## CHELSEA GIVEN AR EASY RIDE BACK TO THETOP

THERE was little to suggest that either team could do well in the First Division when the Town stumbled at a major hurdle in the promotion chase on Saturday at Stamford Bridge and allowed

Chelsea to regain first place in the Second Division.

Chelsea, who had been run off the park the previous day at Fulham, were gifted the points by a Town team which showed hardly any fight.

The Town had a fiveminute spell of concerted pressure after Chelsea had scored their opening goal, but for much of the game the action was too tense and mistake-prone and confined to midfield.

Town players might have faced the chop if the reserve resources were stronger.

The defence came through well enough, despite having to be reorganised when a wild kick by Ken Swain caught Paul Price full in the face.

The young full-back was wheeled off on a stretcher, then given hospital treatment for severe concussion and double vision.

Graham Jones took his place, and settled down to underline his potential with a strong no-nonsense approach to tackling and the willingness to press forward to try to get the midfield moving.

Chelsea had already gone into the lead by then, after Jim Husband had lost possession in midfield to Ray Lewington. With the Town's back four

Jack Taylor's reaction to the Price incident left Town officials baffled: he gave a free-kick against Swain, but took no other action beyond supervising operations when Price was carried off on a stretcher.

Geddis, re-called to the front line because Ron Futcher had an ankle injury, found himself on his own for most of the game, and on balance the Town could be thankful that Chelsea did not score more.

Ray Wilkins wasted a chance he should have taken, and a mistake by Paul Futcher gave Swain a "goal" which was snapped up beautifully from an offside position.

The Town's only reply was a tame volley by Husband after a headed pass by Geddis. Bonetti clutched it under the bar with little difficulty.
