

Comment

As there will be no trains operating on Boxing Day, when we are at home to Portsmouth (kick off 3.00 p.m.) the club are hoping, subject to the consent of the Ministry of Transport, to organise a coach service in conjunction with Lewis Coaches of Greenwich, to pick up supporters at local railway stations.

- * The Hatters, as Luton are known, were formed in 1885 and turned professional five years later.
- Their record victory was on April 13, 1936, when they beat Bristol Rovers 12—0.
- * The famous Joe Payne scored an incredible 55 goals in a season for Luton in 1936-37.
- * Amongst the eight managers Luton have had since the war, are two former Charlton players, Sam Bartram and Alec Stock.
- * The club's record gate receipts of £16,100, were achieved on January 11 this year when Chelsea visited Kenilworth Road.

Profile on the Players

KEITH BARBER. Keith was signed on professional forms in April 1971, when Tony Read was injured. He played well enough to earn two more games before the end of the season, but was not first choice for 1974/75.

JOHN RYAN. John's first League game was with First Division Fulham in 1967/68. He was transferred to Luton towards the end of the next season. He was a member of the Hatters' team which won promotion to the First Division in 1974.

JOHN FAULKNER. John (once a Charlton amateur) was Sutton's centre-back during their 1970 F.A. Cup run. He had the misfortune to break a kneecap after signing professional with Leeds United. In 1972, before making a full recovery at Leeds, he joined Luton and has since been our number one centre-back.

PAUL FUTCHER. Paul was transferred for £100,000 little more than a year after making his league debut for Chester at the age of 16. Paul is the identical twin of striker Ron, who oined Luton at the same time.

BOBBY THOMSON. Bobby, now approaching the end of a wonderful career, had, at the end of last season, made 450 League appearances for four clubs. He came close to playing in England's number three shirt for the 1966 World Cup. Signed for Luton in 1972.

PETER ANDERSON. Peter signed for Luton in February 1971 after being spotted with amateurs, Hendon. He soon settled and has now made almost 200 appearances for the side ALAN WEST. Alan won England under-23 honours in his Burnley days. Luton signed him for £80,000 soon after 1973/74 kicked off. He took over as skipper mid-way through last season.

JIMMY RYAN. Made his First Division debut in 1965/66 with Manchester United. He was unable to obtain a regular appearance and subsequently signed for Luton in 1970. Last season he took over as the Club's penalty-taker.

BRIAN CHAMBERS. A talented footballer with further potential. He made his League debut in 1970/71 with Sunderland and held his place for about a year. Signed for Luton just one season after joining Arsenal.

JOHN ASTON. John joined Manchester United in 1964/65. He played opposite flanks to George Best until he broke a leg and never quite made a full recovery. Moved to Luton on a £30.000 transfer in 1972.

RON FUTCHER. Signed with Luton in the

same deal as his identical twin brother, Paul. Hit four goals in his first two full First Division games. When Luton beat Wolves 3—2 on 28 December last, Ron claimed all three goals.

JIMMY HUSBAND. Won five England under-23 caps *u* ilst at Fulham where he made his debut in 1965. He made his name with Everton and signed for Luton in the 1973/74 season, paying a £70,000 fee.

JOHN SEASMAN. Signed under an air of secrecy when everyone thought that Luton manager was after Steve Coppell. John had played on 17 League games for Tranmere when Luton signed him on the strength of his performances in the reserves.

Previous Meetings

Charlton have scored 56 goals to Luton's 51 in 34 previous meetings. This is the minute difference between our two Clubs — 53 years after our first meeting — each side having won 14, lost 14, and drawn 6.

We were nearing the completion of our first season in League football when we paid our first visit to Luton in April 1922, but second half goals by Mathieson and Butcher for the Hatters made it a trip best forgotten. One week later, Higginbotham scored the only goal of the match for Luton to record the "double" in front of 3,000 Valley fans.

That defeat was one of only three we have suffered in 17 Luton league visits. Their last victory at The Valley was on September 23 1961, but older fans will remember we avenged that defeat with a record breaking 6—1 win, in the return match at Kenilworth Road on February 10 1962.



Sunderland's attendances comfortably exceed the quarter of a million mark following their home match against Bristol Rovers on November 22. Up to that date 277,872 have attended the 10 League matches at Roker Park, an average of 27,787.

We are proud to report that the highest "gate" to watch Sunderland away this season was the 22.307 that attended our last match at The Valley.

It is fast approaching the halfway stage of the season, and the pattern of results indicate a tremendous open race ahead for the honours.

Sunderland obviously look a good bet but even assuming somewhat dangerously, they're successful, who will accompany them?

Currently the most consistent team is Bolton — 16 matches undefeated and averaging 1.5 points per game — but they are just one of many sides who have strung together impressive unbeaten runs.

Our table this week indicates the best unbeaten run of each team; current position compared with end of September and October; chief "striker" in League games and highest home attendance.

Down Memory Lane

It will not have escaped the notice of our more statistically minded supporters that our last home match against Sunderland was the 1,000th time we've acted as hosts in the Football League. Of these matches, 988 have been staged at The Valley. Today's visitors, Luton, were one of the twelve clubs who visited us during our brief stay at Catford during the 1923/24 season, and today we feature this match plus two other memorable past meetings.

Charlton and Luton meet at The Mount, Catford — 1924

5th April 1924 at The Mount, Catford (Attendance 2,000 (estimate))

Charlton 1 (Thomson):— Wood, N. Smith, Herod, Rees, Armitage, Goodman, Richards, Steele, Thomson, Ayres, S. Smith.

Luton Town 1 (Kerr):— Gibbon, Graham, Till, Walker, Jennings, Millar, Hoar, Butcher, Kerr, Reid, Hoten. (Half-time 1—0).

Luton's first match in Division 1 - 1955

20th August 1955 at The Valley (Attendance 28,460)

Charlton 2 (Leary, Gauld):— Bartram, Campbell, Townsend, Hewie, Ufton, Hammond, Hurst, Ayre, Leary, Gauld, Kiernan.

Luton Town 2 (Turner, MacEwan):— Baynham, Dunne, Aherne, Morton, Owen, Shanks, Davies, Turner, MacEwan, Cummins, Taylor. (Half-time 1—1).

NOTE:— The attendance at the above match to watch Luton's first match in the top Division is a record for a game between our two Clubs. In this match, Charlton's forwards hit the crossbar three times and Jimmy Gauld, apart from scoring his debut goal for The Valiants, had a "goal" disallowed by referee K. E. Collinge (Sale, Cheshire) when Billy Kiernan was adjudged to have strayed offside.

Record away win at Kenilworth Road — 1962

10th February 1962 at Kenilworth Road, Luton (Attendance 9,827)

NOTE:— The above result was the last of a series of six record breaking Charlton matches played between 1953 and 1962. During this period Charlton beat Middlesbrough 8—1 (our highest League win); Burton Albion 7—0 (highest Cup win); Huddersfield Town 7—6 (highest aggregate score); drew 6—6 with Middlesbrough (highest draw); lost 11—1 at Villa Park (biggest defeat); and finally won 6—1 at Luton (record away win). To play in one of these matches must have been an unforgettable experience. Yet one player, the brilliant Stuart Leary, played in all six games, which almost seems unfair.


