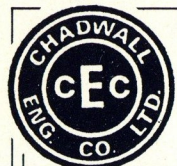

## Southampton Town

**IAN TURNER.** Joined the Saints when he followed Lawrie McMenemy from Grimsby to the Dell in 1974. A courageous keeper who has made 81 senior appearances and who last season kept 17 clean sheets including the FA Cup semi and final ties.

**STEVE MIDDLETON.** Born at nearby Portsmouth Steve started last season as first team keeper with 18 consecutive appearances before losing his place to Ian Turner. A sound technician who ensures healthy competition for the goalkeeping position.

**PETER RODRIGUES.** A fairy tale come true last season when Peter collected the FA Cup as captain of the team only months after being snapped up by Lawrie McMenemy from Sheffield Wednesday on a free transfer. An experienced defender who has a fine turn of speed and has played 50 games for the club.

**MEL BLYTH.** Came to the South Coast from Crystal Palace three seasons ago and has made 88 appearances at

the heart of the defence. Formed a fine centre back understanding with Jim Steele last season.

**JIM STEELE.** Moved south of the border from Dundee in 1972 and has played 179 times for his club. A fearless tackler who settled in well as a central defender after starting last season as left back.

**DAVID PEACH.** Brought to the Dell in 1974 from Gillingham for whom he played 186 games and has added to this 92 appearances in Saints red and white. After starting last season in a midfield role David settled down to give a constant performance in the left back position so much so that he was voted the supporters "Player of the Year".

**MALCOLM WALDROM.** Another example of the clubs youth policy. Hails from nearby Bedhampton and his ability to read the game and be accurate with his distribution will hold him in good stead as he is sure to be pushing hard for a first team place.

**MANNY ANDRUSZEWSKI.** Born locally at Eastleigh of Polish parents Manny is equally at home in the full back or centre back positions and seems certain to add to his 24 senior appearances made over the last two seasons.

**PAUL GILCHRIST.** After being in and out of the first team as a striker, Paul was moved by Manager Lawrie McMenemy into a midfield role and his performances were such that he has since commanded a regular place. Joined the club from Doncaster in 1972 and has made 133 senior appearances scoring on 24 occasions.

**JIM MCCALLIOG** Joined Saints from Manchester United in 1974 and has played 60 times including last seasons FA Cup Final when he put one over his old club. An experienced player whose first time accurate passing is a feature of his play.

**NICK HOLMES.** Born at Southampton and has now made 75 senior appearances for his home team club and scored on 11 occasions last season. Enjoys making penetrating runs from deep position.

**STEVE WILLIAMS.** Another product of the clubs youth policy, is certain to add to the one senior appearance he has made so far. Has a fine range of skills and shows a maturity well ahead of his years.

**HUGH FISHER.** Joined Saints back in 1967 from Blackpool, is the clubs senior professional, has made well over 300 senior appearances. A tenacious player who never gives less than his best and is still a great asset to have in the squad.

**BOBBY STOKES.** Has made 230 appearances for the Saints. Nearly moved to Portsmouth last season but had good reason to be pleased he turned down the offer on receiving an FA Cup winners medal. A hard working front runner who on his day can be a deadly finisher.

**MIKE CHANNON.** Over 420 games at his only club speaks volumes for this likeable International reckoned by many good judges to be the best counter attacker in the World today. Has scored over 170 goals in Saints colours and is certain to increase that tally considerably this season.

**PETER OSGOOD.** Can on his own produce magic moments which can win games. He has made 97 appearances in the Southampton stripes and with more consistency could possibly get back his England place. Always the joker in the pack "Ossie" is determined to help keep the club on the map.

**PAT EARLES.** Has progressed through the clubs youth policy and although having only made 11 senior appearances it would seem that his chance of a regular first team place is not too far away. Has a fine burst of speed and has been a regular scorer at reserve team level.

**TED MACDOUGALL.** Joined the Saints this season for £50,000 from Norwich after having had experience at York, Bournemouth, Manchester United and West Ham. Has been a prolific goal scorer and has scored over 200 league goals during his career so far.

## The Club Doctor....

IT can never be possible to eliminate injuries in a game of football which involves body contact, often violent. But intrinsic muscle tears, pulls and strains, are largely preventable since they are essentially due to technical failure of the athlete. That is to say the athlete or footballer must train diligently, develop his muscle balance and attain a reasonable level of fitness.

In addition to his development of technique, he must possess the ability to retain it under pressure of competition, since under such pressure, psychological or physical, then it is often a breakdown of technique and muscle co-ordination which can lead to muscle tears.

## All Our Yesterdays

A LOOK AT LUTON TOWN A DECADE AGO.

A GOAL-LESS draw at Chester might not sound like a soccer highlight. But it was ten years ago. For that result, on October 22, 1966, brought Luton Town their first away point of the season.

But there wasn't much else to cheer about. The Town were still struggling, sixth from the bottom of the Fourth Division.

England, however, still reigned supreme. On the same day, the side that won the World Cup met Northern Ireland in Belfast, and although Pat Jennings saved a lot of

goal-bound shots, goals from Roger Hunt and Martin Peters gave England victory.

Goals were the Town's big problem. They had gone through a miserable week before the comparative success at Chester.

On the previous Saturday they had lost 5-2 at home to Notts County. Tony Read had collected the ball from the net four times in the first 35 minutes, and Gordon Riddick had a nightmare at centre-half.

Alan Slough had been demoted to sub to make way for the debut of Frank Conboy from Chelsea, but still got a game when John Moore went off injured.

David Pleat, now the Town's reserve team coach, was brought into the side to try

Thank you Luton and good luck for the rest of the season.

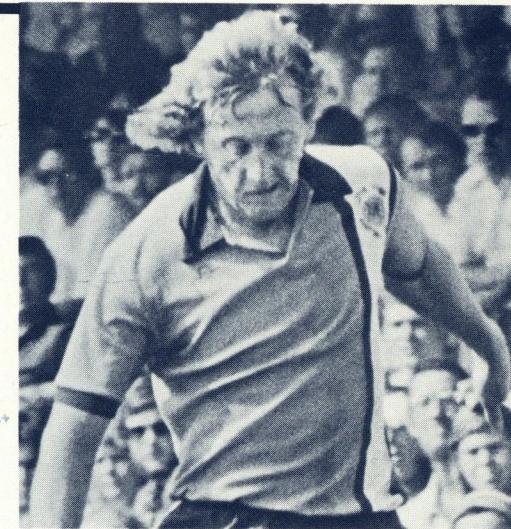

Paul is on the edge of the penalty box, partly obscured by Hereford's No. 2 Tony Byrne, and has just hammered in the goal that killed Hereford in the last home game. Paul had played 86 league games for Chester and the Town, covering the Fourth, First and Second Divisions. It was a goal worth waiting for, but Paul thinks it might not take another 86 matches to get another — "I like it to be a surprise for opponents when I move up into attack," he said. "But I think I'll try it more often in future."

At Carlisle last week, Jimmy Husband was on target again. Seen in typical action in the picture at bottom right, Jim has now scored three goals in his last four outings. He was leading scorer last season, and his sharpness in front of goal can still worry a lot of defences.

Bottom, centre: John Faulkner leaps skywards to get head and shoulders above rival attackers. Brian Chambers is the Luton man grounded, with Hereford's John Galley looking as though he had decided not to bother competing with John's aerial power.
