There were mistakes in the defence and, had they accepted their chances, Sunderland could easily have had four goals.

Luton will have to do better than this if they are to climb once again into the top half of the Second Division and have any sort of chance at all of that much talked about promotion.

Former Luton forward Vic Halom had a fair game for Sunderland but Luton's Brian Chambers, who used to play at Roker, could not fulfil his promise to score on his return.

JUST a minute . . . that's all it took to beat Luton this afternoon. They came home pointless

Bobby Kerr set the ball rolling when he blasted a free kick past Barber in the 55th minute. pop Robson popped in No 2 in the 56th minute — and it was all over.

Barber failed to hold a cross and Robson was very

happy to push the ball home from the rebound. Minutes later he missed an open goal after Porterfield foxed a depressed defence.

Luton made two changes, bringing back John Seasman and John Aston in place of Peter Spiring and Ron Futcher. This meant Peter Anderson, although wearing the No 4 shirt, was expected to play an attacking game.

Sunderland were without Joe Bolton, who suffered a serious leg injury in training on Thursday and they brought in young Jack Ashurst at left back. That was the only change in the home line-up.

The Hatters faced the stiff task of trying to upset Sunderland's 100 per cent home record. And former Town striker Vic Halom led the Roker attack against his

Today' game was televised by BBC cameras for Match of the Day tonight.

It was quite a day for Luton's Brian Chambers who returned to the ground where he made 100 league apearances in his seven-year spell.

In the first minute Paul Futcher very nearly gave Sunderland a bright start. The Luton sweeper was slow moving on to the ball and Towers nipped in sharply to smack a fierce shot just wide of the post.

from just outside the box but it was caught, somewhat unconvincingly, by Montgomery. It was Chambers again who tried to get the attack moving, but his pass to Anderson ended with a bad header which went straight to the Sunderland centre half.

Barber's good form seemed to be continuing when he went up high — under pressure from Halom - to catch cleanly after Ashurst started a good move from the left.

Then Hughes headed wide of the pressured Luton goal following a neat free kick from Kerr. The Hatters tried to get back into the game but

quickly to snatch the ball from Halom's feet and received a knock in the process.

With Halom, Hughes and Kerr buzzing well, play in the first 20 minutes tended to be in the Luton half. In fact the Town found it difficult to go forward, and on several occasions defenders were robbed of the ball as they tried to set something up.

Halom, after starting one move from midfield with a long ball out to the left, made enough ground to get on the end of Ashurst's centre. But he could get no power into his header.

Barber pulled off a fine catch at full stretch to a corner from Kerr, with the Luton goalmouth under real pres-

And with Halom charging in again Barber did well to fist another clever Kerr corner over the crossbar. Luton looked far from happy in the first half hour. Some work from Anderson and West sent Aston away for a break on the left. But he took the ball out of play before crossing for Jimmy Ryan — who headed wide anyway.

A good ball from Anderson put Jimmy Ryan free on the right but his cross was headed out and again Luton were back-pedalling and looking for ideas in attack.

The referee allowed quite a lot of niggling to go on before having a word with Halom for a foul on Chambers. Sunderland looked more likely to score and a good free kick from Kerr brought a header from Hughes which bounced past the far post.

More good play by Halom set up a chance for Kerr, but again Barber was well up to the shot and made a diving save to keep Luton in the game.

There was an ugly incident when Seasman was accidentally kicked in the face by Towers. Jimmy Ryan was quick to react by running at the Sunderland player and pushing him in the chest. The referee was in quickly to sort things out, and had a word with Ryan. Seasman was able to continue after treatment.

Luton's first corner came in the 44th minute, but it was cleared and it took a last-ditch tackle by John Ryan to stop Hughes going clear.

In the 65th minute Andy King went on as substitute for John Aston, obviouuly not at his best after recent injury.

Luton had another escape when a shot from Porterfield was deflected past Barber on to a post by Robson. Fortunately for Luton it bounced out of play. And then an overhead
