LUTON's battle for First Division survival was given a great boost today when Ron Futcher thrilled the home crowd with a goal to give his side a well-earned victory.

Futcher's goal inspired the Hatters into even greater efforts, even though they had shown plenty of guts and provided plenty of pressure on Newcastle up to that stage.

The goal was, in fact, just reward for the pressure they had been piling on. Undaunted by the return of Supermac Malcolm Macdonald to Kenilworth Road

ground, Luton put on a fine show of attacking football.

Yesterday defender Pat Howard had to drop out of the squad because his wife was taken ill shortly before producing a baby.

And in the middle of the night Irving Nattrass became ill with worry about his own wife who is due to give birth.

Frank Clark travelled down instead of Howard, and David Craig was rushed down by road this morning to take the place of Nattrass.

Luton had no such problems. Again they were unchanged and after their recent good performances must have fancied their chances before the kick off.

There was the first return to Luton of Malcolm Macdonald since he left Kenilworth Road almost four years ago. Supermac led the Newcastle attack but he was without his great partner John Tudor who is recovering from an injury and playing for the Reserves at St James's Park.

Peter Spiring returned to the Luton squad as substitute — it was his first appearance since he fractured a toe in the game against Derby before Christmas.

There was one of the largest Luton crowds to watch today's match which begin in bright sunshine and on a pitch which was tacky on top but fairly firm and well sanded.

Today's game was covered by London Weekend television for transmission tomorrow afternoon.

There was a real hero's welcome for Macdonald from a sporting Luton crowd. Mac, captain for the day, led Newcastle out and he nearly brought the house down when he ran to the centre of the pitch and gave a friendly wave to his old fans.

Luton goalkeeper Horn was brought into action with the game about two seconds old. From the kick-off Burns slipped the ball to Macdonald and he whacked it straight at Horn in the Oak Road goal and the Luton goalkeeper caught it before it bounced.


Then a fiery run from Buckley ended with him being foiled on the edge of the box as he was about to shoot.
