# Hereford United

## HEREFORD UNITED CLUB HISTORY

Hereford United celebrated their 50th Anniversary in 1974/75 season and though they are the youngest club in the Football League, they have made tremendous strides since being elected in the 1972 season. They were Fourth Division runners-up in 1972/73, their first season in the Football League, and Third Division Champions last season, 1975/76.

Hereford United have achieved promotion to the Second Division quicker than any other team in the past fifty years, since the League was reconstructed in 1921.

Formed in 1924 they originally competed in the Birmingham Combination but switched to the Birmingham League five years later, and were elected to the Southern League in 1939. During their non-league days they never won a championship at top level but finished four times as runners-up in the Southern League.

Their forte was cup football and they set a non-league record by reaching the first round of the F A Cup 23 times in 24 years, before their election to the Fourth Division. They fought their way through to the second round 13 times during that period, the third round three times, and the fourth round once. In 1971/72 they were named Sunday Mirror Giantkillers after eliminating First Division Newcastle United in a

replay and then holding West Ham United to a goalless draw.

In 1973/74 season they maintained their fine Cup record when they were paired with West Ham United for the second time in three years and gained a 2-1 revenge after drawing at Upton Park. Before their election to the League they won the Southern League Cup three times, the Southern League Charity Cup and also reached the Welsh Cup Final before losing to Cardiff.

Hereford have always been fortunate in their choice of managers and since the war their affairs have been directed by the great John Charles, former Middlesbrough and Northampton Chief Bob Dennison, ex-Villa and Torquay United Manager Alex Massie, and three former Arsenal players Joe Wade, Ray Daniel and Colin Addison.

In 1974 they came under new management and the man in charge is former Bristol City assistant manager and chief coach John Sillett, ex-Chelsea, Coventry and Plymouth Argyle. His right hand man is Terry Paine, who, after 18 years with Southampton, moved to Edgar Street in July 1974 to take over as player-coach.

Hereford's motto is "Our greatest glory lies, not in never having fallen, but in rising when we fall".

**LES BRILEY.** Midfield. Born Southwark. Joined Hereford in March after completing his apprenticeship with Chelsea.

**ROY CARTER.** Midfield. Joined Hereford from Western League champions Falmouth in February 1975 and made his Third Division debut in the club's final match of the 1974-75 season.

**KEVIN CHARLTON.** Goalkeeper. Born Atherstone. He joined Hereford in June 1975 after helping the club win the Blauw Wit Youth tournament in Amsterdam and kept Hughes out of the side for much of last season. He played in 35 of the club's 46 Third Division matches.

**JOHN GALLEY.** Defender. Born Clowne. He has scored 152 goals in 390 league matches with Wolves, Bristol City, Nottingham Forest, Peterborough and Hereford. Hereford signed him as a striker in December 1974 but he was successfully converted into a central defender last season.

**DIXIE McNEIL.** Forward. Born Melton Mowbray. At the end of last season he took his tally of goals to 162 in 299 league games with Exeter City, Northampton Town, Lincoln City and Hereford United. Hereford signed him for £20,000 from Lincoln City in July 1974 and he has been the Football League's top scorer for the past two seasons.

**JIMMY LINDSAY.** Midfield. Born Hamilton. Played in all 46 league matches for Hereford last season and only missed one game with Colchester United the previous year.

**TERRY PAINE.** Midfield. Born Winchester. Moved from Southampton on a free transfer to become Hereford's player-coach in July 1974. He missed only a couple of league games last season to increase his record-breaking total to 797, which includes 713 appearances for Southampton.

**PETER SPIRING.** Forward. Born Glastonbury. He started his career with Bristol City and went to Liverpool for a £60,000 fee in March 1973, and was then transferred to Luton for £70,000 in 1974.

**BILLY TUCKER.** Defender. Born Kidderminster. He won Worcestershire county honours before joining Hereford as an amateur in September 1970. He was voted the club's Player of the Year in 1971 and 1973, and is the only player to win the award twice.

**DUDLEY TYLER.** Midfield. Born Salisbury. Signed in August 1969 as an amateur he was a member of the club's successful non-league team which reached the fourth round of the F.A. cup. Sold to West Ham United for £25,000 in July 1972 he returned to Edgar Street for £15,000 in November 1973.

## If you were the Referee...

### QUESTION:

A player taking a throw-in stands with both heels on the touch-line and the soles of his boots within the field of play. In all other aspects his throwing action was correct. Is a throw-in from this position legal?

ANSWER: A throw-in from the position described is quite legal as the law only requires part of both feet to be on the touchline or on the ground immediately behind it. In this case, however, the thrower is in danger of committing a foul throw if he should raise his heels in the action of throwing.

# LUTON REPORTING

## Coach talk in.....

Operating on a small squad of experienced first team players creates many problems for the manager and me. Firstly if players lose their form or confidence, we are not in a position to rest them, or to enable them to regain their form whilst playing in the reserves.

At the same time there is no spur to the players to fight for their places, as is the situation in a large club with a bigger playing staff. Some players in this situation become complacent, knowing how few changes the manager can make to his team. They are content to retain their place in the side, by playing within themselves rather than giving 100% effort in every game.

This makes my task more difficult for I must motivate these players to play to their full potential not only for themselves but also for the team.

When an injury occurs to an experienced player, we have a choice of three evils. One, to shuffle the whole team around to bring in a player with some experience. When this happens the whole balance of the side may be spoilt and our system of play may have to be changed. Two, to play someone out of position, this immediately puts this player under pressure, and the rest of the side knowing this, may try to shield him and may be drawn in to false positions. Three, to introduce into the side an experienced player. This last choice is the most difficult, as a young player coming into the side

too early may lose his confidence and form, especially if the team is not playing well and his progress will be retarded.

I have always believed in the old saying "A football club is only as good as its reserves", and as our reserve side is comprised almost entirely of young professional and apprentices it is imperative that if we hope to regain 1st Division status, we must add to our first team squad some experienced players, who will not only create competition for first team places, but will allow the younger players to develop and mature without undue pressure.

One last important point, we must hold on to our present squad of players, and if we can strengthen it, then I think we can have a successful season.

## ...the Club Doctor

*1. Although sport and medicine have been closely associated through the ages, it is only recently that sports medicine, involving sports clinics and doctors dedicated to athletes, has developed and been properly recognised. The aim of the sports doctor is to return the athlete or footballer to his arena of competition as soon as possible; that is with maximum speed of recovery and with minimum loss of fitness.*

*A very small loss of fitness or function to a professional footballer will stop him performing, but the same loss to a non-athlete does not matter because he can compensate easily. Football is a game of collisions and causes many injuries.*

*2. Most of these, such as a pulled muscle or sprained ankle, are considered as minor injuries, while other injuries such as rupture of ligaments or fractures necessitate going into hospital for specialist attention. However, all injuries to the athlete are serious because they interfere with the high performance and standards that are vital in sporting competition.*

*Throughout the season, in this column, the various types of injuries that occur in football will be discussed briefly so that every footballer, whether he plays at school, in the local park or at professional level might benefit and be returned to his field of play with the minimum of delay.*

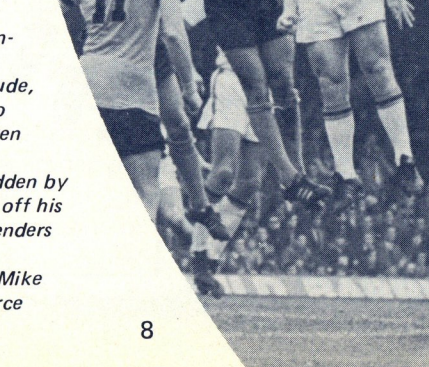

## All Our Yesterdays

A LOOK BACK AT LUTON A DECADE AGO.

SHOCKING away form was bugging Town Manager George Martin ten years ago today. On October 8, 1966, the Town went to Southport, and the only slight consolation from their 4-1 defeat was that the Town's goal, scored by Bruce Rioch, was the first scored away from home that season.

George Martin had admitted that he was trying to buy players to strengthen his

squad. A fortnight earlier, hope was bright when Tony Thear, a free transfer signing from Arsenal, scored twice on his debut, against Aldershot.

Five days later Thear got two more in a 3-1 midweek win against Rochdale, and the crowd was up to 6,435. Thear was being hailed as the successor to John O'Rourke, but the forwards hardly got a look in as the Town lost 2-0 at Wrexham and 4-1 at Southport.

Supporters could hardly be blamed for getting restive: the league tables ten years ago showed the Town 17th in Division IV, in a season when they started as one of the teams fancied to do well.

Stockport and Southend were battling at the top of the table, with Barnsley rooted to the bottom. Division III a decade ago makes interesting reading: Bristol Rovers, Bourne-mouth and QPR led. Down in the basement Middlesbrough were third from bottom.

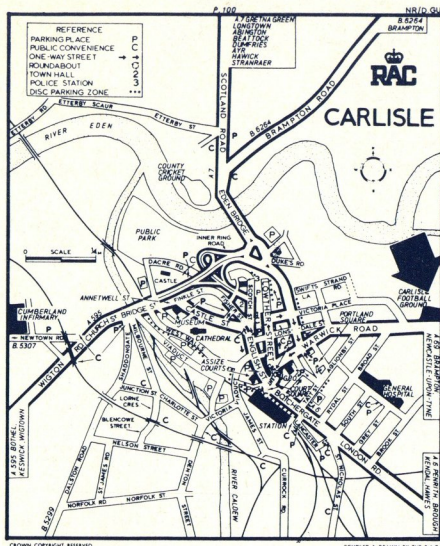

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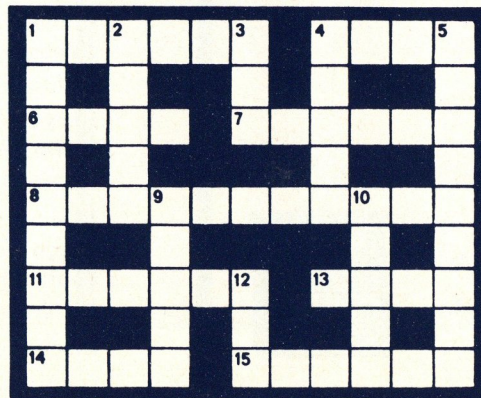
