Luton might easily have been three up at the interval, though they had to be content with a goal by Husband in the 29th minute. Wolves, whose front men Kindon, Gould and Sunderland were largely ineffective, were on target only twice in the first half, both efforts coming from midfield man Daley.

They could have been further behind had Pierce not thrown himself at the feet of Ron Fut-cher and then pushed out a Deans shot for Husband to miss a sitter.

The energetic Hibbitt put
Wolves level following their first
corner in the 61st minute, but six
minutes later Deans hammered the winner into the top of the net—his fifth goal of the season.

Only in the closing minutes did Wolves look as though they might save it with Carr and Parkin pumping in good high crosses. Hibbitt lifted his head when he should have touched in the equaliser and then he crossed splendidly for Sunderland to head wide from close in.
