One man leapt from the crowd but was pushed away by police, who quickly ushered Davidson into the tunnel.

Both as he left the trainers' dugout at half-time and again when he returned, Davidson's response to barracking had been the kind of gesture which has landed other soccer personalities in trouble this season.

Davidson, who could face FA disciplinary action, said: 'I was angry at the team for throwing the game away. The crowd were having

a go at me and I always have a go back. But there was no malice—I'm a coward really.

'When the police were taking me off I was play-acting.'
