### Welcome to the Den

We extend a very warm welcome to our Visitors from Luton this afternoon. We last met during the 1973/74 season when the Hatters performed the double over the Lions, winning by the only goal of the match at The Den and scoring three without reply at Kenilworth Road. Luton gained promotion to the First Division at the end of that season, but twelve months later found themselves back in the Second. Looking back over the years, the Club was founded in 1885, the Hatters have had a chequered history. They have played in every Division of the Football League. In fact they suffered a rapid descent in the early sixties, dropping from the First to Fourth in the space of four seasons. They were bottom of Division One in 1959/60, bottom of Division Two in 1962/63 and relegated to Division Four in 1964/65. Luton's first major

success in League circles was in 1936/37 when they won the Third Division (South) Championship. First Division football came to Kenilworth Road for the first time in 1954/55 when they finished runners-up to Birmingham in Division Two. This success was followed a year later with their appearance in the F.A. Cup Final at Wembley. They had to be content with the runners-up medals, however, losing to Nottingham Forest 2-1. Last season Luton finished seventh in Division Two, five points adrift from a promotion spot. Their leading marksman in the League was Jimmy Husband, the former Everton player. It's interesting to note that amongst the list of Luton scorers last season is the name of John Seasman, now with the Lions. John scored just the one goal for the Hatters, but then he only had six appearances. Today's encounter is the thirty-ninth in League games. Of the thirty-eight previous games, Luton have won 13 and Millwall 11 with 14 ending all-square. Both clubs have scored an equal number

### WEDDING BELLS

Congratulations to John Seasman and his bride Nicky, who embarked on the sea of matrimony last Sunday. We wish them every happiness and blessing in the years ahead.

Victories over Orient and Sheffield Wednesday in the League Cup and Hereford United in the League: ten goals scored in three games; plus fine 4-1 victories by our Reserves over Cambridge United and our Youth XI over Arsenal, all added up to a very pleasant two-week period. More important, the manner in which all these results were obtained was most pleasing. Disciplined performances, especially against the robust tackling of the Hereford players, plus a confident approach by our Lads doing the simple and correct things, gave everyone satisfaction for all the hard work put in at the training ground recently. But such are the fortures of football. Last Saturday, we suffered a 3-1 defeat at Wolverhampton, whilst our Juniors went down 2-1 at home to Southend United. The game at Wolverhampton was lost in the opening eight minutes, as our opponents' initial burst gave them a 2-0 lead. With Wolves using only two men forward, and cleverly throwing men forward in fast breaks from midfield, we failed to reorganise our own formation accordingly and paid the penalty. Every credit to our players for their efforts to get back into the game but, unfortunately, once Wolves had added their third goal they were content to pull back every man behind the ball and at no time did we really look like getting on top of them. The recent First Division experience of their players showed us the level of play that has to be reached to be successful, but valuable knowledge was gained, and it is up to us to put it to good use. A slight change of formation and tactics for away trips is in order for, as we have said before, it will be points gained away that will sift the candidates for top League positions. The final



run-in during the last weeks of the 1975 / 76 season showed that we are capable of sound performances away from the Den and in spite of the improved calibre of the Second Division, we shall correct our faults and bring about an improvement in our away results. During the next few weeks we have many attractive and tough opponents, so the days ahead will be both interesting and testing for us all.

On top of the attractive League fixtures, we also have the added bonus of our visit to Aston Villa for our 5th Round League Cup Tie on the 1st December. What a night to look forward to, a possible 45,000 to 50,000 crowd, top class opponents, who are not only in the third position of the First Division, but have been in magnificent attacking form. Already, and quite naturally, many people are writing us off and such headlines as "Villa's next victims" are common in the Midland Press. Well that suits us fine for we are the underdogs and have nothing to lose, but Cup football has that habit of producing giant-killers", and being only 90 minutes away from the glamour of a Cup Semi-Final is just the incentive to our Lads. In recent years we have seen Sunderland, Fulham and Southampton all reach finals and two of these carry off the trophy against all odds. Our near neighbours Crystal Palace reached last season's F.A. Cup semifinal, so we wish to join that group of so-called "nohopers" and turn the form book upside down on the 1st of December.

Our Juniors gained a 1-0 lead over Southend United at Langley Park last Saturday, but a casual attitude, especially by the young professionals in the team, brought about our downfall as Southend equalised and then added the final goal of

the match to gain victory. Southend's desire to win was most evident and contrasted with our attitude to show how individually clever we were. It is especially important at this stage of their development that these young professionals learn not only the correct basics, but more important the correct attitude to games. Skill alone will not succeed, for determination and discipline are essential requirements if a team is to be successful.

A personal thank you to all our Agents and to you, the Public, for supporting our new Pool. I'm told that it is proving extremely popular and that we are averaging over 300 new Members each week. Naturally, we need more and more members to develop it fully, so if you do not purchase a ticket, let us know and we shall arrange for an agent to be in contact. 10p a week or the half or full year membership of £2 or £4 will give you the opportunity to win over £200 each week. plus other numerous attractive prizes, and at the same time help us to provide the facilities that we wish around the ground.

### Supporter's Letters

Mr. Steve Jones of 5 Newlands, Balcombe, Sussex has written to us on a subject we at Millwall all feel very strongly about:
"A couple of weeks ago Aston Villa

played Glasgow Rangers in a supposed friendly. I expect you can recall this match and the violence that accompanied it. The following day there were reports in most papers in particular a lengthy page 2 article carried by the Telegraph, and next to it a picture of a fan being arrested by police. A Villa or Rangers fan you would naturally assume, but no, it was in fact a Millwall fan at the Oldham match, nothing whatsoever to do with the article, neither was there a report on the game.

"However it wasn't until this Sunday (31st Oct.) that I was prompted to write to you. Looking for a match report in the Sunday People, what should I find, no not a report aclaiming the entertaining football played by the Lions under adverse conditions provided by Hereford, but just a large picture showing a fan being arrested and telling us that he was rugby tackled by a policeman at the Millwall/Hereford match.

'We are all aware of the relatively poor support numerically that the club gets, and again we know a lot of the reasons, one of which must be the infamous behaviour of a minority of the fans. The point I am trying to make is that this kind of publicity can only be detrimental to the club. Fair enough if it was relative to a report, but it wasn't; it was very unfair to print those pictures."

(Yes, we are at times on the receiving end either direct or by inference. Misleading is perhaps the word for it. Editor).

From one of our young supporters, who forgot to sign his name:

"I have some ideas for the ground and how perhaps we boys can benefit as well as the Club. One idea is why can't a part of the ground be made into a children's area where the smaller boys and girls can watch our team in peace away from our dads, where we can really let ourselves be heard when we cheer. It's nice going with dad but it would be nice to have our own pen, so to speak." Accompanying the letter was a small diagram suggesting where we could site the pen which is to the left of the players tunnel.

(This sounds a good suggestion and I shall bring it to the notice of our Grounds Committee - Editor).





KEITH BARBER: After five years of competing for the position, Barber established himself in 1975/76 season as Luton's regular first choice goalkeeper, and at the age of 28 had his best-ever season, winning the supporters club's "Player of the Year" award, the first time it had ever gone to a goalkeeper. He joined Luton in 1971 after being spotted by a scout playing local soccer in Vauxhall, London.

PAUL PRICE: Another player snapped up as a youngster, defender Price has had to fight harder than most to break through — he broke a leg early in the 1974/75 season, fought his way back to fitness, then broke it again. His determination overcame his atrocious luck, and he came back to make his début in Division II last season.

STEVE BUCKLEY: He was a freescoring left winger with Southern League club Burton Albion when Luton stepped in to buy him for the bargain price of £2,000 in the summer of 1974. Within six months he had been converted into a First Division full-back, and has been Luton's left-back ever since his impressive début. He still shows his old goal-scoring ability and his fast over-lapping wing runs and thundering left foot shot make him a lethal attacking defender


BRIAN CHAMBERS: A Geordie, Chambers made his name and reputation as a midfield player at Sunderland, and they collected £70,000 for him when he was

transferred to Arsenal in 1973. But he never broke through to the First team at Highbury, and Luton got him for £30,000 only a year later, when he was 25. He had a patchy start at Luton, flitting in and out of the League side, but finally established himself last season when he became a regular member of the Kenilworth Road team.

JOHN FAULKNER: Don Revie was the first man to give Faulkner his League chance: he was the centrehalf in the Sutton United team that played Leeds in an F.A. Cup-tie, and did so well that Revie, then Leeds boss, immediately bought him. But he was unhappy at Leeds, and a broken leg threatened to end his career. He overcame it and joined Luton for £6,000 in March '72, and has been a member of their defence ever since.

PAUL FUTCHER: Luton equalled their record transfer fee when they paid £100,000 for Futcher in the summer of 1974. He was still only 17, and with only a handful of Fourth Division games behind him with Chester, his home town club. But the big League clubs had already seen his potential, and Luton nipped in to beat them all. He has since become one of the most popular players with Luton's supporters: a cool, elegant centreback, with a marvellous football brain.

JIM HUSBAND: Joined Luton in November 1973 with a string of honours already collected with Everton. A Geordie, he was capped by England as a Schoolboy, as a Youth, and at Under-23 level. He



went to Goodison Park as soon as he left school, and became a Merseyside favourite in a ten-year stay there in which he hit 75 goals. Luton paid Everton £70,000 for his services and he was their leading goal-scorer last season.

ALAN WEST: Luton broke all club records when they splashed out £100,000 to buy West from Burnley in October 1973, and he and Jim Husband, who was signed a few weeks later, helped the club to win promotion to the First Division within six months. An England Under-23 international, West is one of the many stars to emerge from Burnley's "football production line". He comes from Hyde, in Cheshire, and almost went to Sunderland, Luton stepped in after that deal fell through, and West has become a mainstay of their side. Brilliant in his use of the ball, he has been club skipper since early 1975, and in his first full season with the club was named by the supporters as their Player of the Year.

PASQUALE FUCCILLO: Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford. Players and supporters at Kenilworth Road give this strong midfield player the nickname of "Lil" to overcome their difficulties with his tongue twisting name. But there is no mistaking his footballing ability: he joined Luton as a 16-year-old apprentice in the summer of 1973 and worked his way through to the League side. He scored on his début in February 1976, and shows every sign of being a regular marksman on his thrusting runs from the middle.

RON FUTCHER: Twin brother of Paul, and identical in looks. When Luton paid £25,000 for him, it was generally reckoned that he had been transferred from Chester just because the boys wanted to stay together. But Ron soon made his mark: be was thrown in at the deep end when Luton were struggling in the First Division and marked his début with a winning goal. He followed up with a hattrick in his second First Division game, and has since established himself in Luton's front line.

JOHN ASTON: Like his famous father before him, also named John Aston, John broke into professional football with Manchester United, and achieved international fame with an out-of-this-world performance on United's left wing in their European Cup Final triumph against Benfica at Wembley in 1968. Aston destroyed their defence, but a broken leg interrupted his career at Old Trafford. He was 25 when Luton manager Harry Haslam, a former Manchester United player himself, stepped in to secure his services in 1972.


