WOLVES v LUTON TOWN

SCENE-SETTER

□ LAST-MINUTE goals seem to be the order of the day at Filbert Street when we are the visitors. Last week's disappointment of City's injury-time winner counterbalanced the last-minute winner that **JOHN RICHARDS** (left) got there last season.

John has now scored on each of his last three visits to Filbert Street — though he must have wondered whether it was, in fact, his favourite ground when he was helped off injured last week. Our luck there, too, ran out with that last-minute **CHRIS GARLAND** goal, for it was our first defeat in the League in four visits there since Leicester's return to Division I.

Garland's opening goal against us was his first since he netted for Chelsea against Sheffield Wednesday in the F.A. Cup on January 4. If he is finally credited with a hat-trick (**DEREK PARKIN** does not particularly wish to rob him of the credit for the second of the three) it is his second this season, since he got three in the League Cup-tie against Newport in September. And we also recall his opening goal in Chelsea's 2-0 win here in April, 1972.

If Chris is, in fact, credited with a hat-trick against

us, it will, of course, be the second recorded against us in three months — Luton's **RON FUTCHER** got the other — yet until this spell no-one had got three against us since **FRANCIS LEE** did so for Manchester City in January, 1972.

● Will this year's Easter games bring the thrills that we have enjoyed in recent Easters? There are, of course, still vivid memories of the goals **ALAN SUNDERLAND** (right) and **STEVE KINDON** got against Arsenal last year after running half the length of the field in each case. Then there was the mudbath against Norwich two years ago when Alan Sunderland netted twice for the first time in his career and **MIKE BAILEY** surged through the mud in one of the finest displays of his career.

● Our hopes of finishing in the top three of the Central League this season have taken a severe toss in the last couple of weeks with a 4-0 hammering at Huddersfield followed closely by last week's 2-0 defeat at the hands of Manchester City.

It was hard to believe as we faced up to the sharp-shooting Huddersfield forward line at Leeds Road that their first team are currently fighting a desperate rearguard action to avoid slipping into Division IV for the first time in their history.

Last week we opened promisingly enough against a useful-looking Manchester City side and either side might have snatched the lead before **BARNEY DANIELS** rapped home a fine shot just before half time. This well-built striker has impressed on the occasional first team outing and it is to the credit of our young defender **GEORGE BERRY** that he played him coolly and contained him for most of the game, though he did get a second just before the end.

Though little went well for **DEREK DOUGAN** in attack, we looked dangerous whenever **JIMMY KELLY** (a rare bundle of energy as usual) was in possession and our two best efforts came from snap shots from Jimmy and **PETER WITHE**.

● Don't forget our rearranged Central League match against the attractive W. B. Albion side on Monday, April 7. We held them to a goalless draw in an excellent game at The Hawthorns on Boxing Day.

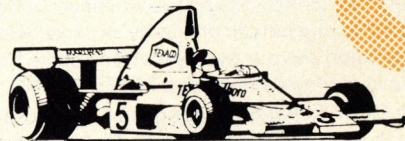

ECHOES FROM THE PAST...

□ EXTRACTS from previous Wolves v Luton Town programmes:

● **AUGUST 29, 1956:** The introduction of floodlights to Molineux has given us a number of new and thrilling experiences. We have had the famous Continental teams here; we have had moments of high triumph; we have had our first floodlit league match; but tonight there is something else that is new. This is the first match at Molineux to be played under the Football League's direction that matches may be started in daylight and ended if necessary in floodlight and when we had the opportunity to make this early experiment our friends from Luton readily fell in with the suggestion. So tonight, with a later-than-usual kick-off for a midweek League game, the lights will be brought into use at a time mutually agreed by the two clubs. We hope the experiment is a success for it gives a better opportunity to our followers to get to the ground. Note how many men in this Luton team have been switched into success. Tall Syd Owen was a wing-half with Birmingham City and became an international when moved to centre-half at Luton. Wally Shanks, once on Chelsea's books as a forward, joined Luton on a month's trial and only made the grade when moved to wing half. Gordon Turner, from, Hull, made the grade the reverse way; he started out as a wing half and made the grade after being moved to outside right. Bob Morton, the local lad, was a wing half but hit the headlines when moved to centre forward. And that—in these days of star shortage—is the way to build football teams, whether you have or you haven't thousands of pounds to play with.

● **APRIL 18, 1959:** The 10½ against 10 match at Blackpool leaves the Wolves with two points to get from three matches to retain the League Championship and European Cup entry. The victory would appear to have been vital, as the title now seems truly within reach. What a struggle it was at Blackpool. The Bloomfield Road team went all out to retain their place in the first four and with it, of course, the League bonus. But the Wolves had the solidity and power the home team lacked and the goal by Murray from Lill's first-half corner decided the issue. I have always been a believer in fast corners and when the Wolves' centre forward, rising like a salmon to a fly, got his head to the ball, it flashed into the net before Farm in goal could even shape to save... Welcome to the F.A. Cup finalists. Luton Town arrive at Molineux in the unaccustomed role of a glamour team... It's the attack that intrigues. Why Sunderland allowed little Bingham, the Irish international, to depart, I would'nt know. He generally moves like a match-winner.

● **FEBRUARY 23, 1960:** This, our first-ever Tuesday night floodlit League game, is one with a touch of coincidence. It is the second time we have met Luton Town in four days, simply because it was Luton who should have been at Molineux for the League match on Saturday, the day we were playing them in the fifth round of the F.A. Cup. The three essentials of a star footballer are (1) technical ability and personality (2) temperament and (3) humility, says Jimmy Murphy, once of Albion, now of Manchester United. That is well-nigh all-embracing, but this we would add: many of the greatest stars in my experience have been men of real humility, men like Stanley Matthews, Tom Finney, Billy Wright, Bill Slater, Bert Williams, Alf Ramsey, the Rev. Kenneth Hunt, Jesse Pennington, Billy Wedlock.

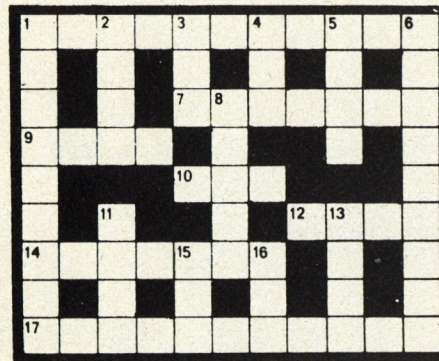

□ THE current League table seems to suggest that the renewal of our rivalry with Luton Town may turn out to be all too brief for despite much-improved form since Christmas, the weight of those 13 defeats in their first 21 games this season is still weighing heavily against them.

Though they won the relegation battle 1-0 at Carlisle a fortnight ago it will need at least a mini-miracle to save them from accompanying the Cumberland club back to Division II.

Yet in recent weeks they have more than held their own in Division I and, if they are relegated, it is arguable that they will be going back to Division II with a stronger side than that with which they came up.

The turning point in their results sprang undoubtedly from manager HARRY HASLAM'S bold move in bringing twins RON and PAUL FUTCHER into the team.

Between them they had cost £120,000 from Chester during the close season and they soon made this price look almost insignificant with RON following up a winning goal against Ipswich on his debut with a hat-trick against us a week later, while PAUL soon won an invitation to join DON REVIE'S

England training sessions.

Joining Ron in the scoring stakes are two former Manchester United men, JIM RYAN and JOHNNY ASTON, both of whom have given excellent service in the last three seasons while PETER ANDERSON, who came from Hendon as a winger, has moved into

midfield with such success as to attract a £200,000 valuation from Aston Villa.

He is also a useful goalsnatcher—as is JIMMY HUSBAND (below) another winger-cum-midfielder, who came from Everton early last season, soon after the arrival of ALAN WEST, an £80,000 England Under-23 man, from Burnley. Though our old friend BOBBY THOMSON is serving the club more these days in the role of coach, he still ranks as one of the best free-transfer bargains of all time when signing from Birmingham City, playing in every game last season as he captained the side to promotion.

JOHN RYAN, who is likely to be on the right flank of the defence today, has also been a tremendous bargain playing in over 200 games since being released by Fulham, his current partner being a product of the Youth policy, STEVE BUCKLEY, who has taken over from Bobby Thomson since September.

At the heart of the defence, JOHN FAULKNER £6,000 from Leeds two seasons ago, lines up with Ron Futchner with GRAHAM HORN, signed as a teenager from Arsenal around the same time after a long spell on loan to Portsmouth, has gradually taken over from promising home-grown product KEITH BARBER in goal.

FOLLOW signs **Walsall A454** to leave by Horseley Fields to join **M6 Motorway** (signs Birmingham). Keep to right-hand lanes (signs London) past service area at Corley to join **M1**. Continue on M1 southbound past service areas at Watford Gap, Newport Pagnell, Toddington and Scratchwood to end of motorway.

Join **A41**, keep to right-hand lane (signs **West End**) to Hendon Central. 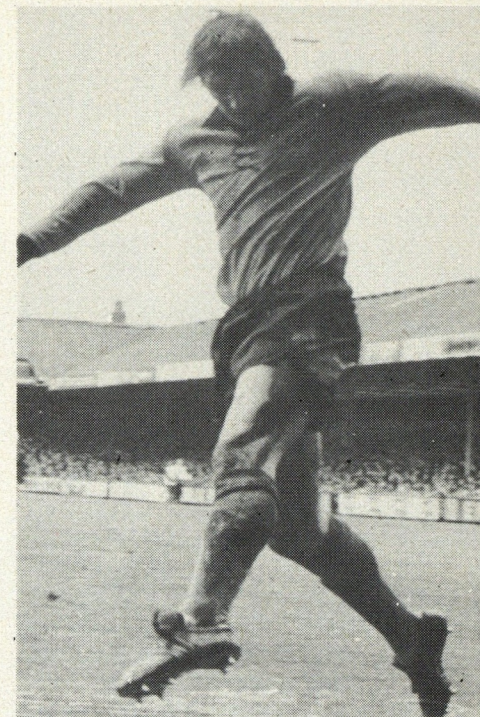
● Another new name on the scoresheet last Saturday was that of **Chelsea's** young defender **JOHN SPARROW** in his side's fourth home

PETER WITHE

□ PETER WITHE took an extraordinary road to success in professional football, having shared in the experience of being kicked out of the Football League and then taking up the strings of his career in South Africa.

It was in August, 1970, that Peter Joined Southport as a professional and he made his League debut for them against Scunthorpe in December that year. The following season, after making only one appearance in the senior side, he left to join Barrow.

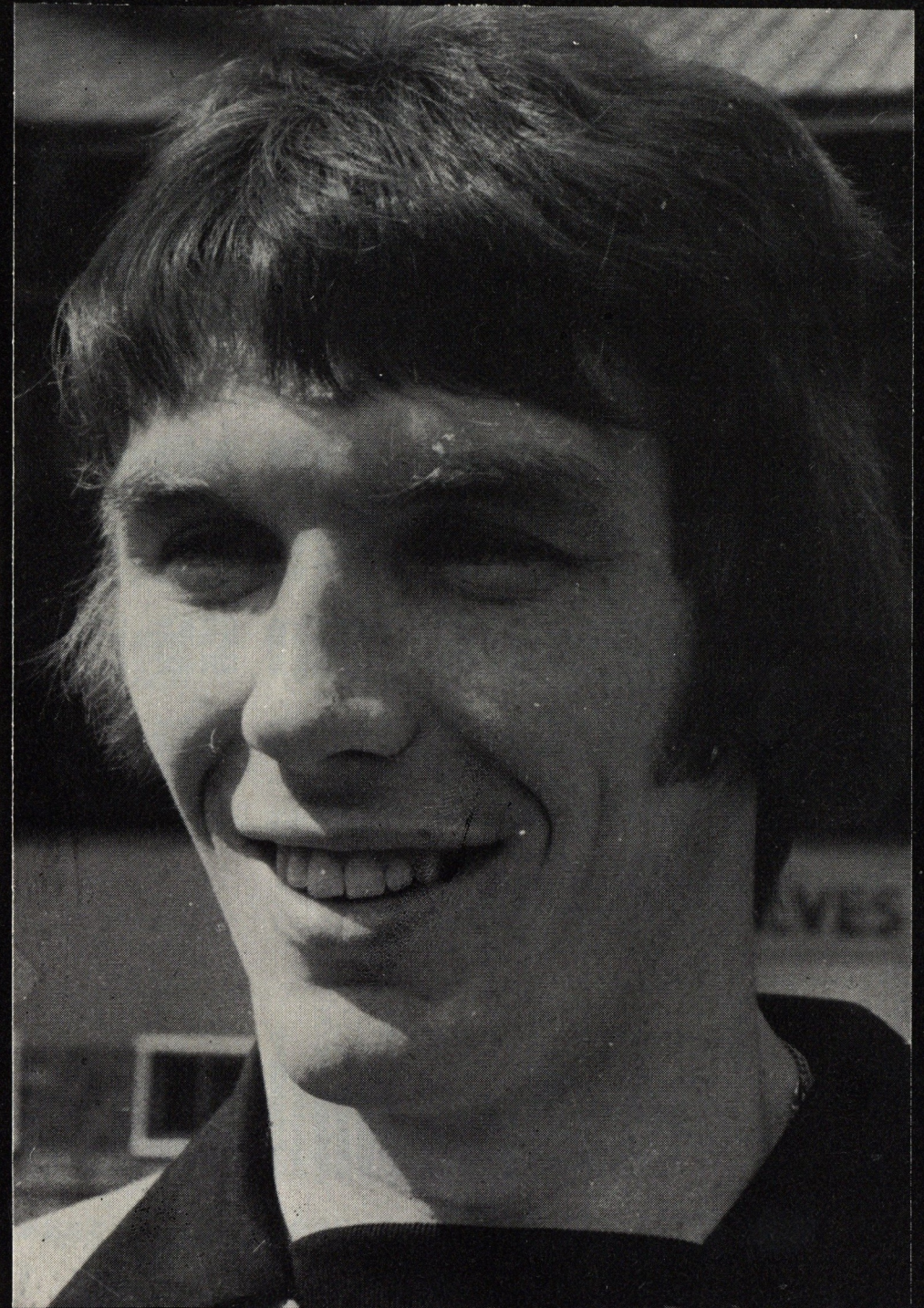
His only first team game for Barrow was against his old club Southport on New Year's Day. And at the end of that season Barrow failed to gain re-election, being replaced by Hereford.

Peter then decided to emigrate to South Africa. While playing for Arcadia Shepherds, he was seen by Derek Dougan, who recommended Bill McGarry to sign him.

So Peter hot footed it back to England where he is now enjoying the occasional game in our First Division side. He celebrated his debut with a goal against Ipswich last season. The following is an analysis of his career so far:
