□ **HAVING** made the long descent from Division I to Division IV in the space of eight years and then climbed back again in just six years, **LUTON TOWN** are currently finding the going hard and with only two points and two goals to show for all the efforts they have made in their last eight games, it will take all the psychology and tactical expertise that manager **HARRY HASLAM** can muster to lift them clear of their present parlous position.

Though they have won only one game to date (a 3-1 win against Carlisle at the end of September) they have given some of their best performances away from home, drawing at both Middlesbrough and Leeds and rallying well to take a point after being twice behind at Highbury.

Despite their current lowly position, there is certainly no shortage of personalities in the Luton side. Skipper **BOBBY THOMSON** who, in his Wolves days, won eight full England caps and made 15 Under-23 appearances, ultimately moved on to join his old boss Stan Cullis at Birmingham, but was released on a free transfer by Stan's successor Freddie Goodwin in 1972. Since joining Luton he has proved to be one of the finest free-transfer bargains ever, playing in every game last season as he led his new club to promotion. He should be making his 450th League appearance during the next month.

Bobby normally plays on the left flank of the defence with **DON SHANKS**, a Youth international formerly with Fulham, on the opposite side and either **JOHN FAULKNER** (signed by Leeds from Sutton after their F.A. Cup-tie there four years ago, and moving to Luton in 1972) or **STEVE LITT**, a former Blackpool junior who made his League debut in January, in the centre and versatile **JOHN RYAN**, another former Fulham man with over 200 League games to his credit, currently acting as sweeper.

Behind them, **KEITH BARBER**, a former Dunstable player, has this season won his place back from **GRAHAM HORN**, the former Arsenal Youth international goalkeeper who cost £25,000 two years ago after a long spell on loan to Portsmouth. In midfield, **BRIAN CHAMBERS** is another former Arsenal player who arrived at Highbury from Sunderland, but moved to Kenilworth Road

this season after only one first team game at Highbury. He has been linking up recently with **ALAN WEST**, last season's six-figure capture from Burnley with **GORDON HINDSON**, signed from Newcastle in 1971, filling the flexible midfield-cum-forward role.

When it comes to goalscoring, **ADRIAN ALSTON**, the dramatic signing from Australia's World Cup side, and **JOHN ASTON**, now in his second season after giving great service to Manchester United, are the men most frequently on the mark this season—though one can't under-rate the challenge of **JIMMY RYAN**. For several years he was Denis Law's deputy at Old Trafford and is now in his fourth year at Luton.

That wily campaigner **JIMMY HUSBAND**, who cost some £80,000 in November 1973, after being a member of Everton's 1969-70 championship side, is another man to watch.

□ **GEORGE JACKSON** and **ALAN BLOOR** have a lot in common these days — dodgy knees. And "Bluto" has just been heartened by a specialist's report that his anticipated ligament trouble is, in fact a damaged cartilage.

Jackson saw a specialist this week to determine the nature of his left knee that was damaged in a reserve game at Derby in September. At the time Jackson, who had a major ligament operation in Cape Town last year, thought he had just strained the ligaments, but he has not played since despite his daily muscle strengthening exercises.

Bloor is hoping now that a cartilage operation will finally clear up the trouble that has been with him since the beginning of August after twisting sharply in Belgium.

It got to the stage where he feared he might not

play again, but now he can see some light on the horizon with hopes of getting back into full training around the turn of the year.

● **Stoke's other major casualty — JOHN RITCHIE** — is getting about cheerfully these days, having had a heel inserted to help his mobility and he is hoping to have the plaster off his left leg by Christmas.

The first thing he will do is to have a bath. "I can't have a proper one with all this plaster," he says. Big John is eagerly waiting for the moment when he can resume training and accept the stiff challenge next year. But he is so determined to win his battle that he already comes in the Victoria Ground twice weekly for stomach and leg muscle exercises.

Ritchie never knew he had so many friends in the Potteries after having hundreds of cards, telegrams and good will messages.

● *Lanky teenage striker IAN MOORES had a surprise when he turned up at the Victoria Ground this week for training to find he was in the first-team squad at Ipswich. He had an even bigger one when he found himself on the team sheet just before the League Cup-tie.*

Ian made his League debut at Leicester in April and did well enough to remain on the fringe of the senior side. Five goals in the Central League this season, including his winning goal against Manchester City Reserves last Saturday earned him promotion again.

● It was promotion again, too, for the seasoned pair of **GEORGE EASTHAM** and **GORDON BANKS** who are in charge of the England Under-23's again in Lisbon next week — along with **ALAN DODD**, who takes everything in his stride these days.

● *Stoke's five-a-side appearance in the National Championships at Wembley's Empire Pool last week was brief. After a goalless draw with Middlesbrough in the first round, the penalty play-off saw ALAN HUDSON'S shot saved and Boro went through at the second attempt after MIKE McDONALD had been adjudged to have moved prematurely after saving.*



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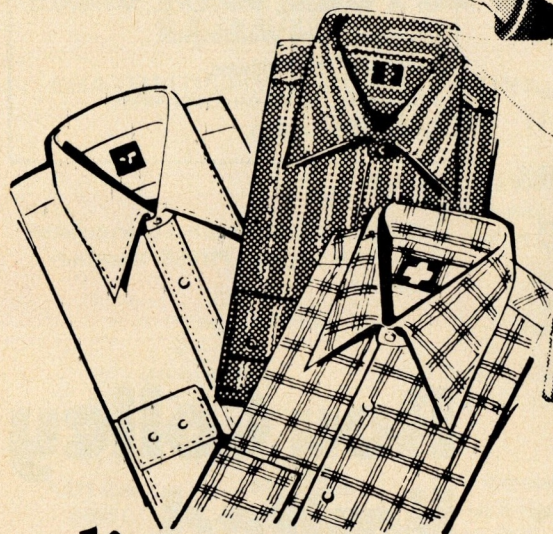
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CROWTHERS COLUMN

□ For a dozen years or more there has been a doleful chorus of complaint about the creeping paralysis of defensive football and the ever diminishing number of goals.

Yet I wonder how many of the fans of this much maligned modern era realise that they have been privileged to see the most prolific goal-scorer in the long history of the Football League's First Division? For that is the distinction that belongs not to Dean, Drake, Gallacher or any of the ace marksmen of the distant past, but to a modest little goal-getting marvel who hung up his magic boots only three years ago.

JIMMY GREAVES is the player to whose accomplishment the statisticians have paid scant justice. So here's a chance to put the record straight. In any table of leading Football League scorers, Greaves, with 355 goals, takes third place behind ARTHUR ROWLEY (434) and DIXIE DEAN (379). But even though it is a well-known fact that Greaves scored all his League goals in the First Division with Chelsea, Spurs and West Ham, neither Rowley nor Dean could lay claim to such a feat.

Rowley, undoubtedly the most consistent League marksman of all time, scored only 51 of his 434 goals in the top table in a career that, astonishingly, failed to earn him a solitary international cap. Dean, probably the greatest header of the ball the game has ever produced, scored 310 of his 379 goals in the First Division.

So even though the record books do not show it, that leaves Greaves out on his own as the top Division One scorer with the famous old-time Derby and England star, Steve Bloomer, in second place with 320.

With that important point established, it is an odd reflection on the career of Greaves that he was, in an age when values were becoming

somewhat distorted, a highly controversial football figure. It was obvious from the day he was first unleashed on First Division defences by Chelsea that he was a goal-getting genius. When, still at the age of 20 in 1960, he hit his hundredth goal in a game against Burnley, He became the youngest player ever to rattle up so quick a century another of his records that is still unsurpassed.

Among the plodders of this profession who might not aspire to a hundred goals in a soccer lifetime, Greaves stood out as the super-star endowed with a natural talent that is given to few if any men in any one generation.

Yet his was the age in which powerful voices were preaching the doctrine of sweat and toil and in which 'work-rate' became an in phrase with so many coaches. In that context Greaves became a player who was often misunderstood. Neither in his brief spell in Italian football nor with his three clubs in this country could anybody get him to go along with the modern trend which requires strikers to chase back into midfield, to harry opponents and to attempt to break up counter-attacks.

Greaves, with the game's end product of goals always uppermost in mind, was the penalty area prowler with the rippling, reflex actions of a panther. Given the merest sniff of a goal chance he could set the drabest game alight with one lethal lunge. His judgment as he flirted with the off-side trap and sprang it was like the product of a computer.

In his international career he finished up with a highly creditable return of 44 goals in 58 matches—second only to BOBBY CHARLTON'S 49 from almost double the number of Jimmy's games. But not even SIR ALF. RAMSEY, with his creed of constant running, could turn the thoroughbred with the strain of a Derby winner into a soccer work-horse. Maybe it was a colossal impertinence for anybody to do so much as try.

Taking the average gates, based on League games only, up to and including last Saturday and comparing them with the average figures at the same time last season, ten First Division clubs can proudly point to an increase.

Of these, however, are the promoted set - Middlesbrough (+9,880), Carlisle United (+8,686) and Luton Town (+6,673). And of the other seven, Stoke proudly lead the way with an increase of a handsome 6,540.

Everton, Ipswich Town, Liverpool, Manchester City, Newcastle United and West Ham are the others showing an increase, while at the other end of the scale Leeds have dropped a staggering 9,257 on last season with Tottenham (-7,078), Derby County (-6,657), Coventry City (-6,058), Leicester City (-5,602) and Arsenal (-5,449) also ruefully reflecting that life can be Oh! so hard.

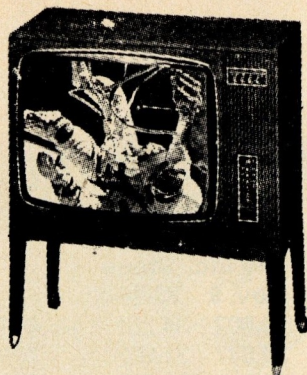

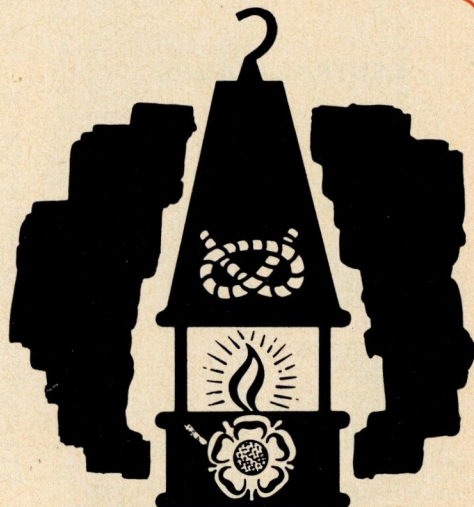
HE'S IN CHARGE
