Lowly Rovers gave a spirited performance but Luton, who certainly did not look like promotion candidates, should never have let them recover from a very shaky start.

Hamilton, playing only his fourth League game of the season, was Rovers' best forward, but the powerful drive of left-winger Hooper was the biggest threat to the visitors' defence.
