Referee Ken Baker thought otherwise, and eventually held up the game to give Best his first caution since returning to football in this country, for dissent.

But from then on the laughs were all at the Town's expense. They won 14 corners to Fulham's four, but could not turn them into goals, and Marsh underlined the finishing lesson with a killer goal after 64 minutes.

All the old skill was still there as he took on the Town defence, exchanged a brisk wall pass with John Mitchell, expertly drew Barber out, then beat him.

Fulham knew by then that the points were safe, and even the introduction of Ricky Hill for the injured Lil Fuccillo made no difference, Marsh stole the show,

trying tricks that other players wouldn't think of in training sessions. His cheeky sense of humour bubbled through, and even a foul by Faulkner which earned the Town defender a booking failed to quell

Marsh's bright spirit.
