## **Tense Finish**

OUR two victories over Easter have done much to lighten the gloom that has hovered over us for several weeks. In taking full points from the fixtures against Wolverhampton Wanderers and Queen's Park Rangers, we have strengthened our chances of struggling clear of the dreaded three bottom places in what is now certain to be a tense finish to the season.

Our players did all that was asked of them in the two Easter matches, but we refuse to get carried away by those two invaluable victories. The figures at the foot of the First Division speak for themselves, and a very hard struggle still lies ahead of us.

Our immediate task is hard enough. Luton Town, to whose officials, players and supporters we extend a warm welcome, are fighting for their own First Division survival, and will face us in a determined mood. We know they will have laid their plans well. Mr. Harry Haslam, their manager, and Roy McCrohan, their chief coach, were both here to study us against Wolves on Good Friday.

The 3—0 win against Wolves was our first in the League since the visit to Newcastle on 11th January. In fact, we did not play as well as against Liverpool, who defeated us here in the previous match, but were worth the first-half lead John Duncan gave us from Alfie Conn's pass.

Our defence was far from idle, and we had a number of narrow escapes in the second half. Happily, two fine goals by Steve Perryman landed both points for Spurs. Team: Jennings; Kinnear, Knowles, Beal, Osgood, Naylor, Conn, Perryman, Jones, Duncan and Neighbour. Chivers stood by as substitute.

For the away match with Rangers last Saturday, John Pratt replaced Conn, who was injured. Otherwise the line-up was as against Wolves with Don McAllister filling the substitute's role. Injury compelled Joe Kinnear to retire in the 55th minute, McAllister taking his place.

Spurs played with tremendous spirit against a talented and very positive Rangers team. We owed a lot to Pat Jennings, but the whole team deserves credit for their determined and successful fight to hold on after Duncan had scored what proved to be the only goal of the match in the 23rd minute.

RESERVES HELD The Reserves were held to a goalless draw here by Crystal Palace in the Football Combination last Saturday. Taken over the 90 minutes it was a fair result, and it was a pleasing performance from our point of view, having regard to the fact that we had five 17-year-olds in the line-up. Fred Barwick, Roger Wade and Martin Robinson were all making their first appearance in the Combination. Moreover, eight of the team had played in the two exhausting F.A. Youth Cup matches here and at Middlesbrough on Tuesday and Thursday of last week. Team: Daines; Smith, Keeley, Margerrison, Walford, Barwick, Brotherston, McNab, Gibbins, Wade and Robinson. # **TODAY'S VISITORS**

#### **LUTON TOWN**

WHEN Luton regained their place in the First Division at the end of last season, fourteen years had elapsed since their relegation from the top section of the League in company with Leeds United.

Only three years after their drop in 1960, Luton found themselves in the Third Division and two years after they dropped even lower into Division 4.

In 1968 Luton won the championship of the Fourth Division, and that achievement marked the beginning of their revival. Two years later they finished runners-up to Orient in Division 3, and so regained their Second Division Place. Like ourselves, Luton are now struggling, and their experience this season has been a disappointment to our Bedfordshire rivals.

#### THE PLAYERS

**KEITH BARBER** (Goalkeeper). Born at Vauxhall, South London. Made his League debut for Luton in season 1970–71.

**JOHN RYAN** (Defender). Snapped up by Fulham after getting a free transfer from Arsenal in 1965, but has since made his name with Luton. Keen on water-skiing.

PAUL FUTCHER (Defender). Signed from Chester last June. Born in Chester and joined his local club straight from school.

JOHN FAULKNER (Defender). Signed from Leeds United in March, 1972. Born Orpington, and first made his mark with Sutton United.

STEPHEN BUCKLEY (Defender). New to League football this season. Signed his first professional form for Luton in April, 1974

JIM RYAN (Midfield). Signed from Manchester United in April, 1970. A scot from Stirling.

**PETER ANDERSON** (Midfield). Made his name as an amateur with Hendon. Turned professional with Luton in February, 1971. Is a qualified chartered accountant.

ALAN WEST (Midfield). Signed from Burnley in October, 1973. Born at Hyde in Cheshire and joined Burnley as a schoolboy. England Under-23 international.

JIMMY HUSBAND (Forward). Another former England Under-23 player who joined Luton from Everton in November, 1973. Born at Newcastle-upon-Tyne.

**RON FUTCHER** (Forward). Twin brother of Paul, who was born seconds later. 'As Ron's a striker he came first', jokes Luton manager Harry Haslam. Born Chester and joined Luton from the Chester club last July.

JOHN ASTON (Forward). Signed from Manchester United in July 1972. Born at Ashton-under-Lyne and a son of the famous old England and Manchester United full-back of the same name.

ADRIAN ALSTON (Forward). Comes from Preston but emigrated to Australia, where he attained international status. Returned to sign as a professional for Luton last August.

## **OLD-TIMER**



In the summer of 1931 Luton signed **FRED KEAN** from Bolton Wanderers, with whom he had won an F.A. Cupwinners' medal in 1929. A Sheffield man, he had previously played for Sheffield Wednesday, and in the course of his service with those two northern clubs he made nine appearances for England. Kean became captain of Luton and played right-half in the team that knocked Spurs out of the F.A. Cup on a frozen surface at Kenilworth Road in 1933.

# BACKTRACK....

Reviving incidents from past League matches with Luton

WHEN we visited Luton in the League last October, we were meeting them for points for the first time since 1960, the year in which they were relegated. We drew at Luton 1-1, John Aston crashing home a late equaliser after Martin Chivers had

headed Spurs into the lead in the 67th minute following a fine move by Martin Peters and Ralph Coates. It was in that match that John Duncan made his debut for Spurs . . . The 1960 meeting was on this ground. Spurs were top of the League and Luton were bottom, but they held us to a 1-1 draw. Both goals were scored in the second half, Cliff Jones equalising for Spurs after Joe McBride had put Luton, captained by Allan Brown, in front . . . At Luton earlier that season we had been beaten by the only goal of the match, scored by George Cummins . . . In the previous season, 1958-59, we took all four points off Luton. The match here was played in April when both clubs were well down the table. Luton had already reached the F.A. Cup final, and never seemed likely to pull the game

round after Bobby Smith had given us an 11th-minute lead with a fine left-footed drive. In the last minute of the first half, Ken Hawkes cleared off the goal-line straight to the feet of Johnny Brooks, who slammed in Spurs' second. Our third goal, just on full time, was a copybook header by Terry Medwin. In the second half of that match, Ron Baynham, Luton's goalkeeper, played with one hand strapped up . . . The match at Luton that season ended 2-1 for Spurs. Dave Dunmore scored a fine goal for Spurs in the 11th minute, and we held this lead until Billy Bingham, now Everton's manager, scored a spectacular equaliser late in the game. Medwin netted the winner five minutes from the end . . . Our biggest-ever League win over Luton was by 5-0 on this ground in September, 1956. The only goal of the first half was scored by George Robb, but Spurs made merry at Luton's expense in the second half. Alf Stokes scored our second goal, Seamus Dunne gave away an own goal, and the last two were netted by Robb and Tommy Harmer from a penalty . . . The first-ever Division 1 clash between the teams was at Luton in August, 1955 and Town defeated us 2-1. A header by Johnny Gavin gave us the lead at half-time, but Cummins equalised early in the second half, and Gordon Turner cracked home the winner in the closing minutes . . . The return match that season was played here on the morning of Christmas Eve, and Spurs turned the tables with a 2-1 win. Len Duquemin and Brooks gave us a 2-0 lead at the break, and Luton's only response was a second-half goal by Turner . . . Back to our promotion season of 1949-50. We were top of Division 2 when we visited Luton in the October. Sonny Walters scored a first-half goal for Spurs, but an equaliser in the second half by George Stobbart enabled Luton to hold us to a 1-1 draw. When Luton came here the following March, we held a 12-point lead over Sheffield United, the second-placed club, with two matches in hand! Yet we were off colour that day and Luton held us to a goalless draw . . . Luton's last win against Spurs on this ground was in April, 1948, a solitary goal in the second half by Mel Daniel settling the issue . . . The first League clash between the teams after the war was at Luton in November, 1946. Les Bennett scored a first-minute goal for Spurs, but Luton rallied well and goals from "Dally" Duncan, Hugh Billington and Eddie Duggan gave them a 3—1 lead at half-time. George Foreman scored for Spurs in the second half, but we finished losers by 3-2... When Luton came here the following March, a second-half goal by Ronnie Dix gave Spurs a 2-1 win. Freddie Cox had opened the score for Spurs, but Duggan equalised before half-time . . . Our last League meeting before the

war was on this ground in February, 1939, Luton left-winger George Stephenson scoring the only goal of the game in the first half... Earlier that season we had played a goalless draw at Luton . . Season 1937-38 was the first in which Spurs and Luton met in the League. The first clash that season was at Luton in the September, when Spurs won 4—2. Billy Redfern opened the scoring for Luton, but Les Miller and Johnny Morrison then scored a goal each for Spurs. Redfern squared matters for Luton, but Morrison again put Spurs in front and Freddie Sargent scored our fourth . . . Spurs won the return match on this ground by 3-0. Colin Lyman, our outside-left, scored two of our goals that day with one from Morrison sandwiched between them.

#### OLD SPUR ...



CHARLIE WITHERS made his debut at full-back in Spurs' League team in season 1947–48 and was still a first-team player in 1955–56. When we won the championship of the Second Division in 1949–50, he missed only two matches.

Charlie came from Edmonton and after war service with the Royal Artillery, he signed professional forms for Spurs in October, 1947. After leaving here in 1958, he signed for Boston United, then in the Southern League.

He lives at Ponders End and now works as a bank messenger at Barclays branch in Enfield Highway. 'They were happy days

I spent with Spurs, and I would love to go through it all again,' says Charlie. 'As a schoolboy it was always my ambition to play for Spurs. There has never been any other club for me.'

As his outstanding match in a long playing career with Spurs, he selects the home fixture with Preston North End on Easter Saturday, 1950.

'That was my most exciting match and it was a great team performance,' recalls Charlie. 'We were two down at half-time, but won 3—2, Sonny Walters scoring the winning goal.' Spurs were already assured of promotion before that game.

Of football today, he says he would like to see a reversion to the old 5–3–2 style of play.

Charlie is now a keen angler. He belongs to the 'Knights of the River' club from the Southgate area and also represents Barclays in the All-England Angling contest held by the big banks.

#### ROUTE TO BURNLEY

Supporters planning to travel by road for our match at Burnley next Saturday are advised by the R.A.C. to use the following route.

Proceed via Potters Bar and the **B.650** to the junction with the **A.6.** Turn right on to the **A.6** and proceed for four miles and then continue by the **A.405** to the **M.10.** Follow the **M.10** and then the **M.1** northward to Intersection No. 19 and proceed by the **M.6** to Intersection No. 31. Follow the signposted route "Blackburn **A.59**" for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles to the junction with the **A.6119.** Turn left on to the **A.6119** and proceed for  $4\frac{1}{2}$  miles to the junction with the **A.679.** Turn left and follow the **A.679** to Burnley.

Enter Burnley by Accrington Road (A.679) and continue ahead to the junction with Westgate (A.671). Turn right and proceed ahead to the roundabout. Take second exit—Yorkshire Street—and continue to Brunshaw Road and the ground is on the left.

Street parking is controlled by the police so watch for any special signs, including diversions. The approximate distance from the Tottenham area is 237 miles.
