ROD ARNOLD Goalkeeper. Rod was signed from Wolves in June, 1973 after being with the Club on two loan periods. A very agile keeper and guite experienced for one so young. An ever present in the side last

GORDON HODGSON Midfield, Signed from Newcastle United in June. 1974 for a substantial fee. Made a number of 1st team appearances for Newcastle, Was an England Schoolboy International and Youth International. Born Newcastle. An ever present in the 1st team for the last two seasons.

He was previously with Ipswich Town, with whom he made over 200 1st team appearances in his nine years with them. With Norwich he made over 30 1st team appearances in 1975-76. Born in Ipswich.

ERNIE MOSS Signed from Peterborough United in December, 1976 for a record fee of £18,000. Has settled in very quickly and led the attack well. Has always been a prolific goal scorer notably with Chesterfield, who he was with before going to Peterborough.

BILL McEWAN Bill was signed from Chesterfield for £18,000 equalling the record fee paid for Ernie Moss. A hard tackling wing half. Bill has settled in very quickly and certainly strengthened the midfield. Previous Clubs, Hibernian, Brighton & Hove Albion and Chesterfield, Scottish Under 23 International

MICK SAXBY Another local boy who joined the Club as an apprentice. Signed professional forms at 18 years of age. Made a number of 1st team appearances last season

IAN WOOD Another youngster who joined the Club as an apprentice on leaving school. Signed as a full time professional in June. 1976. Made 17 1st team appearances last season.

ROBBIE COOKE Was signed as an apprentice player and then as a full time professional. Made his debut last season. A young striker who shows promise for the future.

IAN PHILLIPS Signed from Ipswich Town in July, 1977 with whom he had been since leaving school. Was a regular member of their combination side. Born in Cumnock, Scotland.

DAVID SYRETT Signed from Swindon Town in July, 1977 for a fee of over £20,000. Joined Swindon as a youngster and made over 200 1st team appearances, and was leading goal scorer on a number of occasions. Born in Salisbury.

JOHN ASTON Signed from Luton Town in October, 1977 for a five figure fee. Previously with Manchester United with whom he won many trophies including a European Cup Winners Medal. Son of a famous father who also played for Manchester United.

DAVID GOODWIN Signed from Stoke City in November, 1977 with whom he had been since leaving school. He had numerous 1st and 2nd division appearances with them. Powerful built striker with a good shot in either foot.

TODAY WE welcome the Directors. Players, Officials and Supporters from Mansfield Football Club. This is the first league game between our two clubs at Kenilworth Road since Season 1969/70 at the end of which Luton were promoted to the 2nd Division and Mansfield finished in 6th place. Both matches that season ended as draws with John Ryan and Harrison scoring in the 2-2 result at Luton which was watched by a crowd of 12,690. In 1968/69 19.315 saw Luton win 4-2 in sharp contrast to the previous meeting in October 1964 which attracted only 2.874. On that occasion David Pleat scored our only goal in a 1-1 draw and at the end of the season Luton were relegated to Division Four whilst Mansfield missed promotion to Division Two on goal average behind Carlisle and Bristol City. That was the closest that our visitors ever came to rising above the 3rd Division until earlier this year when they impressively won the Championship by three clear points. In fact there have been very few league meetings between Luton and Mansfield and prior to 1963/64 one has to go back to 1931/32. Mansfield's first season in the league. After one year in the old Southern Section of the 3rd Division the Nottinghamshire club was transferred to Division 3 North and by the time they next competed in the South the Hatters had gained promotion to the 2nd Division.

Mansfield joined the league the same year as Chester replacing Nelson and Newport who were not re-elected. The following season Wigan Borough resigned enabling Mansfield to switch to the Northern section whilst the failure of Thames to gain re-election gave Newport the chance to return to the league after only one season in the Wilderness.

The trading loss before transfers had been trimmed to £34.024 compared with £52,275 in the previous financial year and the expenditure had been reduced despite raging inflation between June 1976 and May 1977. This had been achieved through careful housekeeping and reductions in both the playing and non-playing staff. As a result of these two profitable years the overdraft had been cut to £319.188 at May 31st and now stood at £260,000. However this was still considered far too high a figure and there was no room for complacency. The Chairman concluded by thanking all the individuals, Companies and Supporters groups who had contributed so generously towards the Club during this difficult period.





ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

A look back at Luton Town a decade ago by BRIAN SWAIN, Sports Editor, Luton News,

SUCCESS ON two fronts beckoned the Town in December a decade ago, with a wintry English afternoon being accepted as a Godsend in some quarters for an FA Cup victory.

Cup luck was not something we took for granted in those days. In the First Round of the FA Cup the Town were drawn away to amateurs Oxford City. The team travelled through a snowstorm to reach Oxford on December 9, 1967, only to have a wasted journey, with no hope of the pitch being playable.

Oxford wanted a postponement to a midweek evening, but Town boss Allan Brown refused on the grounds that the Oxford floodlights were not up to standard. City declined to move the game to neighbours Oxford United, but also realised that their chances of a decent gate were ruled out if they settled for an afternoon kick-off.

So there was some relief in the Luton camp when Oxford decided that financial considerations were important, and they agreed to switch the match to Kenilworth Road on the following

Even then we still had some worries, remembering a dreadful FA Cup home defeat to Corby a couple of years previously. And those memories grew sharper minute by minute when the game was played. Oxford concentrated all efforts on defence, with liberal use of an offside trap, and although the Town did all the attacking Oxford keeper Shippey was in inspired form.

It was bad enough at half-time, with the score 0-0 and home fans getting restive. But three minutes after the break things got worse. Terry Branston was being rested to help him overcome an injury, and without him the Town defence was not up to its usual form

Fred Jardine failed to cut out a cross and the crowd of 13.394 was stunned into bewildered silence as Woodley punished the error and put the amateurs ahead.

Oxford gained in confidence, but in the 62nd minute Slough was fouled just outside the box, and Bruce Rioch thumped the free kick through a wall which was amateurish, to say the least. Three minutes later man-of-the-match Shippey made his only mistake of the game, dropping a corner to allow Ian Buxton to score the winner and save the Town's blushes.

On December 16, 1967, it was back to League action, with Wrexham the visitors to Kenilworth Road. Their defence battled hard, but a left-foot special from Rioch broke the deadlock after an hour. Wrexham came out of the shell, and six minutes from time seemed to have saved a point when John Moore tried a risky back pass, and scored the sort of goal to make any striker delighted. Tony Read, however, was not so happy as the ball whistled past his shoulder into the roof of the net.

Fortunately Branston set the game to rights, heading the winner two minutes later from a corner by Ray Whittaker, and the Town moved up into second place in the Division Four table.
