## PERSISTENCE AND HARD AFTER WATCHING persistence and determination bring WORKBRIGS its rewards, in the shape of two points well won from promotion candidates Sunderland, Town fans gave their team an ovation on Saturday as they walked off the Kenilworth Road pitch.

## TS REWARD

For Sunderland had been trounced even more positively than the score-line suggests.

They came looking for a draw, choosing to play a 4-1-2 formation. The Town, with John Aston ruled out by a knee injury, were forced into a similar formation—but they made it work so much better, with more accurate passing, more direct running, and more men prepared to make runs off the ball to open

up gaps.

It needed a lucky goal for the first breakthrough, but once that went in, after 65 minutes, the Town looked much more like First Division class than Sunderland did.
