



THE VIEW FROM THE COTTAGE



It is an odd fact that during the last eight matches only one Second Division club, West Bromwich Albion, have conceded fewer than our total of four goals. Yet an average of one goal against for every two games has, as Alec Stock observes, cost Fulham Football Club no fewer than six points.

With that little lot, we would be sitting pretty with Sunderland at the head of the table. The problem doesn't require any expert diagnosis, nothing that a few goals on the credit side wouldn't cure.

FRUSTRATION

There can't be any doubt that either Luton today or Bristol City next Saturday will be made to pay for the frustration of recent weeks. The York result gave us all another disappointing example of what a difference one goal makes, and left Alec quoting one of the game's greatest truisms: ''It's really all about getting the ball into the back of the net."

So today we come to the end of another hard week's work, uninterrupted by the unusual absence of a mid-week fixture. Yet there is so much on the credit side which ought not to be overlooked.

Despite the leanness of the recent spell, we are still only two points away from Bristol City in third place, with a game in hand and, what's more, a thoroughly respectable goal average.

CONSISTENCY

In terms of clean sheets, only four clubs, West Bromwich (9), Sunderland (8), Nottingham Forest (8) and Notts County (8) have been more successful, such has been the consistency of Peter Mellor and the defenders in front of him.

It's also worth comparing our present position with that of precisely twelve months ago, if only to show in facts of figures how much better off we are right now.

Two home games on successive Saturdays affords us an opportunity to climb back into the top three, by which time we will be half way through our second

Cup final of the year. The first leg of the Anglo-Scottish final against Middlesbrough takes place at Ayresome Park next Wednesday night and a special train has been laid on for the occasion. (For details, see 'Friends of Fulham'.)

DISMISSAL

The second leg, here on Tuesday, December 9th, comes four days before we are due to go into the hat for the biggest knock-out competition of them all, the F.A. Cup.

Talking of Cup draws, we trust our luck holds in the F.A. Youth Cup. Having followed our 6-3 dismissal of Gillingham in the first round with an impressive win over Dover, we hope that the next tie will not spoil our record of avoiding an away draw during the last two years of the competition.

On the same subject, two of our players were in the England team which played a combined Birmingham-West Brom Under-19 side last week as part of the UEFA Youth Cup preparation. The Fulham pair, left back Mike Kerslake and centre half Stephen Hatter, may well finish the season helping England retain the European trophy.

MILESTONES

Quite a number of Fulham milestones are coming up. There's Les Barrett's 450th first-team game, which makes us wonder whether he shouldn't be in the record book as the youngest player ever to appear so often for one club.

Also due soon — Alan Mullery's 400th match, which might have come up even quicker than Barrett's but for Spurs. Jimmy Conway is nudging 350, with John Lacy and Bobby Moore closing in on their centuries.

The English Schools Trophy 4th round match between West London and Havering will be played here at Craven Cottage on Monday, 24th November, kick off 7.15 p.m.

One win in six as Luton fall below halfway

Luton Town, relegated after just one season in the First Division, return to Craven Cottage this afternoon without one of football's best-known directors. The resignation of Eric Morcambe, who used to be listed in the Football League handbook under his real name, J. E. Bartholomew, hasn't been the only change at Kenilworth Road this season.

The club that Eric has left behind, because of pressure of work, have failed to make the sort of impact they would have liked. Whatever the reason, Luton have lost their winning Second Division ways of two seasons ago.

A frustrating first three months has brought only one away win, at Portsmouth in early September, as Harry Haslam, one of the happiest men in management, tries to rebuild another promotion team.

GULF

Haslam's arrival with Luton in the First Division completed a job begun by our own Alec Stock, and while it took Northampton only four seasons to get from the Fourth to the First, Luton did exceptionally well to bridge the gulf in seven seasons.

'Happy Harry', well-known at Craven Cottage, where he used to be Fulham's chief scout, has given youth a firm fling by introducing the Futcher twins, Andy King and other players to give his team a fresh look.

In many ways, Luton were unlucky not to have survived in the First Division, pushed down by Spurs' home win over Leeds in the final match of the season. Given up for dead not long after the halfway mark, their recovery

was such that in the end Luton's was a glorious failure.

STIRRING

They won more matches during their last ten fixtures than they had done in the previous 32, and it was that stirring form from March onwards which prompted many pundits to consider the Bedfordshire club definite candidates for an immediate return.

Three wins from the first four games suggested early confirmation of that opinion. Then the rot set in with a 2-0 home defeat by Bolton, and it wasn't until seven games later that Luton won again. The vanquished were none other than Fulham, beaten by a Brian Chambers goal to nothing.

Even then, Luton still didn't take off. A goalless draw at Nottingham Forest indicated they were on their way, but their only win out of the last

six matches came against York, thrashed 4-0 on an afternoon when the Kenilworth Road attendance dipped below 8,000 for the first time this season.

A last-minute defeat by Oldham last Saturday keeps the club in the lower half of the table. Luton are not alone in coming down from the First to find life something of a sweat in the Second. Chelsea have had their problems and Carlisle have only just begun to pull out of a troublesome beginning.

LUTON BIOGRAPHIES

KEITH BARBER: Goalkeeper. Born: London. Previous club: Dunstable Town.

Shared goalkeeping duties in the First Division last season with Graham Horn, returning to take part in a recovery which almost kept his club up. Made his League début several seasons ago.

JOHN RYAN: Full back. Born: London. Previous club: Fulham.

One of the club's longestserving players, his career League appearance total is now close to the 300 mark. Left Craven Cottage the season before Luton's emergence from the Third Division.

JOHN FAULKNER: Centre half. B o r n: Orpington. Previous clubs: Sutton, Leeds United.

Signed by Leeds after an impressive performance against them in an F.A. Cup tie for Sutton. Injury restricted his First Division career to two matches but since moving back south he has shown commendable consistency. Missed only eight League matches last season.

PAUL FUTCHER: Defender. Born: Chester. Previous club: Chester.

He and twin brother Ron made quite an impact on the First Division last season after their move from Chester. Paul played 19 times last term and is now adjusting to life in the Second Division.

BRIAN CHAMBERS: Midfield. Born: Newcastle. Previous clubs: Sunderland. Arsenal.

Made his Luton début against Birmingham thirteen months ago. Played 63 League matches for Sunderland but managed no more than one First Division game during an unsuccessful career at Highbury.

ANDY KING: Midfield. Born: Luton. Previous clubs: None.

Appeared in a League match for the first time during his club's farewell First Division fixture against Manchester City last April. Now a regular member of the side he has scored three Second Division goals so far this season.

ALAN WEST: Midfield. Born: Hyde. Previous club: Burnley.

The only ever-present in Luton's squad last season, he cost almost a six-figure fee three seasons ago. An England Under-23 international he sprang to prominence as a teenaged member of Burnley's first team.

JIMMY HUSBAND: Striker. Born: Newcastle. Previous club: Everton.

Played for his old club in the 1968 F.A. Cup final against West Brom, appearing in 165 First Division matches for Everton before his transfer. Scored three times in 33 matches last season and has already gone one better this term.

RON FUTCHER: Striker. Born: Chester. Previous club: Chester.

Moved with his twin brother after just four matches for his home-town club. Finished last season as his club's joint top scorer with seven goals from 17 matches. Two more to date this season.

JOHN ASTON: Winger. Born: Manchester. Previous club: Manchester United.

Without a goal as yet this season, still needing five more to complete a half century in League football. The son of a famous United player, he played in Manchester United's 1969 European Cup final triumph against Benfica, moving to Luton on £35,000 transfer more than three years ago.

COTTAGE CHOICE

Bobby Thomson still going strong after 14 years . . .

since Birmingham City gave Bobby Thomson a free transfer, presumably convinced that his First Division career had finished. Last season the same Bobby Thomson made it back to the top and this afternoon he is scheduled to play his 459th League match.

Proof enough that the old England left back is still going strong, a full decade after collecting the last of eight international caps in the early days of Sir Alf Ramsey's reign.

Thomson started in the First Division 14 years ago with Wolves and stayed at Molineux until 1969, by which time he had appeared in more than 300 League and Cup matches. Yet his career at St. Andrews ended after 62 League matches.

That was when Luton came in, taking Thomson out of his native Black Country for the first time and banking on his experience to complete their recovery from the anonymous ranks of the Fourth Division to the elite of the First.

Luton had got themselves a bargain and now, in the twilight of a career which has stood the test of time, Thomson is still good enough to hold down the left back position and move steadily on towards his 500th match.

With the exception of Alan Hinton and Ken Knighton, all those Wolves with whom Thomson began his career have long since retired, among them such well-known players as Norman Deeley, Peter Broadbent, Ron Flowers, Bill Slater and Freddie Goodwin.

FULHAM FORM

Two Cottage wins for Luton in nearly 50 years visiting

Once upon a time, Luton Town could never win at Craven Cottage. But having waited 42 years to beat Fulham on their own ground, the Hatters are now doing their utmost to make up for lost time.

They have won two of their last four matches at the Cottage, and while we don't anticipate any further bad news this afternoon, it won't do any harm to point out that Luton are one match away from completing their second Fulham double in three seasons.

Luton have never had it so good on a ground where they used to congratulate themselves if they escaped a hiding. In six pre-war League visits, they collected nothing more than a solitary point. When League football resumed in 1946, Fulham duly continued where they had left off before the war began.

Just as Luton had lost all but one of their six pre-war matches, so they lost on six of the first seven postwar visits.

Ronnie Rooke and Ernie Shepherd made sure the trend of Fulham domination continued by scoring the goals in a 2-1 win on September 7, 1946 when both clubs were in the Second Division. The following season Luton managed one of their rare draws but in April 1949 they lost 4-1 to goals from Rowley (2), Stevens and Thomas

Bobby Robson scored both in a 2-0 win on September 6, 1952, Johnny Haynes rattled a hat-trick in February 1954 and later that same year two goals by Stevens and another from Robson explained vet another Luton defeat.

After a five-year gap, fixtures were resumed and the only post-war First Division meeting between the clubs at the Cottage brought a resounding 4-2 Fulham victory. The date -September 12, 1959. The scorers — Leggat (2), Docherty and Hill.

Finally Luton renewed their faith in the law of averages, winning the first Third Division match between the clubs since the Third Division (South) era of the early Thirties.

In January 1972, it was back to the predictable home win. George Johnston, who had joined us from Birmingham, scored twice, Les Barret once, only for Luton to return for their second win from 16 matches.

Today they come back pushing hard for promotion to the First Division, eager to offset the loss of a home point on Boxing Day 1973, when John Conway scored in a 1-1 draw.

Strange as it may sound, that was only the third draw in 33 League matches between the clubs. There hasn't been a Fulham-Luton draw at the Cottage for more than 25 years, since March 29, 1948 to be precise.

FORM GUIDE EXTRA

Fulham Gates:

The second highest average increase in the division

With the season fast approaching its halfway mark, only six Second Division clubs can quote an increase in average attendances. Happily, Fulham are one of them, showing an improvement of almost 1,300 spectators per game compared with a seasonal average for 1974-75 of just under 11,000.

Of the remaining 21 clubs, only Charlton Athletic can point to a bigger increase. Their aggregate attendance of 84,780 for seven home matches compares with a Craven Cottage total of 96,633 for eight matches.

Predictably, the three clubs relegated from the First Division have suffered most from dwindling crowds. Chelsea's is the greatest fall, but Carlisle United's average has been more than halved to slightly above 7,000.

The complete average attendances readings for the Division reflect, sad to say, more downs than ups.





Recently, I came to the Fulham v Charlton match, only to have my car stolen. Living 30 miles from Fulham makes it difficult to engage friends to keep a look out around

Meanwhile, we have had this very interesting memory from

Mr. Ted Miles, of Mablethorpe Road, Fulham, which is very appropriate for today:

"An interesting feature of the visit of Luton to the Cottage is that Fulham's last pre-war League Division 2 game on Saturday, 2nd September, 1939, was against Luton Town, I can recall as a lad of 13 going off to the Cottage with my gas mask over my shoulder for a 6.30 p.m. kick off. The usual Saturday kick off time was 3.30, but due to the evacuation scheme coming into force and the operation of one-way traffic until 5 p.m., the time was altered. The result was a 1-1 draw, with our goal by Ronnie Rooke. Fulham's team was Hughie Turner, Harold Pitts, Joe Bacuzzi, Jim Evans, Ernie Hiles, Jim Tompkins, Dennis Higgins, Viv Woodward, Ronnie Rooke, Taffy O'Callaghan and Ernie Shepherd.

Fulham gained their first point of the season by holding Luton to a draw, and young Ernie Shepherd made the Press headlines the following Monday as the surprise star on the wing. With War declared the next morning, the League programme was abandoned. And the chap who made the No. 1 headline on that last pre-War football Saturday was Ted Drake, who got four of Arsenal's five goals in the 5-2 victory over Sunderland.

From far-away New Zealand comes evidence that Fulham's following is world-wide. Mr. P. R. Sammons, of 22 The Esplanade, Auckland, writes:

"It will probably be of interest to many supporters not even this far away from home that there are some of us who listen with bated breath at incredible hours on a Sunday morning just to hear the Fulham score.

Imagine our delight when Fulham appeared TWICE on TV here last week. Once on a Wednesday evening sports programme and again on the other channel on Sunday afternoon. Unfortunately, on each occasion it was the game against Luton, but we look forward to seeing the Anglo-Scottish Cup

By the way, Don is off on a very pleasant assignment—he comperes the International Song Festival in Gibraltar.

Budding Reporter Competition

Andrew Grey, aged 14, of New Malden, wins our "Budding Reporter" competition. Andrew's report of the Fulham v Orient match, which we published in our last programme, was judged the best of a number of fine entries by a Fleet Street sports writer. The winner of the Under-12 section of the competition was Steven Leven, aged 8½, of Kenton, Middlesex.

The opinion of the judge was: "The quality of the entries was first class and it was no easy matter to select the winner. The overall impression is that Fulham have some very knowledgeable young supporters, who can commit their views to paper with intelligence and clarity. There was not one entry which was difficult to read or understand and it is a pity that there is no space to print all the entries.

But the fact that there is never enough space in a programme or a newspaper is the first guide to any budding journalist. The skill in getting across facts and opinions to the reader in a clear and concise way, while under great pressure from edition times, is the basic requirement of a journalist and, therefore, it was a sign of this ability that I looked for among the entries.

Andrew Grey provided it, with a sensible mixture of description and opinion. A sports writer needs to have an opinion, but he will not please the reader until he also tells him the facts of the game. If there is one criticism of Andrew and the other entrants, it is that they didn't give a brief resumé of the course of the game before they began describing the run of play. Most readers follow a pattern in what they want to know about a football match - just

imagine the questions you would ask if you weren't at the game.
"What was the score?", "Who scored?", "Was it a good
game?", "How did my team play?", "Was it a fair result?" these are the sort of questions you would ask and are, therefore, the questions a reporter should set about answering as soon as he can in his report.

Had Adam Rocks of Putney answered these questions in his introduction, he might have gained first prize, because his description of the run of play was excellent. The same thing applies to two young ladies - Anita Bray, aged 14, of Oxford, and Tracy Lee, aged 15, of Kew — who submitted good, interesting reports, which were full of sound observation and sensible opinions.

Martyn Pearce, aged 15, of Fulham, was also very close to winning, but although his views were forceful and well presented, he was slow in telling me exactly what happened.

Stuart Shearing of Norwich was very much more to the point and his effort was very commendable for a 12-year-old. Marc Taylor of Hemel Hempstead did well, as did Geoffrey Haines of

In the Under-12 section, Jerry Bryant, aged 10, of Kingston gave a full and interesting account of the Orient match, but he was edged out of first place by young Steven Leven, who wrote a much shorter report but gave a better overall picture.

All the entrants deserved another chance, and if Fulham decide to hold another competition, it should provide some very interest-

ing reading."

P.S. After the competition was closed on November 12th, and the judging completed, we received an entry from Richard Baron, aged 13, of Merrow, Guildford, which satisfied most of the points made by the judge, but was too late to be considered. Make it earlier next time, please Richard.
