It is very difficult to express in words the feeling of disappointment everyone at the Club felt when we lost against Fulham at Maine Road. I do not propose to dwell on the matter, however, I cannot let it pass without thanking the thousands of you who took the trouble and expense to travel to both Hillsborough and Maine Road. I know the sorrow was felt by everyone including the many people who have written to me since the game congratulating the team on their display and offering their condolences. It is easy to support a team when they are top of the League and winning but for so many of you to take the trouble to write, knowing the disappointment you must have been feeling, makes me realise even more what a magnificent set of supporters you are.

We are basically a young team with five of the players who played in the Semi-Final only twenty years old. Eight of the players had come

through our own youth scheme and it is to the future that we must now look. The experience will have been very good for them. This was our second Semi-Final in four years and who knows, perhaps it will be third time lucky!

However, today we must get on with the job of finishing the Season on a high note and I have told the players how important it is to show that they are capable of bouncing back after a set-back. Football is full of disappointments but it is the ability of everyone to bounce back that decides whether you recover and go on to achieve further success. Our players in the past have shown this quality so often.

The Championship now appears to be going to Derby County and I am pleased that a team that tries to play attractively with the accent on entertainment look as though they will achieve this great honour. It has been one of the closest races for the First Division for years and I cannot see the picture changing much next year. There are so many teams so evenly balanced that your results depend so much on whether you can avoid injuries to key players.



GRAHAM HORN (goalkeeper): Established himself as first-team 'keeper during the promotion season. Former England Youth international signed from Arsenal for a £25,000 fee. At nineteen one of the youngest 'keepers to play in the First Division.

KEITH BARBER (goalkeeper): Born in Vauxhall, London, Keith played most of last season in the Combination side. Signed by manager Harry Haslam from London senior football. One of the "characters" of the squad with a terrific sense of humour, Keith's great ambition is to re-establish himself as first-team

JOHN RYAN (defender): Former Arsenal and Fulham player with a wealth of experience. Established himself as first-team full-back midway through last season with some impressive performances. Kent born, John is a water-skiing enthusiast of international standard.

BOBBY THOMSON (defender): Must be the greatest 'free transfer' capture of all time, when joining Luton from Birmingham City. Capped frequently at full back for England, Bobby has proved to be one of the greatest skippers to wear the "Hatters" shirt. Ever present last year, his approach to the game both on and off the field was an inspiration to his colleagues during their promotion season.

JOHN FAULKNER (defender): Signed from Leeds United for only £6,000, John first hit the headlines when playing in the epic Cup match for Sutton United against Leeds. Plagued by a serious knee injury at Leeds, John, now completely recovered, is realising his full potential and missed only two matches last

STEVE LITT (defender): Born in Keswick, Cumberland, this is Steve's second season with Town after signing from Blackpool. A great young prospect and one of the stars of a successful Combination side last season. When called on for first-team duty, Steve's cool performances have attracted the attention of many leading clubs.

PAUL FUTCHER (defender): Chester-born, Paul was one of the Town's close-season signings along with his identical twin brother, Ron. He is part of manager Haslam's "insurance" philosophy for the future. Joining Chester from school, eighteen-year-old Paul is regarded as one of football's stars in the making. Luton secured his signature despite opposition from many First Division clubs and is tipped by many good judges for early representative honours.





PAUL PRICE (defender): One of the "babes" of the squad. Born locally at St. Alban's, Paul is establishing himself as a fine young defender. Finished last season with a broken leg from which he has made a good recovery

STEVE BUCKLEY (defender): Stepped into firstteam spotlight only a few weeks ago when he deputised for skipper Bobby Thomson in the No. 3 shirt. And obviously another young man to watch.

MAITLAND POLLOCK (midfield): One of the few Scots on the club's books, Maitland was signed at the end of last season from Southern League Burton Albion for a small fee. Has enormous enthusiasm for the game and has quickly become a favourite at

BRIAN CHAMBERS (midfield): Close-season signing from Arsenal. Newcastle-born Brian looks forward to establishing himself with the "Hatters" first-team

LUTON TOWN

PETER ANDERSON (midfield): Signed for Luton when an amateur with Hendon. Established himself as a prolific goalscoring midfield player last season and deservedly voted by the supporters as "Player of the Year". Peter was virtually an ever-present last season, missing one game through injury, and wore the No. 9 shirt on five occasions when Barry Butlin was injured. Loves to attack and his goal tally of fourteen last season made him one of the leading midfield goalscorers in League football. He is a qualified chartered accountant.

ALAN GARNER (midfield): Another great "free transfer" signing, Alan joined the Hatters from Millwall and has established himself as a cool, reliable player. Ever present last season.

JIMMY RYAN (forward): Another Scot, Jimmy joined Luton from Manchester United four years ago for a fee of £20,000. Great ball player, he missed only three matches during the Hatter's promotion year.

JIMMY HUSBAND (forward): Well-known for his feats with Everton, Jimmy joined the Hatters midway through the last season against opposition from many leading clubs. Scorer of ten goals including two hattricks last season, Jimmy has settled down as one of the most respected strikers in the League and is now playing better than at any time of his career. Born Newcastle-upon-Tyne.

RON FUTCHER (forward): Four-goal hero of Luton's fantastic six-points-out-of-six Christmas special - including a hat-trick in his home-debut against Wolves on December 28.

ALAN WEST (forward): Must be one of manager Haslam's finest signings when he joined Town from Burnley. An Under-23 International, Alan is one of the great crowd favourites at Kenilworth Road and became an ever present, after joining the club in October 1973. Born in Hyde, Cheshire.

JOHN ASTON (forward): Now in his second season with Town, John is remembered by everyone in football for his great games for Manchester United, particularly in the European Cup. One of the few orthodox wingmen left in top football. A member of a fine footballing family, John was born at Ashtonunder-Lyme

GORDON HINDSON (forward): Signed from Newcastle in 1971, "Geordie" has now establishd himself in the first-team squad. Though mainly wearing the No. 12 shirt last season, his enthusiasm and ability were an asset to the team whenever he was called on. Equally at home as a forward or midfield player.

ADRIAN ALSTON (forward): A dramatic signing by manager Haslam from Australia's World Cup side. So far Adrian has really justified Mr. Haslam's faith.



DERBY COUNTY'S 1-0 win over West Ham last Saturday not only made them odds-on favourites for the Division 1 championship, but brought BRUCE RIOCH his twentieth goal of the season — a remarkable tally for a midfield operator. This

was only the third defeat West Ham have suffered in seven visits to the Baseball Ground.

* EVERTON, however, kept their interest alive with a 1-0 win at Newcastle, MARTIN DOBSON, another midfielder with an eye for goal getting, notching the winner with his fourth


goal in just over a month. This was the eighth time in 11 visits to St. James' Park that Everton have avoided defeat since their crushing 8-2 hammering there in 1959-60.

- * STOKE'S good run at SHEFFIELD UNITED came to an end, however, with United inflicting on them their first defeat at Bramall Lane since 1967/8. Oddly enough, United's goals in the 2-0 win came from KEITH EDDY (penalty) and TONY FIELD . . . just as they did in the 3-2 defeat at the Victoria Ground in October. This win virtually ended Stoke's championship aspirations and brought back memories of the 1946/7 when City, needing to win their last match of the season to take the Division 1 championship, went down 2-1 at Bramall Lane.
- * MIDDLESBROUGH, whose successive away defeats at LEICESTER and WOLVER-HAMPTON in the space of four days finally put them out of the championship reckoning, need look no further than their sudden loss of away form for the fact that they have not been in at the championship kill. After winning six of their first 11 games this season they have failed to win in any of their subsequent 11 journeys in League and Cup.
- * At the other end of the table, LUTON kept their faint hopes of staying up alive with a 3-0 win over LEICESTER, who are still in some

goal in just over a month. This was the eighth slight danger despite winning their previous time in 11 visits to St. James' Park that Ever- three home games without conceding a goal.

- * It does, however, seem likely that the final relegation place will rest between CHELSEA and SPURS, neither of them helping their chances with defeats on Saturday. ASA HARTFORD'S winning goal for MANCHESTER CITY at Stamford Bridge brought them not only their first away win since August 28th at Tottenham, but also their first win in their last 13 visits there . . . and one has to go back to 1957/8 for a 3-2 win for the Maine Roaders at Chelsea.
- * No change of luck for Spurs at BURNLEY, however. Despite JOHN DUNCAN getting his fourth goal in successive games, they went down 3-2 and have won only once there since 1954/5.
- * The other games in London saw LEEDS repeat last season's 2-1 win at HIGHBURY, despite the fact that BRIAN KIDD got his sixth goal in the last six home games for Arsenal.
