Billy Hunter and I travelled up to watch the Luton v. Chelsea match and what we saw there on the terraces was a disgrace to the game. Young kids, some of them under twelve, were staging running battles with Police and Stewards, confiscating balls that had been played into the crowd, and then finally they began invading the pitch to have a go at the players. All of the trouble seemed to come from the Chelsea section of the fans which is a pity if Eddie McCreadie's vouthful promotion challenge is to be carried along on a wave of fan hysteria à la Manchester United.

I have noticed that in our two away matches this season, we still have a good sprinkling of supporters including our faithful band from the Isle of Wight, so I can only hope that they keep their own good name and the good name of the Club intact when they make their trips out of Portsmouth.

In one week I saw Chelsea play twice and with all the Press they've had since the season started, and they do have some good youngsters, I am more than convinced, that the way our Youths have been performing there are exciting times ahead for Portsmouth.

Luton, like ourselves, seem to be searching for a blend of youth and experience, and Harry Haslam's team play as much attacking football as any team in the first two divisions. So we have the challenge today of pitting our skills against a team that put up such a brave fight to stay in the First Division last season coupled with the prospect of seeing the young Futcher

The way we have picked up in the last two games could point to a thrilling game of football today and this alone could be the best medicine for any over zealous fans we have in the ground.

Welcome

Luton Town

After one season in Division I Luton find themselves back in the second Division. At one time they looked as if they would avoid the drop and could count themselves unlicky not to do so, as they had a tremendous last ditch battle. However, the experience will do them good and they will be looking for an immediate return to Division I. Manager Harry Haslam has welded them into a Club who enjoy their football, being a happy-golucky character himself it obviously rubs off on others. Luton are a progressive Club and although restricted area wise, have done some fine work on their ground and facilities. They have a fine blend of vouth and experinece which should serve them well in their efforts to restore First Divison football at Luton once again.

KEITH BARBER. Goalkeeper. Was signed on professional forms in April 1971, when Tony Read was injured and the Club had to seek special permission from the Football League — the transfer deadline having passed — to play him against Sheffield Wednesday three days later. Keith has since held his place regularly.

ALAN WEST. Alan took over as skipper of the Hatters mid-way through last season and it was under his quidance that the team made such a remarkable recovery and was so very unfortunate to suffer relegation. Alan won England under-23 honours in his Burnley days but, after losing his place in the team which won the Turf Moor club promotion in 1972/73, he felt he would like to make a fresh start elsewhere. He signed for Sunderland but they amazingly turned him down, following a medical. Luton had no such reservations, signed him for £80,000 soon after 1973/74 had kicked off and he hasn't missed a game since.

JOHN ASTON. John followed in father's footsteps by becoming a big star with Manchester United. Dad had been United and England's left-back during the immediate post-war period and young John followed him into the Reds' side in 1964/65. For several seasons John and George Best performed on opposite flanks for United, John's finest game probably being the 1968 European Cup Final when he teased and tantalised the Benfica defence into complete submission. Soon after that he broke a leg and never quite made a full recovery. The presence of his father also tended to prove a bit difficult at times so he moved to Luton on a £30,000 transfer in 1972. Earlier in his career, John played for the England under-23 XI.


JOHN RYAN. John's first taste of League football came with Fulham who were in the First Division whe he made his bow in 1967/68. He enjoyed a long run, appearing in 24 games that season and holding his place for much of the following campaign. Shortly before the close of that season, though, he was transferred to Luton where he has always been a member of the senior squad. John has on two occasions (in 1970/71 and 1971/72) maintained an ever-present record. He was a member of the Hatters' team which won promotion to the First Division in 1974.

STEVE BUCKLEY. Steve is one of the youngest members of the Luton side and is now into his second campaign as a first-teamer. He was given a trial at Leicester in October 1974 and performed with a coolness which impressed manager, Harry Haslam. A few weeks later, Mr. Haslam decided to give Steve a further run and this time he played so well that, there after, former England International Bobby Thomson was unable to regain the left-back position.

BRIAN CHAMBERS. Brian is a talented footballer who has not yet fulfilled his full potential. He developed well, at first, in Sunderland's youth team and, after making his League debut for the Roker Club in 1970/71. he held his place for about a year. He began to make a come-back in 1972/73 as Sunderland embarked on their epic F.A. Cup run but, though he was getting several League outings during that period, he didn't get the chance to join in the Cup fun. At the end of that season he moved on to Arsenal where he remained for just one season before signing for Luton.

PAUL FUTCHER. Paul was only 16 when he made his League debut for Chester against Cambridge in March 1973, but, so quickly did he establish himself in the men's world of professional football that he was transferred to Luton for £100,000 little more than a year later! "I couldn't believe it when I was told," says Paul. "I had no idea Luton were interested, anyway. Last season, Paul's robust tackling and his lightening summing up of every situation made him a big success in First Division football and how he is strong tipped for representative honours. Paul is the identical twin of striker Ron who joined Luton at the same time.

PETER ANDERSON. Peter had looked little farther ahead than soccer fun with amateurs, Hendon, in the Isthmian League until Luton spotted him. Then things moved swiftly. Luton signed him in February 1971 and promoted him immediately into their Second Division side. He soon settled and, indeed, the following season he was leading scorer with 10 goals. He has since remained a member of the senior side and has now made almost 200 appearances for the side.


