

Todays Visitors LUTON TOWN

A fantastic run of nine successive victories lifted Luton from the middle of the table to put them among the promotion favourites. But it should be no surprise to anyone to see Luton pressing so strongly for promotion.

They were exceedingly unlucky to lose their First Division place in 1975, after only one season at the top, and both last season and this — even before they really started to click — they had that stylish touch that put them a cut above most of their Second Division rivals.

Their only serious problem — yet a most critical one — was their frustrating failure in snapping up chances.

Yet there's a certain irony in Luton's success for manager Harry Haslam who has one of the most unenviable jobs in soccer—the more he succeeds, the more likely he is to have his team broken up!

Over the past 18 months or so he has been forced to sell no fewer than 14 players, simply to keep the club's creditors at bay. In spite of this, he still has a team playing the sort of football which could win them promotion.

But here is the crunch. Because of the performances of two players in particular — defender Paul Futcher and midfield man Alan West — the club may be tempted to accept an offer like Newcastle's £300,000 for the pair.

While such a deal would virtually solve all Luton's financial problems, it would only lead to more frustration for Mr. Haslam, who complains: "I want to build another promotion team and to do that I need these players".

The pressures are off now that the transfer deadline has passed. And, of

course, the very real prospects of a return to the First Division have altered the situation to a degree. For if Luton do go up—and stay up this time—increased gates will go some way towards bringing their financial problems to within manageable proportions.

Harry Haslam really has had to prove his real talents in producing such a brilliant team against all the odds. He has played the transfer market shrewdly so that Luton have had the best of both worlds — they've dramatically reduced their overdraft without effectively weakening the team.

Mr. Haslam's incoming deals this season have included goal-keeper Milija Aleksic, from Plymouth plus strikers Dixie Deans, from Celtic and David Geddis, on loan from Ipswich.

Deans, who won many medals with the Scottish club, made a good start at Kenilworth Road but was then loaned to Carlisle. With Luton playing so well in his abscence, his chances of continued success at Luton receded and he has now joined Partick Thistle on loan.

In view of all the club's traumatic experiences over the past couple of years it is something of a miracle that they are not in deep trouble at the bottom of the table. The shock of learning about the club's true financial position did, however, strengthen the resolve of manager Haslam and his players.

They would not allow Luton Town F.C. to die; not even subject it to a living death. Consequently, Luton today hold their heads high and they are still sufficiently well placed to win one of the three promotion places.

Paul Futcher made a remarkably quick rise from schoolboy football to the professional game. He was just 16 when he made his League debut for Chester in March 1973, but little more than a year later he was transferred for £100,000 and being tipped for England honours!

Paul himself was shattered when he learned of Luton's interest. "When Mr. Roberts, the Chester manager, told me that Luton had offered £100,000 to sign me I just couldn't believe it. Think of it — £100,000. It's the sort of figure you read in the papers but it just doesn't really mean very much. But when he said someone wanted to pay £100,000 for ME, it made me sit up and think a bit. It took a lot of getting used to."

But he quickly settled down to life in the First Division, impressing most of the game's top strikers with his command in the air and his general dominance in the penalty box.

Paul's transfer to Luton was tied up with that of his identical twin brother Ron. Even after two years at the club, many of the players and training staff still confuse the two.

Paul Futcher is a very ambitious player and the prospects of Luton returning to the First Division again excite him; still modest in the extreme, though, he offers only the cautionary comments:

"I would feel embarrassed to say exactly what my ambitions are. People might get the wrong idea and think I'm too big for my boots, or something. Let's just say I would like to play a little bit better in every game and, if in the end I am lucky enough to win some sort of honours, then I'll be very pleased."

MILIJA ALEKSIC (Goalkeeper)

Milija joined Luton a few weeks ago from Plymouth for £20,000 after spending loan periods this season at Oxford and Ipswich. English-born of Polish parents, Milija developed at Plymouth under the watchful eye of ex-England goalkeeper Tony Waiters. He made his League debut in 1973/74.

PAUL PRICE (Defender)

Paul got his chance in Luton's senior side, as substitute, in 1973 but had to wait almost three years before getting another opportunity. Since coming in at right-back on the opening day of this season, however, he has held his place.

JOHN FAULKNER (Defender)

John first hit the headlines as a member of Sutton's fabulous F.A. Cup team in 1969/70 when they went out to Leeds. So well did John perform, however, that Leeds signed him a few weeks later and he made his First Division debut before the season had ended. Unfortunately, injuries severely handicapped him at Elland Road and Leeds allowed him to join Luton in 1971.

STEVE BUCKLEY (Defender)

Steve first made his way into the Luton side as understudy for England defender Bobby Thomson in October 1974. He later lost his place but returned in style last season, playing so well that there was no longer any chance of Thomson regaining his place.

ALAN WEST (Midfield)

Alan won England under-23 honours in his Burnley days, but after losing his place in the team which won the Turf Moor club promotion in 1972/73, he felt he would prefer to make a change. He signed for Sunderland but they, amazingly, turned him down after a medical check. Luton had absolutely no reservations and he has missed no more than a handful of games since signing in 1973 for £80,000.

PASQUALE FUCCILLO (Midfield)

Pasquale really came into his own in the closing weeks of last season when he took over one of the midfield positions and scored three goals in 14 appearances. Previously he had made only one League appearance, as substitute against Derby in December 1974. Pasquale served his appren

ticeship at Kenilworth Road.
BRIAN CHAMBERS (Midfield)

Brian developed with Sunderland but had the misfortune to lose his senior place shortly before their famous F.A.Cup run of 1972/73. He moved on to Arsenal at the end of that season but the Gunners gave him scant opportunity to show his abilities so he moved on to Luton on a £35,000 transfer in the summer of 1974.

JOHN ASTON (Midfield/Winger)

John followed in father's footsteps by becoming a big star with Manchester United. For several seasons John and George Best performed on opposite wings for the Reds, John's finest game probably being the 1968 European Cup final. He moved to Luton on a £30,000 transfer in 1972. Earlier in his career, John won England under-23 caps.

JIM HUSBAND (Forward)

Jim is Luton's top scorer with 12 goals. He made his name with Everton where he was for several years a first-teamer following his debut at Fulham in April 1965. While at Goodison he won five England under-23 caps to add to his youth and schoolboy honours. Jimmy was a member of the Toffees' League Championship side in 1970 and he was a member of their Wembley side beaten by West Bromwich in the 1968 F.A. Cup final. When Luton signed him in 1973/74 they had to pay a £70,000 fee.

DAVID GEDDIS (Forward)

David was such a big success in his first month on loan from Ipswich that his temporary contract was extended. David scored twice in his early games for Luton and looks set to become another young Ipswich player to make it to the top.

RON FUTCHER (Forward)


Ron was supposed to have been the make-weight in the deal which took him and his identical twin brother Paul from Chester to Luton in 1974. In fact, he has proved every bit as successful. As a 17-year-old he hit four goals in his first two First Division games for the club and last season he took over as the regular centre-forward and scored 11 goals.

The great European adventure is over — but there were many aspects which will not be easy to forget.

When it started, with that frightening first round against the French club Olympique Marseille, one was tempted to wonder whether it was all worthwhile.

The first leg at The Dell presented no problems, but the French fans made their Southampton counterparts pay dearly for the 6-3 aggregate victory as 'Entente Cordiale' became 'Discontente Crashiale'.

A lot has been said about soccer hooligans recently, but our thugs are still in the apprentice stage — thank goodness — compared to the mobile idiots of the South of France.

Marseille may not be far from the 'topless beaches', but I'm sure that in the town itself, going 'topless' means going without a helmet.

Their hooligans don't just run after coaches — they overtake them on mopeds and lay in wait at traffic lights and other suitable ambush points and their armoury ranges from pebbles to crow-bars and tiles to drain covers. But if Marseille was a nightmare, Northern Ireland in the next round was the opposite.

There was a couple of darker moments there, though. First the Saints party was stuck on its plane at Brussels Airport while staff hunted for a set of landing steps to fit and then, on arrival at the hotel, all the lights went out.

Now we can only hope that the lights come back on for Europe again in the near future. It was an adventure which no one regretted.



"SPOT ON AND EVERY ONE A PEACH"

The third day of April last year was the moment of truth for David Peach as he stepped up to take his first penalty in Saints colours. The match when his chance came was of course the Saints F.A. Cup Semi-final against Crystal Palace at Stamford Bridge when he finally sealed his teams place at Wembley by scoring Saints second goal. David has since that day scored on ten consecutive times from the penalty spot and although he has scored in important games this season against Anderlecht and twice against Manchester United he will tell you that the one last season in the Semi-final was the most important of all.

His penalty record at his previous club Gillingham was impressive enough with only one miss from seventeen spot kicks and he looked to be a natural successor after both Mike Channon and Jim McCalliog had failed on a number of previous occasions.

When asked whether there was a pre-determined area of the goal he shoots for his reply was "I make my mind up when placing the ball on the spot. The only occasion I have changed my mind was against Manchester United at The Dell this season, when some of the United lads were pointing to the side of the goal I usually aim for, so I changed and although Alec Stepney went the right way he didn't get a touch".

Out of the ten successful kicks David has taken, only Alan Stevenson the Burnley keeper has managed to get a touch. Although with tongue in cheek David says "perhaps if some of the keepers had stood still they might have done better".



Voted this season by the players of the Second Division as the best left back in the league David has since moving to the Saints three seasons ago given a consistency of performance that has made him a firm favourite with the crowd at The Dell, who could well see him emerge as the top spot kick king since the days of George O'Brien.

Although living in Southampton David is a part owner in a thriving retail fish business at Lymington which could well mean security when his footballing days are over, but in the immediate years ahead David has the burning ambition to help Saints back into the First Division, and bring regular top class football to a part of the country in which he now lives with relish.


