'HARRY'S TOWN'

I think we must be some sort of masochists at Luton Town. Last week after we had lost badly at Sunderland, we exhorted our coach driver, Maurice, to get us back to Luton in time to see the game on 'Match of the Day'.

He made it, and we saw it all again-or the socalled 'highlights' of the match again. And it did not look any better the second time round.

While I still maintain that there is not an outstanding side in the Second Division, and I do not rate even Sunderland as highly as some people do. I have to admit that we did not play well.

We didn't win the ball well enough in midfield. and when we had it we gave it away far too easily. But through the gloom of that defeat at Roker Park I can still see a lot of good in my side. The team, trailing 2-0, still had the character to fight to the end, and I thought we were on top for the last 20 minutes. Still, that's no good if you can't score goals.

This is one aspect of the game at Luton that I have been most concerned about. As you know I have switched the attack around time after time. I have dropped players, moved players around, and brought players back. And we still have to find the right blend. But don't worry. I am not finished vet.


It is irritating in the extreme to see us labouring about in the middle of the table when we know we have such talent in the side. Sunderland have had more or less the same side for years. But so have we. Last week's team was not all that different from the one which pushed us to the First Division, and played in the top bracket last season.

In fact at Roker Park last week I bumped into another League manager who had gone along to watch the game. He is an old friend of mine. I won't tell you his name, because his club might not like him helping out another club, but I asked him to run the rule over my Luton side.

I asked him to watch the game carefully and to

think about it and then let me have his opinion. The only reason for this was that I felt it would not be a bad idea to have an outside, unbiased and expert opinion. At the time of going to press I am still waiting for his report. When I get it we'll have the coaches and the players together, and discuss it intelligently.

Today we welcome Alan Dicks' Bristol City to Kenilworth Road. I said earlier that I didn't feel there was an outstanding side in the division. I think Bristol City come nearest to being that side. I believe they are a better team than Sunderland, and are my tip for the title. We'll be all out to upset their chances, of course, today. And I feel that our performance against this good City side will be a good yardstick as to our form and ability. I know we can do it. I know my side is as good, if not better, than when we were promoted to Division One a couple of seasons ago. We have been through a bad patch. I trust we have thrown that aside now, and that we can beat Bristol City and get back up there among the leaders.



Bristol City—up from the West Country—last played in Division One way back in 1910-11. That's over 60 years ago—but this season, the lads from Ashton Gate, hope to put all that right by grabbing, for the first time since 1905-06, promotion from Division Two and a place with the elite.

Looking at their present playing record and position in Division Two, the odds at the moment appear to be good—good that is for promotion, even the championship, and surely third spot at least! But things change so dramatically in football, that City's manager, Alan Dicks, isn't one for counting his chickens before they're hatched. Far from it. Indeed, he takes every game as and when it comes—this afternoon's clash with Town will show what City are actually made of, especially following their shock 2-0 home defeat by Albion last Saturday.

Scoring goals is, without a doubt, the most important aspect in football, and City already this term are averaging over two goals per game.

Manager Dick's policy of going at defences right from the start of a match is certainly paying dividends. Non-stop attack has got to produce the goods sooner or later, and City's front-runners are greedy for goals goals win matches; it's two points for a win; the more points, the better chance of honours—City are on the rampage. It's going to be hot stuff alright today. So let's hope the goals flow, the football too, and may the better team win.

TODAY'S CITY-

RAY CASHLEY—Goalkeeper. A Bristolian, who joined City as a full-back five years ago. He's a tremendous kicker who has over 125 League appearances behind him.

DONNIE GILLIES—Full-back. A Scot from Fort William, who was converted to a number 2 after five years as a forward. Signed by City from Morton for £25,000 in 1973.

BRIAN DRYSDALE—Full-back. A native of Co. Durham, he started off as a forward with Lincoln. He then played for Hartlepool, signing for City in 1969-70. Has over 250 senior outings to his credit.

GERRY GOW—Midfield. Born in Drumchapel, he made his debut for City in April 1970 and has since played in over 200 League matches for the "Robins".

GARY COLLIER—Defender. Another Bristol lad, who was an apprentice at Ashton Gate before becoming a professional in July 1972. A six-footer, he is exceptionally good in the air.

GEOFF MERRICK—Defender. Yet another local man, City's captain. Former Bristol and England Boys' player who is now in his seventh season with the club.

CLIVE WHITEHEAD—Forward. A Birmingham youngster, who was signed from Northfield Juniors in 1974. Has only recently gained a regular first team spot. Very tricky and quick.

TOM RITCHIE—Midfield. Born in Edinburgh, he became a City player in 1969, his previous club being Bridgend Thistle. Has 100 plus League appearances in his locker.

JIMMY MANN—Forward. Had a spell with Leeds United prior to joining City in April 1974 as a professional. Has drawn up a good understanding this season with fellow striker, Paul Cheesley.

PAUL CHEESLEY—Forward. City's leading scorer at present and a man who has come on a bundle following his £30,000 transfer from Norwich in 1973-74. Must be watched in the air.

KEITH FEAR—Forward. Another Bristolian and former Gloucestershire Youth captain. Has been out of the side of late, but could be in the reckoning for a recall today. Only 5' 6" tall.

TREVOR TAINTON—Midfield. The fifth Bristol born man in City's squad. He made his League bow in 1967 but has only been a regular performer in the side since 1972.

50 YEARS AGO

City and Luton were both in Division Two in 1925-26. City finally finished in 4th place (51 points), and Town in 7th spot (43 points). The champions were Reading, with a total of 57 points from 42 games. City won 21 of their League matches, while Luton collected maximum points on 18 occasions. The respective goal-averages were: City 72-51; Town 80-75. The two matches played between the Robins and the Hatters ended in home wins for both teams—Luton 4-1 and City 5-1.


During the League season City utilised 25 players— Luton 23. There were no ever-presents for either club. Graham and Thompson each missed one game for Luton and City's best was Hughes with 37. On the scoring charts, T. Walsh (25 goals) topped the City list and for Luton, J. Thompson hit 24.


City's best League win of the season was a 5-0 home triumph over Boscombe, while Luton achieved the same scoreline against Watford.

Luton's heaviest defeat came at Millwall (0-7); City's at Crystal Palace (2-5).

When City visited Southend in December 1925 (won 2-1) the attendance of 12,737 was a then record for the seaside ground.

Up front, we failed to capitalize on the chances that came our way or we were thwarted by last minute tackles or good goalkeeping.

This was a fine win for a side that included both youth and experience. The defence and midfield were very young and up front we had three experienced strikers in Spiring, Alston and Husband. Southend had a good, composed side with experienced players and they were determined to return home with a good result.

Southend had us under pressure for the first twenty minutes of the game and, as a result of this pressure, they took the lead after just four minutes through Pountney. Two great saves from Graham Horn, who gave one of his best performances over the past few games, denied them a stronger lead. However, we came back well and took command of the game, especially from midfield where Ricky Hill and Andy King were starring. In the 30th minute, Andy King scored the Hatter's first goal from a corner kick and fourteen minutes later he added another from a free kick to put us 2-1 in the lead. Ricky Hill very

nearly increased our lead when he hit the post after some brilliant individual play.

In the second half we continued to dominate the game, although Southend were still dangerous in their counter-attacks and Graham Horn performed well on a couple of occasions to keep us in the lead. In the 75th minute, Pollock, who came on as substitute for McHugh, made a good run on the left, crossing early, and Jimmy Husband was there to head it home. The lads kept going and we scored our fourth goal from a corner kick taken by Husband. Ricky Hill, in a two versus one situation, played a tremendous ball into space on the near post, Alston took it well and headed it into the net.

This was an interesting game and a very good win for us. Ricky Hill, a product of the Chiltern Youth League, showed tremendous ability on the ball. Andy King looked hungry for goal and Spiring looked useful. In the back four Morgan did well considering that it was his first game as a rightback and Jones and Carr settled down as the game progressed.


