From the manager

I just hope we can field a full squad today and that the lads who have been under the weather can sweep aside the strength-sapping effects of the bug to help us back to a really top performance.


Our last game was against Oldham when we managed to hold on to a 1-0 lead which came as a result of a particularly good opening spell.

Once again we brought pressure on ourselves by not getting the second goal. The second half was pretty even and we were well satisfied to come off with two points.



NEXT Wednesday the youth team take on Newcastle United here at Ashton Gate in the quarter-final of the F.A. Youth Cup—the premier competition for footballers under the age of 18.

It will be a big day for our lads who have battled so well to reach this stage with wins over Plymouth Argyle (2-0), Swindon Town (4-2) and Sunderland (6-2 after a 2-2 draw at Roker Park).

We have had merely average results in the Midland Youth League this season, winning five and drawing four of our 16 matches so far. This is largely because we have included many schoolboys and have a much younger team than many of our opponents.

We are also down to only four apprentice professionals at the moment and two of them, Mike Simmons and Howard Pritchard, have played quite a few games in the Reserves.

Our youth Cup squad is strengthened by three professionals—Shaun Penny, Kevin Mabbutt and Allan Riley—and also by a couple of amateurs recruited from other clubs.

Next season we shall take as many apprentices as we think are good enough. Already David Wiltshire, a midfield player from Almondsbury who is in our present squad, and Wayne Summerhayes from Taunton are lined up together with a lad from Scotland.

After our Sunderland triumph—and the tremendous backing we had from the supporters—



I saw Newcastle gain a narrow win at Newport. They have two or three good players who are in the England youth squad, but it will be how we play that matters.

We have a good bunch of lads in this season's team and the backing given to me in my efforts by the manager, Tony Collins, Ken Wimshurst and Billy Tovey makes the success a real team effort.

Our supporters spurred on the team with their encouragement against Sunderland. We all hope that several thousand will turn up on Wednesday to cheer the lads into the semifinal.

At City Today

LUTON TOWN, still with a chance of returning to the First Division like a yo-yo, have won five of their away games and drawn three more.

The away victories have been at Portsmouth (2-0), Charlton (5-1), Hull (2-1), Bristol Rovers

(1-0) and York (3-2).

Their recent away results have been up and down. The victory at York was sandwiched in between a 3-0 defeat at Bolton and a 1-1 draw at Oldham. More recently they crashed 3-0 agian—at Plymouth.

Financial pressures forced manager Harry Haslam to sell midfield man Peter Anderson to the Belgian side Antwerp in December for £80.000.

But midfield seems to be one of Luton's strong points. Main inspiration is former Burnley player Alan West who cost the club £80,000 in October 1973 only two months after a £70,000 move to Sunderland fell through for medical reasons.

Brian Chambers started his career with Sunderland and played 63 League games. He joined Arsenal in May 1973 for £25,000 but played only once in the Highbury League side. In July 1974 he joined, Luton for £30,000 and earned a regular place this season.

Completing the midfield trio is youngster **Andy King** a local player who became an apprentice in October 1972 and a full professional 21 months later.

He made his League debut when he came on as sub for Luton's last game in the First Division—at home to Manchester City. He scored in five successive League games for Luton in December and Jan-

Goalkeepr Keith Barber has been with the club since April 1971 when he was signed from Dunstable Town. He completed

100 League games earlier this season.

Full back John Ryan played his first League soccer with Fulham when they were in the first Division, He joined Luton in the 1968-69 season and has played over 260 League games for them and over 300 altogether.

Steve Buckley joined the club from Southern League Burton Albion in April 1974 and cost £5,000. Apart from a nine game spell when former Wolves, Birmingham and England man Bobby Thomson took over, Buckley has been the regular left back this season.

Regulars at the heart of the defence have been John Faulk-ner and Paul Futcher. Faulkner played for amateurs Sutton

United against Leeds United in the F.A. Cup fourth round tie in January 1970.

Although the amateurs lost 6-0, Faulkner made a big impression with manager Don Revie and signed for the Elland Road club. His stay was dogged by injury and he joined Luton in 1972.

Paul Futcher, along with his twin brother striker Ron, joined the club from Chester in June 1974. Paul was valued at £100.000 and Ron at £40,000.

Former Chester apprentices, the brothers had been professional for only five months when they joined Luton. Ron returned from suspension last Saturday to score in the 2-0 home win over Sunderland.

That goal was Futcher's tenth of the season and put him just one ahead of **Jimmy Husband** the former Everton player who

joined the club in November 1973 for £70,000.

An England schoolboy and youth international he won an F.A. Youth Cup, F.A. Cup runners-up, and League championship medals during his Goodison Park days and played 165 League games for the club scoring 44 goals. He played five times for England's under-23 side.

Winger John Aston has won even more honours. The son of a former Manchester United full back, he joined the Old Trafford staff from school and won two Division One Championship medals and played in the 1968 European Cup winning side.

Recent injuries to centre half Faulkner and winger Aston gave Paul Price and Pasqualle 'Lil' Fuccillo their first full League outings. Both had played once as sub before.


