



I CAN imagine the feelings of those of you who turned up at Mansfield last Saturday only to see us play badly and lose. I'm not complaining about the result because on the day we were never in the game. Mansfield deserved to win, and good luck to them.

in some ways I wasn't surprised. You may ends.

have noticed that last week Manchester City, who have hopes of winning the First Division championship, lost at home to Leeds. Perhaps City and Luton Town both had reasons, if not excuses, for poor league performances.

The lads knew that they hadn't played well at Mansfield. We didn't put our game together while Mansfield worked at theirs. Certainly we weren't anywhere near our form in the Football League cup games with Manchester City. We won a lot of praise and respect, and the lads well deserved it at Old Trafford.

Probably the league defeat was part of the price. In three weeks we had played seven games: four in Lancashire, including two against City, one in Nottinghamshire and only two at home - and one of those two was against Manchester City.

Our priority now is to get cracking in the league again, starting with today's game against Stoke.

This morning's league table bears out what I said earlier in the season: the fight for promotion is wide open, and I still think teams nearly half-way down the table could Obviously we were all disappointed, but be there or thereabouts when the season

The funny thing is that while we have had a poor run of league results recently we are still nicely placed for a challenge on the top three places. All clubs have bad patches, and with the Manchester City games out of our system we have the feeling that we might now be ready to get back on a consistent run in the league.

Considering the fact that we haven't got a lot of players in the first team pool, I don't think we have done too badly. It was particularly nice to see Gary Heale score twice at Old Trafford after taking some stick for missing a chance in the previous game. And Brian Stein slotted into the side well for a debut that must have been a bit awe-inspiring.

The cup defeat was a disappointment, and probably the performance at Mansfield was partly due to reaction. But now we've got that out of our system. The great thing about football is that you start with a clean slate for each game.

We give a warm welcome to Stoke City this afternoon, and to their new signing Viv Busby, but they'll have to watch out: the only thing on our minds is to take the points and push ourselves nearer to the promotion

TERRY CONROY Eire International who commands the respect of defenders everywhere. Terry is a tireless worker who also has the flair to make 'something' out of 'nothing'. Has had injury problems in the past but has still been a regular in the team since making his debut in 1967.

GARTH CROOKS Another local product from Stoke-on-Trent he signed for the club in 1973 before making his debut in 1976. Earned a regular spot last season. Finished up as top goalscorer.

ALAN DODD Yet another local born player. He made his debut in 1973 and has progressed into one of the best defenders in the game earning several under-23 caps. Plays at full-back or in the centre of the defence.

DAVID GOODWIN Joined the club in 1972 and made his debut in the following year against West Ham when he scored.

DAVID GREGORY Joined Stoke from Peterborough during the close season for a reputed £55,000. Has been in League Football three years. PAUL JOHNSON Made his debut last season after four years with the club. Tenacious tackler and makes up for his lack of inches with his

ROGER JONES Arrived at the Victoria Ground last season after a career starting at Portsmouth and including stays at Bournemouth, Blackburn Rovers and finally Newcastle United.

JOHN MAHONEY Cardiff born. John joined City from Crewe Alexander ten years ago during which time he has become the most capped player in the club.

JOHN MARSH Has spent all his playing career with Stoke. A reliable and consistent performer on his day. He failed to gain a regular spot

PAUL RICHARDSON Another close season signing. He cost the club £50,000 from Chester and was George Easthams first buy for the club. He spent five years with Notts. Forest where he impressed as a player with skill and vision.

GEOFF SALMONS Joined Stoke in 1974 from Sheffield United for £150,000. Possesses undoubted skill but has failed to consistently produce it enough to warrant the fee paid.

KEVIN SHELDON Kevin is a product of Stoke's youth scheme. Showed immense promise last season. Made his debut in April 1976 and had gained a regular spot last year before suffering a broken leg at Leeds in November.

DENIS SMITH Made his debut in 1968 and is known as the 'iron-man' of the side. Skipper of the side he has been a regular for many seasons. STEVE WADDINGTON Steve joined the club in 1972. Made his debut in October 1976.

Our two scorers on that occasion were Peter Anderson now with Royal Antwerp and Alan Garner who is playing a significant part in Watford's success this season.

WE ARE also very pleased to welcome the Committee and Members of the Bletchlev Branch of the Bobbers Stand and Supporters Club who are sponsoring today's match and we thank them once again for the considerable efforts which they put in year after year to raise money for our Club. We congratulate the Finalists in today's Penalty Competition whose names appear on Page 15 of the programme and we hope that they will all enjoy the occasion and take away with them pleasant memories of the day when they viewed Kenilworth Road from a very different standpoint.

WE HAVE been overwhelmed by the number of messages of sympathy and requests for news of our popular defender Paul Futcher since his tragic accident on the 7th November. Letters and phone calls have been received from Clubs and individuals all over the Country and we are delighted to report that Paul is making splendid progress. He is out of the intensive care unit and is able to take the occasional short walk already. We are also delighted to

report that his fiancee. Miss Collette Jones has been discharged from hospital and we would like to take this opportunity of wishing Collette and Paul a very speedy recovery to full health. Paul has asked us to thank all those kind people who have sent goodwill messages and expressed their concern for his well being. Nor must we forget the magnificent efforts of the Surgeons, Doctors, Nurses and other staff at the Luton and Dunstable Hospital including our own Club Doctor, Peter Burrows who was involved in Paul's treatment virtually from the moment he was admitted to the hospital. Paul's absence from our team at this stage of the season is obviously a matter of concern but I am sure that he would have been the first to congratulate Jimmy McNichol on his magnificent display at Old Trafford. In fact the whole team performed heroically and those of us fortunate enough to have seen this match and the two earlier cup encounters with City will not easily forget the experience.

LAST SATURDAY we met two old friends when having our pre-match lunch at the Post House, Sandiacre. Peter Mead and Steve Litt were in the Northampton Town party en route for Doncaster. The Cobblers suffered a similar fate to ourselves later in the day when they conceded two early goals and ended up losing 4-2 to Rovers. AFTER THEIR tremendous away 3-1 victory over a very good Orient side in the F.A. Youth Cup our lads are eagerly awaiting to see who they will

be paired with in the next round. If we have the good fortune to be drawn at home it would be very encouraging for them to have your support and these matches are invariably exciting contests of high entertainment value. Godfrey Ingram again scored two typical goals, one a cannonball free kick and the other an intercepted back pass which looked harmless until Godfrey took off on one of his Olympic type sprints.

We often hear of former supporters who have ceased to visit Kenilworth Road for a variety of reasons. These include the fear of hooliganism, prices of admission and defensive football although no-one can accuse the Town of that crime these days. If these are genuine reasons and I am sure that they are in some cases. I would strongly commend the individuals concerned to try one visit when either the Reserve or Youth Team is playing. This season we have enjoyed some splendid football at both levels and for 30p a Combination fixture can be viewed from the Centre Stand. Parking is no problem and no charge is made in the Maple Road Car Park, Bring the children for a cost of only 15p per seat and watch the First Team Stars of the future. After all nine of the team that played at Old Trafford have come up through the Youth or Reserve sides and in many cases as recently as this season. Mention of Old Trafford reminds me of a comment made by the Secretary of Manchester United when discussing our 'gate' the other evening. He said that they were staging

a Youth match on their ground in a few days time and were anticipating an attendance of 15,000. It certainly makes you think!

Incidentally the Youth team is still involved in the Eastern Junior Cup and the Chiltern Cup in addition to the F.A. Youth Cup so hopefully there will be plenty of opportunity to see them unless we are out of luck completely with the draw.

OLD TRAFFORD ACTION

Football League Cup, Third Round, Second Replay:

Manchester City 3 Luton Town 2

WE DIDN'T quite make it at Old Trafford against the high-priced stars of Manchester City. But the Maine Road team, with hopes of winning the Football League championship this season, were given another hard battle before scraping through with an extratime winner.

And though we felt aggrieved at the two penalty decisions that went against us — the first put City back in the game after we had gone 2-0 up in 25 minutes — there was some consolation in the tributes and congratulations we received from many quarters for our fighting display.

Every member of the team played his part in making it a memorable match, with two in particular grabbing the headlines. The picture at the top shows one of the moments that Gary Heale will never forget. He had taken some stick in the Press the previous week for missing a chance at Maine Road, and the picture shows the moment when he silenced all critics: City's defence has left Joe Corrigan to stand alone against the Town's attack, and Heale is seen blasting in his second goal. Below left is the study in concentration as Heale hits the first. Bottom right: England goalkeeper Joe Corrigan congratulates Milija Aleksic, who crowned an incredible night's work with a super-save in extra time to Dennis Tueart's second penalty.



ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

A look back at Luton Town a decade ago. By BRIAN SWAIN Sports Editor, Luton News.

THERE WAS a lovely feeling of optimism and confidence around Kenilworth Road ten years ago today. The Town had just notched their seventh consecutive league win, and forced themselves into the top four of the Fourth Division, an anniversary present for Allan Brown, who had just completed 12 months as manager.

And for the first time, supporters who had been dead chuffed to realise that here was a side capable of winning promotion were being even more hopeful: it had dawned on a lot of us that the Town could easily be champions.

The previous Wednesday 14,973 had turned up at Kenilworth Road to see Swansea beaten 4-0, taking the Town's goal tally to 18 scored in the last four games.

Other clubs were sitting up and taking notice, with Bruce Rioch, Alan Slough and Keith Allen generally reckoned to be the major targets for the scouts, Billy Nicholson of Spurs, John Harris of Sheffield United and Alan Dicks of Bristol City were all in the stands to see the game.

But at half-time, the Town had failed to break through, and as Swansea settled down to defend hard in the second half the 100 per cent home record was looking rocky. But 14 minutes from time Graham French broke the deadlock, and there followed an amazing burst in which the score was transformed to 4-0 in the next seven minutes. Ian Buxton got the second, Rioch slammed in the third and Buxton completed the rout.

Swansea manager Billy Lucas complained that the first goal was offside and that the second had followed a foul by a Town player. But for us, it was another win to celebrate, and the team set off for Lincoln in high good humour.

Twelve months earlier we had been humiliated at Sincil Bank. crushed 8-1 in a performance that still lives in my memory as the worst I have ever seen from a Town side

But revenge was exacted on November 18, 1967, with Terry Branston again controlling a solid Town rearguard.

Ray Whittaker put the Town ahead with a penalty in the 19th minute, and although Pilgrim shot an equaliser Keith Allen made it 2-1 to the Town a minute before the interval.

Lincoln City threw everything into desperate attack in the second half, but Graham French scored at the end of a quick break after 73 minutes, and although Corner pulled one back four minutes later the Town held out for their third consecutive away win.

It put them fourth in the Division Four table, with 26 points from 17 games, only two points behind leaders Chesterfield, and with two games in hand. Small wonder we were beginning to dream about the prospects of seeing the Town win a divisional championship for the first time since before the war.

Speed, skill, bravery, ability to read a game, shooting, strength, team qualities, heading, etc. etc. — the list goes on and on. I always summorise briefly by telling them to look for something special, anything out of the ordinary. Never mind his faults, are his strengths exceptional?

A couple of months ago I read that Dunstable had been beaten by Edgware Town in a preliminary F.A. Cup round and a player named Stein had scored a hat trick. I contacted Dunstable's Player/Manager John Moore who assured me that, collectively Edgware were a young and useful side. I felt they were worth a visit and fortunately Borehamwood were playing against them in a mid-week cup replay a few weeks ago. By half-time I had convinced myself that the No. 8 had that something extra, an indefinable quality and that the No. 11 also looked sharp and direct with good potential. During the interval I made contact with the journalist from the local Edgware paper and he gave me their names and ages and also the place where I could contact their Chairman and Secretary.

Edgware, two goals up at half-time lost the game 4-2, outpowered physically and suffering from second half injuries. Danny Bergara was also at the game and he confirmed my view when we met afterwards. We had gone to the match independently of one another.

The following morning the Boss confirmed his faith in us when I told him about Martin Sperrin and Brian Stein and he asked me to put a price on them. This was not easy but the Manager's experience solved that problem.

Thankfully all the negotiations went smoothly and the players are now full professionals at the ripe old age of 20. This proves it's never too late to be spotted but both boys will have to adapt to full time play and the higher standards. They must believe in themselves and show 100% dedication if they are to become regular first team players. No-one will get more pleasure out of seeing them do well than myself. They have already shown that they are gifted and skilful players in the reserve games. We all wish them good luck and plenty of goals.
