Palace, lengthened a run of Luton success which has brought no more than two defeats from their last 17 League matches. It is that sort of consistency which has pushed the club high into the top four in the Division.

Yet the season could scarcely have begun for Luton on a more sour note. Beaten 4-0 by Nottingham Forest at the City Ground on the opening day last August, they promptly turned round to collect 13 goals in their next four matches and really there hasn't been any looking back since then.

The goals were being shared around with a famous name getting quite a number of them. Tom Finney, an Irish lad who had been signed from the Belfast club Crusaders, scored twice in his League début and then proceeded to score once in each of the next three games although he was subsequently unable to hold a regular place in the side.

That is anything but a disgrace when it is considered that Luton have such effective strikers as Barry Butlin, signed from Derby the previous season, a winger of the quality of ex-Manchester Utd. star John Aston and a highly productive midfield artist in Peter Anderson.

Nor have Luton been afraid to step boldly into the transfer market to strengthen their team. Having received £70,000 for the sale of Viv Busby and Alan Slough to Fulham, they stepped in and spent a club record £100,000 on Alan West of Burnley.

Under the management of Happy' Harry Haslam, well-known here at the Cottage where he used to be Fulham's chief scout, Luton have reshaped their side for a strong promotion challenge in spite of selling such established stars as Malcolm Macdonald, to Newcastle for £180,000 and Chris Nicholl, to Aston Villa for £90,000.

With six home fixtures to play and seven away from home, the club knows it must average more than a point a game to reach the First Division. Whatever happens at least one of the current top four is going to lose out.

As far as Luton are concerned it's going to be Blackpool or Orient. Significantly the East End club are the next visitors to Kenilworth Road, to be followed immediately afterwards by the leaders, Middlesbrough. It will be a desperately close finish but Luton believe they, for one, are going to get there.

LUTON TOWN MAN FOR MAN

GRAHAM HORN: Goalkeeper. Born: London. Previous clubs: Arsenal, Portsmouth.

One of the best young 'keepers in the game. Starred for Arsenal in the 1971 FA Youth Cup final, joining Luton after a spell on loan at Fratton Park. Made his Luton début last season and has since displaced Keith Barber in goal. JOHN RYAN: Full back. Born:

London. Previous club: Fulham. Played 41 times in League matches for Fulham before transferring to Kenilworth Road the season before Luton's promotion from the Third Division. Now nearing the 200-match milestone for his present club.

DON SHANKS: Full back. Born: White City. Previous club: Fulham.

An apprentice with Fulham he made his League début with Luton three seasons ago. A member of the England Youth team which won the 'Little World Cup' in 1971 he made 22 League appearances last season and during the present campaign has figured in different defensive positions.

JOHN FAULKNER: Centre half. Born: Orpington. Previous clubs: Sutton, Leeds Utd.

Leeds signed him after an impressive display against the Yorkshire club during an FA Cup tie for the Sutton amateurs. Injury restricted him to two League matches with the Elland Road side and he returned south early last season. Now established as a powerful successor to Chris Nicholl, sold to Aston Villa.

ALAN GARNER: Defender. Born: Lambeth. Previous club: Millwall.

Plays alongside Faulkner in the middle of the back four. Like Faulkner, he is a six-footer, finding a much more regular billing with Luton than with Millwall for whom he made only two League appearances.

PETER ANDERSON: Midfield. Born: Hendon. Previous club: None.

One of the highest scoring midfield players in the game. Only scored once last season in 34 matches but this season he has already scored nine times in matches. He has also created his share of chances from which others have scored goals.

ALAN WEST: Midfield. Born: Hyde. Previous club: Burnley.

An England Under-23 international in 1972, he sprang to notice in Burnley's first team while still a teenager. Did not appear at all in their Second Division championship win last season but hopes to be meeting up with his old team-mates in the First Division next term.

JIMMY RYAN: Midfield. Born: Stirling. Previous club: Manchester United.

Originally a winger whose more accustomed role nowadays is in midfield. Like Anderson he's been scoring quite a high ratio of goals, four in recent matches. Two of those goals were late penalties against Nottingham Forest and Aston Villa.

BARRY BUTLIN: Striker. Born: Roslington. Previous clubs: Notts County, Derby County.

A £50,000 signing from Derby last season he scored in his début, against Q.P.R. Eight more goals to date this season, his total would have been higher had it not been for a run of injuries which included a broken jaw. Good in the air and pretty useful on the ground

JOHN ASTON: Winger. Born: Manchester. Previous club: Manchester United.

The son of a famous former United player, Aston junior shared in the 1969 European Cup triumph over Benfica at Wembley. Made almost 150 League appearances for United before leaving on £35,000 transfer for his Luton baptism in August 1972. One of the best wingers in the Division.

Thomson aims to be back at the top

Bobby Thomson is living proof that veteran full backs never fade away. Next season, he could be back in the First Division . . . two years after Birmingham City decided he was suitable for a free transfer.

Luton decided they could do with his experience and the old England defender rewarded them with a season's work by never missing a match. Today he is going as strong as ever, enjoying something of an Indian summer in a distinguished career stretching back over 400 League matches.

If Thomson and Luton make it back to the First Division then their stylish left back will be back almost where he started 13 years ago. That was with Wolves at a time when Molineux offered a galaxy of big names, like Peter Broadbent, Ron Flowers, Bert Slater and Peter McParland.

Within three years of his Wolves début, Thomson was an England international, collecting eight caps during 1964 and 1965 in the early teams under Sir Alf

Ramsey's management.

Wolves transferred him to nearby Birmingham in 1969 and after no more than 62 League matches for the Blues, Thomson found himself among those listed for free transfer. Just when his career looked like taking a turn for the worse, Luton came along and gave him the challenge of helping prepare the Hatters for another promotion fling.

For the first time, Bobby joined a club beyond his native Black Country. If Luton considered they were taking a gamble, and such a thought was distinctly unlikely, then Thomson stands as stunning testimony to the fact that there are bargains to be found without a transfer fee changing hands.

FULHAM FORM GUIDE

Back again to try and beat that Cottage Jinx

It took Luton Town 42 years and fourteen visits to win a League match at Craven Cottage for the first time. And, as if anxious to make up for lost time, they have two of their last three matches here

1-0 in the Third Division in 1970 and by a Jimmy Ryan goal to nothing twelve months ago.

The results indicate that it's time the Indian sign began to work again, just as it did between 1928 and 1970.

In six pre-war League appearances at the Cottage, Luton collected nothing more than a solitary point. After League football restarted in 1946 at the end of hostilities, it was merely a matter of Fulham continuing where they had left off.

Just as Luton had lost all but one of their six pre-war matches, so they lost on six of the first seven postwar visits.

Ronnie Rooke and Ernie Shepherd made sure the trend of Fulham domination continued by scoring the goals in a 2-1 win on September 7, 1946 when both clubs were in the Second Division. The following season Luton managed one of their rare draws but in April 1949 they lost 4-1 to goals from Rowley (2), Stevens and Thomas.

Bobby Robson scored both in a 2-0 win on September 6, 1952, Johnny Haynes rattled a hat-trick in February 1954 and later that same year two goals by Stevens and another from Robson explained yet another Luton defeat.

After a five-year gap, fixtures were resumed and the only post-war First Division meeting between the clubs at the Cottage brought a resounding 4-2 Fulham victory. The date — September 12, 1959. The scorers — Leggat (2), Docherty and Hill.

Finally Luton renewed their faith in the law of averages, winning the first Third Division match between the clubs since the Third Division (South) era of the early Thirties.

In January 1972, it was back to the predictable home win. George Johnston, who had joined us from Birmingham, scored twice, Les Barrett once, only for Luton to return for their second win from 16 matches.

Today they come back pushing hard for promotion to the First Division, eager to offset the loss of a

It took Luton Town 42 years and fourteen visits home point on Boxing Day when John Conway scored in a 1-1 draw.

Strange as it may sound, that was only the third draw in 33 League matches between the clubs. There hasn't been a Fulham-Luton draw at the Cottage for more than 25 years, since March 29, 1948 to be precise.

So that could leave you all wondering whether today will bring another of those rare draws. If it happens then at least you will have been given a little advance notice





Alan Mullery writes

We've been approaching tonight's game against Luton as if it were a Cup final. Not that we don't take every game seriously, but Luton are someone special — they are strong promotion candidates and we want badly to measure up to a team like them.

Our three wins in a row, in fact the last five games, have seen us play as well as we have at any time this season. The promotion race looks a long way off but we play most of the top teams during the next month or so and if we can pick up points, we may find ourselves poised to make a late challenge.

I know it is easy for players to dream in this way and we can be guilty of building up false hopes. That's why we need this match against Luton, a victory against them will make it less than a dream and more of a reality.

Even then we will have a long, hard job on our hands, but our objective will be that much clearer and our confidence that much stronger.

Although our match at Preston was not a hum-dinger, I thought that it was a valuable exercise because we did what we had to do. The pitch was in a very bad condition, definitely the worst we have played on all season. So we decided that we had to play it tight at the back. We did this so efficiently, that Peter Mellor had scarcely anything to do. At half time I said we only needed 1 goal and that's how it turned out.

Preston really have no excuses because our goal was a carbon-copy of the one we scored against them in the FA Cup. A Les Barrett

corner, a flick-on at the near post by John Lacy and Alan Slough scored with a diving header. It is one of the set piece drills we work on in training and it is always a thrill when that work is rewarded.

Alan Slough's goal and the form of Viv Busby has drawn attention to the remarkable transfer deal brought off by Alec Stock when he brought these 2 from Luton for £70,000. I think their old club will be amazed tonight to see how quickly they have become valuable and integral members of the team.

Alec said of Alan Slough when he first came, that his best position was playing alongside the centre half. As it happened we had greater need of a left back. He started off the season there and was as good a left-back as there is. Then we had trouble in midfield with injury and Alan moved there, where he did just as good a job as he had done at left-back. He really does look a good player, has a good knowledge of the game and besides his versatility is so consistent that even when he has a poor game he is still a good player to have around.

Viv Busby was not the immediate success because I think he lacks Alan's confidence but in the last six matches he has really come good and you can see the confidence growing in him every match. At Preston he put in one great dribble which took him past three players in 40 yards but although he beat the goalkeeper, one of the defenders got back to stop his shot on the line.

Preston was also the scene for the introduction of yet another Fulham youngster. Barry Friend is in his second spell with Fulham, having been with amateurs Leatherhead for the past 2 years. So the Preston game was his very first taste of top professional football and when he came on when Jimmy Conway was injured you could see how intent he was on making an impact.

Barry is not very big, above 5'5" and 9 st., but his heart is like a lion and he is a very confident player. You might say he is inclined to be a little flash but I like that in a forward. They need confidence to take the sort of responsibility required and I shall encourage this confidence he has in himself. The Preston pitch was the wrong sort of pitch to run with the ball, the defender had a great advantage because of the difficulty of controlling the ball. But Barry wanted to have a go at the full back immediately. It was a very gutsy performance and Barry is another lad you will be hearing of.

Come to think of it, if we win tonight you will be hearing a lot more about all of us.


YOUR ROUTE TO SUNDERLAND

Approximately 274 miles from Fulham Compiled by the Royal Automobile Club

Leave by Westway and Western Avenue to the junction with the North Circular. Turn right and follow the North Circular to Brent Cross Flyover. Filter left and follow the signs to the start of the M.1. Proceed by the M.1 northward to the junction with the M.18 and follow the M.18 to the intersection with the Doncaster By-Pass — A.1(M). Continue by the A.1(M) then the A.1 to Darlington By-Pass - A.1(M) and follow to the junction with the A.690. Continue ahead via Vine Place and follow the one-way system to Crowtree Road. Proceed to the roundabout and take the second exit -St. Mary's Way. Continue ahead to the junction with Bridge Street and turn left. Proceed ahead by North Bridge Street to the roundabout and take the third exit Roker Avenue. Continue to the crossroads Fulwell Road and Church Street North - and turn left


onto Fulwell Road. Take the third on the right - Roker Baths Road — and the ground is on the left.

Steve and Jimmy: the full goal facts

Judging from our postbag in the last few weeks there's been quite an argument as to precisely how many goals Steve Earle scored for Fulham and exactly how many Jimmy Conway has scored for the club.

We've been accused, in the nicest possible way, of selling Steve short by three goals and robbing Jimmy of one, having stated, right at the start of the season, that Earle had accumulated 104 first team goals in competitive games and Conway 60.

Ronald Barlow wrote to us from 62 St. Mary's Tower, Fortune Street, E.C.1 saying: 'Earle's total at the start of this season should have been 107 and Conway's 61."

Well, priding ourselves in the accuracy of our facts, that set us about a painstaking check through the official club records right back to season 1963-64 in Earle's case and back to 1966-67 to track Conway's scoring record for the club.

And while we don't for one minute want to sound a trifle smug, we can safely say that the figures stated at the start of the season in the matchday magazine for the Orient programme were 100 per cent accurate.

Earle had scored 104 goals with three more before his transfer to Leicester giving him a career aggregate of 107, composed of 97 League and 10 League Cup. Conway's goals against Notts County here a fortnight ago lifted his total to 62, 56 League, five League Cup and one F.A. Cup.

Here, for the benefit of Ron Barlow and others, is the complete breakdown:

While we're on the subject of Steve Earle and his Fulham goals, it's an opportunity to put the record straight on the number of hat-tricks he scored for us in League matches.

The total of three, as stated in our hat-tricks feature for the Notts County matchday magazine, is correct. However, as reader Tony Rogers of 21, Eastfields Road, Mitcham points out Earle did not score one of the three against Orient, as stated.

He did in fact score it at Stockport in a Third Division game on September 27, 1969 before a crowd of 4,231. The mistake arose because during an interview with Earle he himself said he had scored a hat-trick against Orient. It only goes to show that the memory can play tricks . . . even on hat-tricks!
