Chelsea hooligans fail to end game 308 75 BIRCH THESE THUGS'

HUNDREDS OF Chelsea fans fought running battles with police and stewards as they stormed on to the pitch to bring a violent climax five minutes before the end of this thrilling game. Referee Eric Read (Bristol) ushered the players to the safety of the tunnel as the game was held up for four minutes. Read said: "It wasn't a dirty game, but we had realised before the start there might be

trouble."

When the first lad came on to the pitch,

came on to the pitch, Micky Droy lifted him up and dumped him back over the barrier.

"I told Droy to keep the game going. I thought there was a chance the hooligans would retreat if we did," said the ref.

"But once the mob came on I had to suspend it. Eddie McCreadie said he would be happy to call it a day then and end the game early for our own safety, but I was not going to do that. However long it took to clear the pitch, I was determined we should complete the match.

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"I think the answer is birching or bringing back the cat—something like that."

Luton 'keeper Keith Barber squared up to one hooligan and was struck on the back of the head by another. A steward was helped semi-conscious from the pitch.

Pelted

Barber said later; "The Chelsea fans were throwing all kinds of things at me during the second half...a five inch lump of concrete, a metal bolt, and about £10 worth of 10p pleces. And all the time I was being spat at."

"These sort of hooligans must be given prison sentences with the sentence doubling up each time they are caught, and

the clubs will have to build fences behind their goals." Chelsea manager, McCreadie visited Barber after the match to apologise for the fans behaviour.

The violence continued in the streets after the game. Bricks were thrown through shop windows and cars were overturned as the mob ran riot on their way back to the station.

The Chelsea supporters, segregated at one end of the ground, had made repeated attempts to get on to the pitch in the closing stages. A few succeeded before the mass invasion.

The match had been packed with incident. Luton winger John Aston was sent off for retallation after a foul by Ian Britton in the 71st minute and four other players were booked — Cheisea's Britton, Charlie
