WELL it's a wonderful feeling to be sitting on top of the Second Division table even if it is only on goal difference above second-placed Chelsea. The goal difference rule has been introduced this season in place of goal averages and I feel this is a definite change for the good.

The Wolves could not have gone to the top with a better show than they produced last Saturday against Oldham and I must say that I was absolutely delighted with their five-goal winning margin.

I am sure it was especially thrilling for the players and spectators alike and it confirmed my belief that the side is beginning to come to grips with the job they face this season.

There is a danger after such a handsome victory that complacency could set in. I have warned the players about it and I hope that they are experienced enough to realise that there is no such thing as an easy game in any competition.

The name Sheffield Wednesday should provide them with sufficient unhappy memories and serve to remind us all that anything can happen in this magnificent game of ours.

Obviously, our opponents today, Luton Town, will have taken careful note of last week's victory and they will be endeavouring not to fall victims to us like Oldham.

Luton are a very sound side with several first-class players in their squad like their skipper Alan West. the young Paul Futcher and strikers Jimmy Husband and Dixie Deans from Celtic.

A final comment about Oldham. I was impressed with the way they played for twenty minutes when they showed perhaps more attacking skills than any other side to visit Molineux this season.

But our strikers, notably Steve Kindon and Bobby Gould, were in irrepressible form and I doubt whether any side in the country could have lived with us in our 45-minute opening spell.

While I am in the mood for giving out praise, I must not forget to give full credit to our back four. They also played extremely well against Oldham and so did Gary Pierce in maintaining another blank sheet. Our defensive work this season has been good and this is admirably illustrated by the fact that only three goals have been scored against us.

Brian Garvey, is doing an excellent job with our reserves, has been giving me glowing reports about their progress in the Central League. Like their seniors they have taken nine points from six games and I understand that their display against Burnley last week in the first-half was guite superb.

Their form is certainly encouraging and it should serve once again as a reminder that we have players, both young and old, who are just itching to be given their chances in the first team.

VISITORS LUTON



DECEMBER the 5th, 1975, is a date which is indelibly imprinted in the minds of every staunch and loyal supporter of Luton Town. For that was the day Luton nearly went out of business when they announced total liabilities of £724,000.

The present critical financial problems at Portsmouth and many other

clubs, worrying as they are, sound like chicken feed compared with Luton's staggering debts of nine months ago.

But perhaps other clubs can benefit from Luton's experience as the Bedfordshire club is now endeavouring to fight its way into the black.

It is a story of a bold board of directors, a fearless manager in Harry Haslam, a determined band of supporters, and, not forgetting, a playing team of character.

Indeed, when it was announced that Luton were on the verge of bankruptcy the side won eight matches in succession scoring 19 goals for to 6 against. This helped to turn the tide.

Manager Haslam, renowned for his genial and cheery outlook, despite the improved success on the field still had to take strict measures to reduce the club's overdraft.

Star midfield player Peter Anderson was sold to Belgian club Royal Antwerp for £55,000, Australian World Cup striker, Adrian Alston, went to Cardiff for £30,000 and young centre-forward Andy King joined Everton for £35,000. And only last month in a further attempt to regularise their finances Luton agreed to sell their senior professional John Ryan to Norwich City for a fee in the region of £50,000.

The transfers have weakened the overall strength of the club, but Haslam is now trying to build another team worthy of First Division status. During the summer he wisely spent £20,000 to bring Scottish international John "Dixie" Deans over the border from Glasgow Celtic.

Deans, who scored 83 League goals in 110 appearances for Celtic, has already made a tremendous impact at Kenilworth Road. Although the side have made only a moderate start, he has shown all his sharpness in front of goal scoring four times.

He is the leading scorer, but 17-year-old Ricky Hill, a promising local prospect and midfield player, is close on his heels with three goals.

Luton will most probably have Keith Barber in goal for today's clash. Keith, the supporters' "Player of the Year" last season, has unhappy memories of his last match at Molineux on Easter Monday of last year. Wolves put five goals past him and the 5-2 result virtually ended Luton's hopes of staying in the First Division.

Two of the back-four defenders — centre-half John Faulkner and the highly-rated Paul Futcher — will also have unpleasant recollections of that game. These two are the key players in defence and they have two new youngsters alongside them in the shape of Paul Price and Steve Buckley. Futcher, whose identical twin brother Ron plays in attack, is undoubtedly the aspiring young star of Luton. The club equalled their record transfer fee when they signed him from Chester for £100,000 in the summer of 1974. Four players are at present jostling for the midfield places. They are led by club captain Alan West, who was secured for £100,000 from Burnley in October

The other midfield contenders are Hill, Pasquale Fuccillo, and Jim Ryan. Luton's attack has certainly been strengthened by the arrival of Deans. The Scot lines up normally with former Everton star Jimmy Husband and the experienced John Aston. Husband was Luton's leading goal-scorer last season.

PROFILE JOHN ASTON

IT DOES NOT always follow that a son of a famous father will make a name for himself in the fiercely competitive field of modern-day soccer. But John Aston is an exception to the rule.

His father, John Aston senior, will be remembered as a classical English full-back in the old tradition with Manchester United just after the war. The outfit that Matt Busby (now Sir Matt) fashioned into his first great side.

Aston senior played 17 times for England and when he retired from playing he became trainer to United and helped in the formation of the next magnificent side to come out of Old Trafford. The side half of which perished in the Munich air crash.

Like his father, John broke into professional football with Manchester United, and he achieved international fame with a brilliant performance on United's left wing in their European Cup Final triumph against Benfica at Wembley in 1968.

He did not score in the 4-1 victory—Bobby Charlton (2), George Best and Brian Kidd grabbed the goals—but he destroyed their defence with a tantalising display on the left wing.


John's promising career at Old Trafford was to come to an end, however, when he broke a leg.

He was 25 when Luton manager Harry Haslam, a former Manchester United player himself, stepped in to secure his services for £30,000 in July, 1972.

It is a move that Haslam has never regretted. For Aston has been one of Luton's most consistent players ever since.

He is everyone's idea of what a left-winger should be and he is never afraid to take on full-backs before providing inch-perfect crosses.

If there is a flaw in his make-up and a career which spans 139 games for Manchester United and just over that amount now with Luton it is his lack of goals. At United he scored only 25 League goals, while with Luton he has found the net just 22 times.


FIVE GOAL NAP...

Mike has decided to charge the following prices for the game; Centre stand—£1.50; All other seats—£1; and 50p for the terraces.


He plans to make it a night for supporter's to


