MISTAKES LET TWO MORE POINTS SLIP

THE RECORD BOOKS will show that Chelsea beat the Town at Stamford Bridge. But that's not half the real story — it was just as much a case of the Town chucking it away with the sort of mistakes that should not be made in the Fourth Division let alone the First.

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Chelsea, surely relegation candidates as much as the Town, were allowed to win when they should have been dead and buried in the first 25 minutes. Two remarkable misses, by Spiring and Alston, meant that at half-time the match was balanced evenly, with neither side able to score.

The Town were well below par, but no worse that Chelsea, until they gave away the vital goal four minutes after the break. And from then on the only bright spots were the promise of better things to come, from new boys Paul Futcher and Steve Buckley.

Buckley came in for Bobby Thompson, and did well enough to warrant another chance.

That was his second game in Division One, and it seems to me that as the Town now need to think about next season's needs, Buckley should be given more experience.

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The same goes for Paul Futcher, making his debut, the stotted into Alan Garner's place with the coolness and assurance of a player who obviously has a very bright

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The third change in defence was not so successful, because Graham Horn, recalled in preference to Keith Barber, had obviously lost some of his sharpness in his long spell in the reserves.

Chelsea gave him few problems in the first goal, and from then on the whole Town team lost its rhythm.

And on that form, they are nowhere near good enough to stay in the First Division.

It's hard to accept that your favourite team is facing relegation. I don't think the Town manager or directors dare make such an admission themselves in public.

I accept that the match is never lost till the final whistle sounds, and that relegation must be fought until the day it is mathematically inevitable.

On Saturday, Chelsea were a right load of rubbish. Kember bounced a header on to the top of the bar from a long free kick by Hay, but the Town had easily the best two chances of the first half.

The defensive marking was just as bad when Chelsea ended the contest 15 minutes from time. Hutchinson crossed low from the right and Kember scored. Faulkner's despairing effort to scoop the chot clear on the line only helped the ball into the net.

Peter Spiring was not as penetrating as he might have been, although he often threatened to cause the home defence trouble.


The Chelsea back line was pulled apart in the incident pictured below. Spiring dived to head just wide of the target, but the linesman's flag was already up for offside.
