I am writing this before we go to Coventry on Tuesday in order to meet the printer's deadline, but at the time of putting pen to paper I look at our results, and see that we have drawn three out of four away games.

An average of a point a game away from home is supposed to be promotion form. And look where we've been—West Ham, Middlesbrough, Leeds and Arsenal. Yet there we are, down at the bottom of the table.

Then I think of the two matches we've lost at home—to Ipswich and Liverpool. And look where they are, right at the top of the First Division. In spite of our position, I am convinced that our results so far indicate that we will pull out of the mire. Okay, we might come out of it with muddy boots, but we'll escape.

The more I think of it the more convinced I am. After the match at Arsenal last week they were moaning about how badly they had played. I wasn't having any of that. I told them straight—that they had only played as well as we'd let them. The lads will never get any credit if they are told the other team played badly every time they win a point. I thought they gave a good all-round performance and fully deserved what they got out of it.

Talking about Arsenal I would like to congratulate our own supporters for the encouragement they gave the lads. I thought we had more followers at Highbury than Arsenal had. The fans got behind us down there just as they have been doing at home matches recently. It doesn't half make a difference to the team.

The luck still seems to be running against us. In the first half at Arsenal Adrian Alston hit the inside of a post and

the ball rolled along the line. Another quarter of an inch and we'd have gone ahead.

Then they come along with that free kick just before half time. It clipped the heel of Barry Butlin and was deflected past Keith Barber in goal. I'm not moaning, because I know it will change, but everything the team has accomplished this season is from pure endeavour. There has been nothing at all in the way of help from a bit of luck.

Think about it. We haven't had any semblance of a penalty, though several of the lads have been hooked up in the box. It galls me a bit—as it does to keep having to say the same thing. I'm just waiting for the day it changes, that's all.

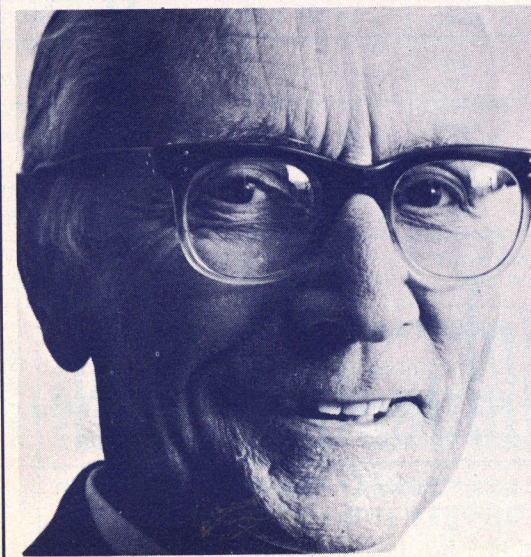
I am looking forward to today's match against Carlisle, who came up with us from the Second Division. We whacked six past them at Luton last year, but they beat us up there. That's the way it goes. One thing I am sure about is that today we are going to get a good, hard and honest game. They have had a good start to the season. We haven't. It will be interesting to see which of us has improved the most since last season.

The players are dying for that first win, just as we all are. They are doing everything they think is right for the club. There is not a self-centred one among them. They are trying like blazes to put together a couple of victories and pull us away from the bottom.

In the last home match against Ipswich the crowd were calling for me to send the substitute on.

It's something I'm not keen on doing unless there's an injury or if a player is tiring or struggling. At one point in that game Ipswich were so well on top that I could have pulled any of about six players off. There was no point in that. There's a right time and a wrong time for substitutions. That was not the right time.

I just hope we can serve up that win for the fans today. They've deserved it for their patience and support.

FACE TO FACE

You are usually referred to as an ex-Manchester United player. What are your thoughts on the time you spent at Old Trafford?

Looking back, they were good times. It was a vastly different world from the one I had come from as a kid in Scotland. I suppose you are more likely to remember the good times but, in retrospect, I probably stayed there too long. I was at United for eight years, four of them on the fringe of the first-team, getting a few games, but I probably should have moved earlier to get extra experience. I would say that I had been very lucky because during the time I was in the first-team pool, United were at a peak in European football competitions and I travelled everywhere with them. I also went to Australia, America and South America with United, so I have plenty to look back on. I had a chance of going to Bristol City, as Wilf McGuinness took over and made it clear that I didn't figure in his plans, but I didn't fancy that particular offer.

Jimmy, how many of the present Manchester United staff were there in your days?

Not too many. In my days at Old Trafford, there was very little turnover of staff; the occasional transfer, but few senior players left, just some of the young lads moved on. Over the last couple of years, though, things have changed a lot. I know Alex Stepney, Pat Crerand, Willie Morgan and Sammy McLroy, who was a kid when I was there. I joined United at about the same time as George Best, John Fitzpatrick and John Aston and we grew up together coming through the A and B teams. Originally, I was an inside-forward, but I was a bit frail and began to play more on the wing. George Best was at outside-left and I remember it was something of a surprise when he made his debut for the first-team. I think he had played with us in the A team a week before at Burnley. Although he was even smaller than me, I think it was a master stroke to play him, and George has never looked back.

Just recently at Luton you have been playing a deeper role. How does that suit you?

I have always liked getting more involved and going into midfield gives you that chance. I played this role last season and enjoyed it enormously. Stamina is not a problem for me. I know I am not too heavily built but I have always been pretty good at Cross Country and stamina work. Against Arsenal last week I played mostly wide but I dropped back to help out quite a lot.

Jimmy, how did you receive the injury which delayed the start of your season?

I played in the pre-season games and was receiving treatment on my ankle because I had a few twinges and it stiffened up after games. Then, on the Thursday before the opening match against Liverpool, we had a practice game and the ankle was really bad. The doctor immediately ordered a fortnight's rest which put me right back. I have had three games in the reserves and have been substitute for the first-team on three occasions. Against Arsenal on Saturday, it was like playing the first game of the season for me. I was very nervous going out and I was quite tired at the end. Mind you, I think a few were!

You have tasted First Division football before, of course, Are there many differences now from when you first played?

No, I don't think so. The biggest difference is that in the First Division there are good players in every position. In the Second Division you come across two or three really good players in most sides, but perhaps there might have been one or two meagre ones tucked away. In the First Division you very rarely find a weak link.

In what areas do you think Luton must improve in order to secure their First Division status?

We have got to score more goals. We are not getting enough at the moment, but we are creating chances which is the important thing. Even against Leeds United we could have had a couple and there are not many sides who will be able to say that after going to Elland Road. However, shortage of goals is pretty common at the moment amongst most clubs.

Your favourite hobby is that of dog breeding. How did you become interested in this?

When I was in Manchester, I used to go to weight training in the evenings with a friend of mine to try and build myself up. He had some of these strange little dogs that I got to like. My wife and I had always wanted a dog and we settled for one of these Staffordshire Bull Terriers. Since then interest has grown, and I joined the Staffordshire Bull Terrier Club and have entered a couple of shows. At the moment, I have two bitches and a puppy in Manchester. It is something I don't mind developing, but only as a hobby. I don't think there is a living to be made out of it. I like the Staffordshire Bull Terrier very much. Its background is that of a fighting dog, but it is a very happy animal with humans and is a great family dog. Really, they are big, lazy things, but it is their fighting qualities that are important; the grip of the jaw, the power in the neck and legs. I am quite keen on all dogs, except perhaps Alsatis—I don't think I really trust them.



INTRODUCING CARLISLE UNITED



Just cast your minds back to October 1964 when Carlisle came here to Kenilworth Road and drew 1-1 with Luton in a Third Division match. Quite honestly those of you who were present that evening wouldn't have given a sausage for the chances of those two clubs fighting it out for a couple of Division One points in 1974-75... would you?

The odds, in fact, must have been around 250-1 against, if not more, but as we all know, it happened, and unfashionable Carlisle United from up there in Cumberland—only a few miles from the Scottish border—are in Bedfordshire this afternoon playing in football's toughest and most competitive League, having gained promotion last season along with ourselves and Middlesbrough.

Carlisle's manager, Alan Ashman, one time chicken farmer in Penrith, returned to Brunton Park in 1972 after a successful spell with West Bromwich Albion, which saw the Black Country 'Throstles' win the FA Cup (1968) and reach the Final of the League Cup (1970), and since then he has guided the 'Cumbrians' to a great honour—a place in soccer's premium division.

The league table shows us that they're finding the going tough of late—but the main objective of the team is to hold onto it's place in this section, to get a suitable side together, and build for future success. Their policy of blending experience with youth has undoubtedly paid off. On the 'veteran' side they have an ex-Luton player, goalkeeper Alan Ross, who has over 400 appearances in his 12 years with the club.

There is Leicestershire Cricketer, Chris Balderstone, another 400 game-man, who is now in his tenth season with Carlisle. They have strikers, Hugh McIlmoyle, Leicester City's centre-forward in the 1961 FA Cup Final and a man who has served Rotherham, Wolves, Middlesbrough and Morton on his many travels, and Derek Clarke, leading scorer for his club last term with 16 goals and brother of Leeds United's Allan.

The more younger men in their ranks include Scottish full-back, John Gorman, voted 'Player of the Year' last winter, mid-field dynamos Les O'Neill and ex-Walsall starlet, Ray Train, while up front they utilise the former Middlesbrough player Joey Laidlaw, one-time Manchester City forward Bobby Owen and big Denis Martin, a signing from Albion.

Recently they've aquired the skills of defender Bobby Parker from Coventry to accompany skipper Bill Green in the back four department, and this has surely bolstered their defensive system. So basically Carlisle have the ideal set-up. Can they make an impact on the top division? Only time will tell, of course.

A BRIEF HISTORY...

Carlisle United was formed in 1904 when two junior teams, Shaddongate United and Carlisle Red Rose amalgamated.

Twelve months later, playing home games at Milholme Bank, they entered the lower division of

the Lancashire Combination, and won promotion in their initial season.

In 1907-08, with new headquarters at Devonshire Park, Carlisle put an almighty 'feather in their cap' by beating Brentford in the FA Cup, yet for sometime afterwards they lingered in the North Eastern League and had to travel considerable distances to away matches.

They moved to Brunton Park in 1910, bought the ground for £2,000 in the early 1920's, and applied, through public interest, for membership of the Football League in 1926. They were unlucky first time, obtaining only 12 votes. But in 1928 they were elected to Division 3 (North) in place of Durham City.

Up until the start of this current season, Carlisle's full League record looked like this:

Apart from promotion in 1973-74, Carlisle have won Division Three (1964-65;) were runners-up in Division Four (1963-64) and gained a Second

Division place when finishing fourth in Division Three in 1961-62.

Their best run in the FA Cup came in season 1963-64 when they went out in Round 5. And in the League Cup their greatest challenge came in 1969-70 when they lost in a two-legged semi-final to West Bromwich Albion by 4-2.

Previous managers of the club include Bob Stokoe, now of Sunderland fame, Tim Ward, the ex-Derby County full-back, internationals Ivor Powell (Wales) and Ivor Broadis (England), and the legendary Bill Shankly.

Carlisle's record victory is 8-0: v Hartlepool United (Division 3 North) 1928, and v Scunthorpe, (Division 3 North) 1952.

Their heaviest defeat is 1-11, at Hull City (Division 3 North) 1939.

Jim McConnell, with 42 Division 3 (N) goals in 1928-29, and who hit a grand total of 126 League goals between 1928 and 1932, has been the club's champion goalgetter.

Ron Thompson has made the most appearances for the 'Cumbrians'—376—while Eric Welsh, with four Irish caps, has been their main internationalist.

Brunton Park can today take in 26,000 fans—just below the record figure of 26,445, set up against Birmingham City in the FA Cup of 1956-57. The record receipts are £10,609—versus Arsenal, FA Cup, 1972-73.

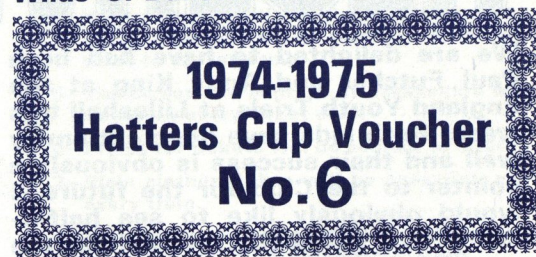

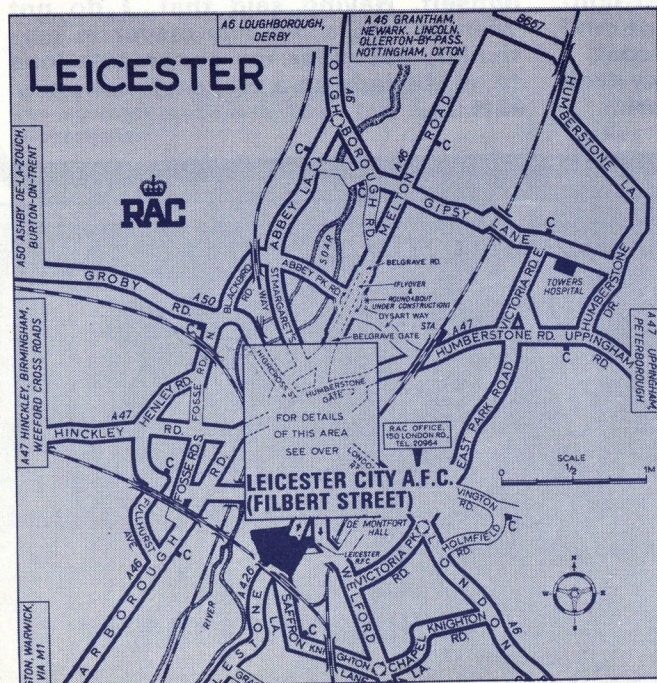

LEICESTER CITY v LUTON TOWN

Saturday, 5th October, 1974

Luton (the junction of George Street and Chapel Street) leave by the Dunstable Road towards the M1. Follow signs Birmingham M1. Continue north on the motorway until intersection No. 21 (A46) Leicester. Follow signs Leicester A46. After 3½ miles continue along Narborough Road until the junction of Rutland Street and Charles Street. Leicester City Football ground is situated on the right hand side of the road.
