



Commenced refereeing in 1959. Was appointed to the Football League line in 1967 and has been on the full list for several years. Linesman in the Northern Ireland v Wales match (1975), also the Fulham v Birmingham City F.A. Cup Semi-Final Replay last year.

Married, with four children, he is Chief Security/Traffic Officer at the National Exhibition Centre. For 12 years he served with the Metropolitan and Warwickshire Police Forces rising to a Temporary Detective Inspector. Is Chairman of both the Rugby and District Referees Association and the Rugby and District Junior League, and as Executive Committee Member of the Football League Referees' and Linesmens' Association (Midland Section). Plays tennis for the local police team.

TEAM-TALK

LES BARRETT London born. A former England under 23 International. Les's first appearance in Fulham's League team was in 1965/66 and was top goal scorer when the Club won promotion from Division 111 in 1971. Caps for England under-23 — 1. A member of the 1975 Cup Final team.

VIV BUSBY. Born in High Wycombe. Viv played for his local Club prior to signing professional for Luton Town. At Luton he formed a spectacular partnership with Malcolm MacDonald. Signed for a fee of £25,000; A member of the 1975 Cup Final team.

JOHN DOWIE. Born in Scotland, he is an apprentice with Fulham, signed full professional in 1974. He played in the Scottish Youth side.

JOHN CUTBUSH Born in Malta G.C. John was released in the summer of 1973 by Tottenham after spending several years at White Hart Lane. He didn't manage to get into Spurs League team but has made 115 appearances in Fulham's League side. He was a member of the 1975 Cup Final team.

BARRY LLOYD Born in Middlesex. A former England Youth International. He joined Fulham from Chelsea in 1968/69 as part of the deal which took John Dempsey to Stanford Bridge. He was a member of the 1975 Cup Final team.

PETER MELLOR. Born in Prestbury.. Fulham signed Peter from Burnley for £25,000 in February 1972. Burnley found him playing for Witton Albion and promoted him to their First Division side in 1969/70 where he gained an under-23 cap. He was a member of the 1975 Cup Final Team.

JOHN MITCHELL. Born in Hertfordshire John joined to club as a professional from his local amateur club St. Albans in February 1972. Due to injury, he made limited appearances last season. He was the leading goal-scorer during 1975/76 season and is in line for an under-23 cap. A member of the 1975 Cup Final team.

BOBBY MOORE . What can one say or add to the following: England Captain, approximately 90 times. Captain of World Cup winning side 1966. A member of the 1975 Cup Final team. Holder of 108 caps. All time record F.A. Cup Winners Medal 1964. European Cup Winners Medal 1965. Nominated 'Player of the Tournament' World Cup 1966. League appearance 619 Goals 25

ALAN SLOUGH Born in Luton Signed from Luton Town in close season 1974 where he had played for the past 10 seasons. Has made 378 first team appearances and joined us for a fee of £45,000. A member of the 1975 Cup Final team. Appointed captain for the coming season. Goals 39

LES STRONG Born in London. Played for Crystal Palace as a schoolboy. Signed for Fulham as a professional in June 1971. Has made 111 League appearances and scored 2 goals. Due to injury missed the 1975 Cup Final.

RICHARD TEALE Born in Millham. He was signed from Q.P.R. in the close season where he understudied Phil Parkes, the England Keeper.

JOHN EVANSON Born in Newcastle-under-Lyme Signed from Blackpool during the close season Made over 150 appearances for Oxford United before being transferred to Blackpool for over £70,000. Regular first team player at Blackpool.

TERRY BULLIVANT Born Elephant & Castle London, was signed as an Apprentice in 1972 and graduated through the Youth scheme. Signed full professional form 1974. 3 First team appearances.

TYRONE JAMES Born in Paddington, he signed professional in 1974 after being on the ground staff for one year.

GEORGE BEST. It's all been said before! One of the few players in the history of the game with an unassailable record of success — League Championships, Cup, Football League Cup and European Cup successes. 'Player of the Year' and 'European Player of the Year'. Has returned to the English scene from the U.S.A. with the fervant desire to re-establish himself with his vast supporting public.

RODNEY MARSH. English International. Began his playing career with Fulham and subsequently played with Q.P.R. and Manchester City — being transferred to the latter for £200,000. He has now returned 'home' from the U.S.A. where he has been playing with Tampa Bay Rowdies. One of the games outstanding personalities with a goal record of 164 League goals. This he hopes to improve.

JOHN LACY Born in Liverpool, he made his; first appearance v Millwall. Formerly with London University — has a B.S.C. degree. A member of the 1975 Cup Final team.

ALEC STOCK (Fulham's Manager)

It's always good to welcome Alec Stock back to Kenilworth Road because, as the longestserving manager in the Football League, he is widely respected as one of the best in the business.

Alec Stock, the manager, first hit the headlines in 1948 when he steered Southern League Yeovil Town to astonishing Cup victories over Bury and Sunderland. They eventually went down 8-0 at Manchester United but Stock and Yeovil had made their mark and those great feats are still remembered vividly by many thousands of people all over the world.

In August 1949 he was appointed manager of Leyton Orient and he built the side which won promotion to Division in 1956. He moved to Arsenal as assistant manager in 1956 but he was greatly disillusioned by conditions on the coaching side at Highbury so he returned to Orient within a couple of months. The challenge of Italian soccer was laid before him and he took control of Roma F.C. but he once again returned to Leyton Orient when they were in trouble.

Alec Stock finally severed his connections with Orient in March 1959 and three months later became manager of Queens Park Rangers, whose success under his able command was phenomenal.

In 1967 Rangers became the first Third Division side ever to reach a Wembley final when they met W.B.A. in the League Cup final, crowning a glorious day by winning 3 - 2. They also won promotion to the Second Division.

A year later they equalled Charlton's then unique feat of the 'thirties by rising from the Third to the First Division in successive seasons. Yet, having achieved all that, his reward was --- the sack!

Within months he was re-installed at Luton, fresh out of the Fourth Division. But it wasn't long before his Midas touch materialised again as the Hatters moved up to Division Two.

Since joining Fulham he has led them to an F.A. Cup Final. Now his aim is promotion.

'TAKE HIM ON

Little can be said or written that has not already been covered by the media on the subject of George and Rodney. The bulk of the words have been centred on their personalities rather than their abilities. Why have they star appeal?

Players that can accept the ball with good control and are prepared to dribble past opponents have become scarce. The art of taking the ball to an opponent and attacking the space behind, by individual skill has not been exploited fully. Of course, there are times to dribble and times to pass; that decision can only be made by the player in possession, he must have that sense of awareness that is so vital. Players with this skill need encouraging. The biggest fault of some well meaning, but misguided schoolboy coaches is to chivy the player who, in attempting a dribble when there is an opportunity. loses the ball. In time the player will become wary and lose confidence in his skill.

So the message is clear don't knock the young player who has the confidence to go past players, - encourage. Dribbling can be worked on in training, tricks can be initiated. Important guidelines can be laid down — when and where to use the skill. Dribbling destroys cover, opens up defences.

Highly talented players such as Marsh and Best can unsettle teams composure. Whilst good acurate passing will always be an excellent basic recipe for successful team play encourage and exploit to your advantage the boys who can "take players on".

At our club we have several youngsters with the ability to go past players, Ricky Hill, Lilly Fucillo, Godfrey Ingham, Nigel Johnson are just four who have the skill. It is our job as coaches to ensure that the abilities are developed, encouraged and exploited to the full.



Football is well established as Britain's national game and holds an unrivalled position as our top spectator sport. It is also one of the sports that this country has given to the rest of the world, but opportunities, for taking part in football at local level are being restricted by a serious shortage of pitches, especially in our towns and cities where land is scarce.

The lack of basic community facilities for football, and for many other sports, was one of the major factors which persuaded the Sports Council to launch a national Sports for ALL Week. The campaign aims to highlight the needs of sport in Britain, and also encourage more people to take part. Between 12 — 18 September, hundreds of events are taking place all over the country featuring over 60 different sports, all with something to offer in terms of fun and entertainment.

If football is to develop into the 1980's and beyond, local authorities must do more to reclaim derelict land for sports activities in general, and for football pitches in particular. More synthetic pitches must be provided — like those in London at Islington and Hackney, each of which can take up to 40 matches a week.

There must also be more sharing of educational, industrial and private pitches if our national game is to cope with the ever increasing numbers wanting to play. And taking part is what the Sports Council's Sport for ALL campaign is all about.

A LOOK BACK AT A DECADE AGO

FOOTBALL at all levels of the game was going through major changes ten years ago today. Players had been captivated by the success of Alf Ramsey's 4-3-3 formation which had won the world cup.

At Kenilworth Road manager George Martin was against changing the traditional line-up of the goalie, two full-backs, three half-backs and four forwards. But the Town players were dead keen, so he gave it a go.

Ramsey himself had gone on record with the view that his system was right for very good players, but suggested that teams outside the top flight might find it difficult.

The Town tried it at Barnsley, and lost 2—1, with John Moore the scorer. Martin promptly abandoned 4-3-3, but that was not to be the end of it.

On September 17 the Town entertained Stockport County, and announced that they were going to the back traditional team formation. Stockport came to Luton as leaders of the Fourth Division. They were unbeaten, and had taken nine points out of ten.

Their playing staff was looking a bit elderly, but bursting with experienced talent. They included Eddie Stuart, ex Wolves and Stoke, the Welsh wizard Len Allchurch, former Town centre-half Matt Woods, and the genius Albert Quixall. He had moved from Sheffield United to Manchester United eight years previously, for a then British record fee of £45,000

Stockport also included an industrious young inside forward Keith Allen, who was later to become a firm favourite in the Town's colours.

But in that game against the Town his major contribution was to be fouled by Gordon Riddick late in the second half, and Shawcross put away the penalty.

Lord had already netted twice, and the Town fans were getting dispirited at the constant failure to turn attractive approach work into goals. Stockport won 3–0.

George Martin let it be known that he was hoping to go into the transfer market, although he added the proviso that the Club didn't have much money to spend. And yes, that really was ten years ago!

The players were smarting after the defeat by Stockport, but clamouring once more to be given the chance to persevere with Ramsey's new-style formation.

Chiltern of the Luton News commented at the time that the formation was less important than the ability to score goals. Rivers, he said, was not the answer, Rioch had been too inconsistent, and winger David Pleat had "a very ordinary game" against Stockport.
