### 'First half an hour was perfection'

TWO points stood out in manager Harry Haslam's thoughts about his side's performance at Eastville: the quality of the soccer produced in the first halfhour, and the quality of the two Town goals.

"We clicked early and I thought we were near to perfection for half - an hour," he said. "After that we lived dangerously at times but on balance we deserved to win.

"In training you work hard to set a pattern, and to get players to perform up to the limit of their abilities. In the last three games that work has brought the results.

"Both goals were beauties, and it's particularly good to see the set pieces work out so well. We work for hours on them, and you can sometimes go a whole season where things don't go right on the day.

"Now they're coming off. Jim Husband's goal against Charlton was the result of one idea we had worked on and Steve Buckley's against Bristol was another.

"After Bristol had equalised they began to look like an away team. I think they decided they would do well to take a point from the game, and my impression was that they decided at half-time to close the game down and hold on to one point.

"We were always prepared to go looking for more goals, and that's why we sometimes let them come back at us. But the second goal released us from the pressure and I am in no doubt that the result was right."

ENTERTAINMENT: Very bright in the first half, but faded when Rovers introduced tighter marking and harder defence after the break.













