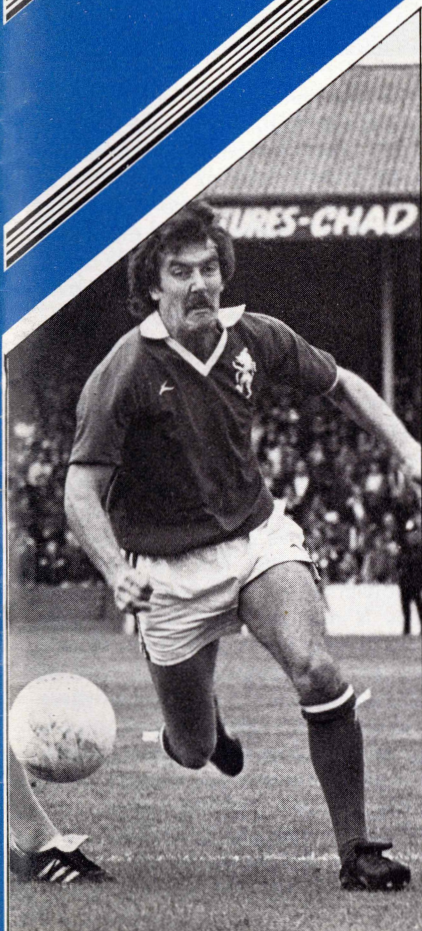

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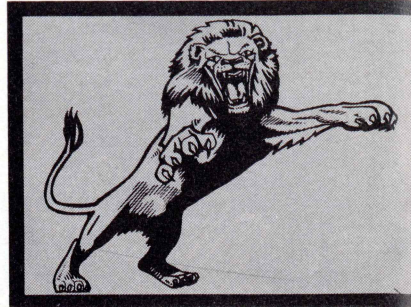

The postponement of our match at Stoke last Saturday proved less of a blow than it would have been because five of our six main rivals at the bottom of the Second Division lost their matches. That meant we didn't lose any ground in the battle and now have a match in hand over most of our fellow strugglers.

But from my personal point of view it was a disappointment because it robbed me of a chance of seeing the team in action. With two of our reserve matches having been called off during the last couple of weeks my chances of seeing all our players in competitive action have been restricted and therefore my first-hand knowledge of the squad's capabilities is not yet what it should be. That's why I was glad of the chance to get to know them better at Bisham Abbey Sports Centre where we stayed for three days at the beginning of this week. It was a very valuable experience because it is only through building a new spirit of togetherness and self-confidence that we are going to get out of trouble. It was also a good oppor-

tunity to introduce our new first team coach Terry Long.

But more on Terry later — my first task is to explain the departure of Terry Brisley to the many supporters who have expressed their concern about his transfer to Charlton. I was just as sorry to see him go but I didn't really have much option.

I have already said that when I arrived here three weeks ago there wasn't the best of organisation or atmosphere about our training. It had been a very unsettling time for everyone and it showed.

Terry came to see me last week and said that while he was willing to stay until the end of the season he was definite about wanting to leave the club then. The very next day Charlton came on with their offer. It has always been my policy to let players know if other clubs are interested for I believe that to be the fairest policy and much better than letting them read it in the newspapers.

When I told Terry he immediately wanted to leave and in view of our earlier conversation I saw no point in standing in his way. While it is no pleasure to transfer a popular player, it is no great advantage in keeping one who is obviously unsettled. On the credit side, it has given me some money to spend on the team and it will allow one or two good young midfield players to have their first team chance.

I have always maintained that the essence of a good youth policy is to give young players the reward of a first team place if they show the right progress and spirit. Getting them in the team early gives encouragement all round and we are in the position now when everyone at the club needs encouragement.

I am personally encouraged that Terry Long agreed to join us from Orient. As you know Terry was a very valuable player at Crystal Palace and worked his way up to becoming assistant manager at Selhurst Park. Having worked with him before, I know him to be a first class influence on players and he can be extremely helpful in establishing the training organisation and pattern of play we need to adopt. We want to play good football, we want to play successful football, and the only way to achieve that is by creating the right atmosphere among the players and giving them the security of a solid organisation around them.

Getting the management team right is a start to that and we are lucky to have someone like Oscar Arce with us. He will be looking after the younger players and I have found him to be a great fellow and an excellent coach. Until I have seen all the staff play it is very difficult to assess our strengths and weaknesses but with only 20 League goals to our credit it is obvious where our weakest department is. That's what we are working on and where I will have to seek reinforcement.

Today, of course, we have a break from our normal League programme for our F.A. Cup clash with Luton. When our match at Stoke was called off I went to watch Luton play at Charlton and was very impressed. They have improved a great deal since I saw them play Orient in the first match of the season. It is obviously a hard test for us but I am hoping that our session at Bisham will send us into this game in the right frame of mind to bring some Cup cheer to The Den.

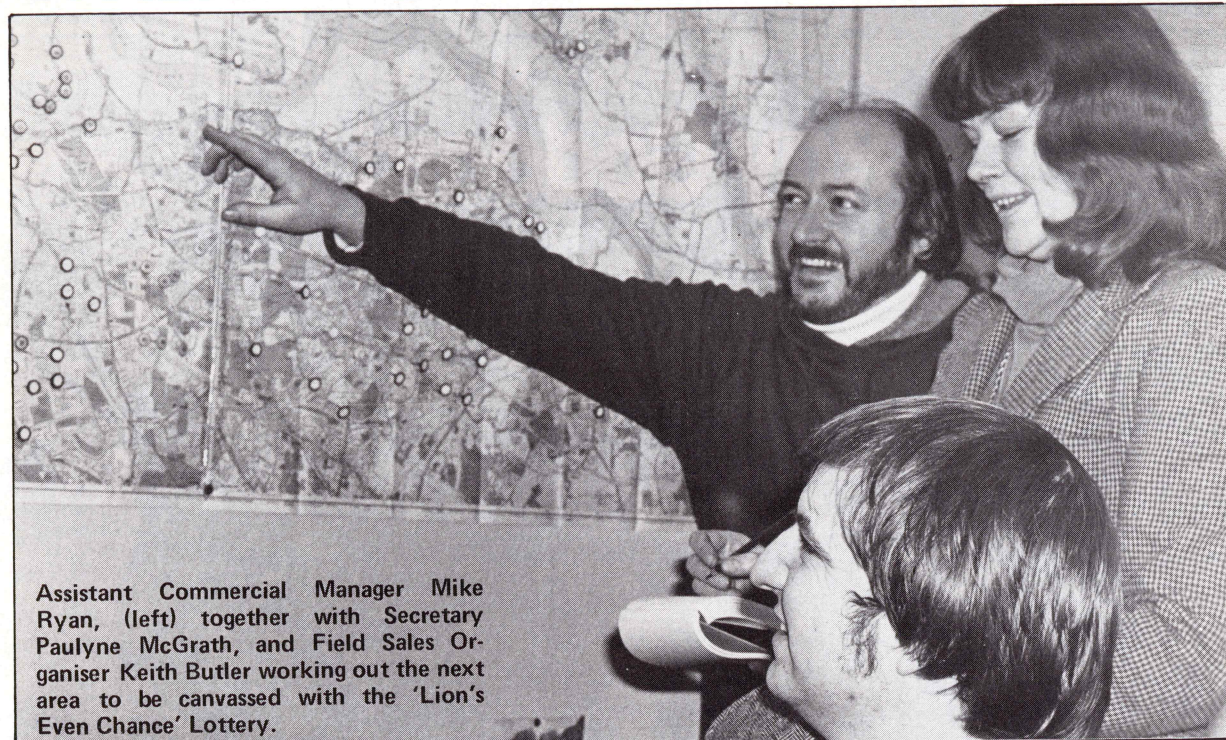

He played a major role in our promotion success in 1976. Last season Ray had possibly his unluckiest season of his career when he was injured on three separate occasions, but he still made 33 First Team appearances. When Nicky Johns was injured early in November he stepped back into the side and made eight consecutive appearances.

We extend a warm welcome to our Visitors, Luton Town with whom we have had a long association both in League and Cup Matches. Even before Millwall played in League Football when we were known as Millwall Rovers and Millwall Athletic friendly matches were played between the Lions and the Hatters results of which have appeared in our feature 'Keeping Records'. The first occasion on record when we met in a F.A. Cup Tie was in the First Round of the 1902/3 season when Millwall beat Luton 3-0 on their way to the Semi-Final which they lost by the same score to Derby County. Again the 1908/9 competition saw our two clubs matched at Luton and again the Lions triumphed 2-1. In more recent times the Lions beat the Hatters 3-1 in the 1973/74 League cup competition. Luton Town were founded the same year as Millwall 1885 and have a chequer-

ed history which has seen them play in every division of the Football League. The early sixties were perhaps the most traumatic years for it was then that they suffered the unhappy experience of dropping from the First to the Fourth in the space of four seasons. They were bottom of Division One in 1959/60, bottom of Division Two in 1962/63 and relegated to Division Four in 1964/65. Luton's first major success in League circles was in 1936/37 when they won the Third Division (South) Championship. In 1954/55 they finished runners up to Birmingham City in Division Two and for the first time in their history were promoted to Division One. A year later Luton met Nottingham Forest at Wembley in the F.A. Cup Final but had to be content with the Runner up medals. Luton have over the years been above average successful in the F.A. Cup and in recent years been among the leading

contenders for a return to the First Division. Until a few days ago Luton were managed by 'Happy' Harry Haslam, renowned throughout the football world for his cheerful personality. Now after nearly six years during which he took the Hatters to the First Division and back, Harry has travelled a bit further up the M.1. to take charge at Sheffield United where I am sure we all wish him the very best of luck. In the meantime Chief Coach David Pleat has taken over at Luton. After gaining considerable experience as a player, the soccer wheel of fortune turned full circle for David when Luton Town appointed him Chief Coach in January this year. He had been one of their star players a decade previously. Born and brought up in Nottingham just across the River Trent from the City Ground, young David was an outstanding schoolboy footballer, and was capped by Eng-

land at schoolboy and youth level. He joined Nottingham Forest straight from school, and moved to Luton for £8,000 in 1965. His speed and ball control made him a feared right winger but his career suffered a major setback when he broke a leg. After three seasons at Kenilworth Road he moved to Shrewsbury, where Gordon Lee was coach. He was transferred to Exeter, and while he was there he won his full F.A. coaching badge. He moved on to Peterborough and then became player-manager of Nuneaton Borough in the Southern League, where his playing career was ended by a back injury. But his three years of managerial experience stood him in good stead. Luton Manager Harry Haslam engaged him as coach to the Kenilworth Road reserve team, and when Luton lost chief coach Roy McCrohan to American Club Detroit Express last Christmas David Pleat was well prepared to step up into the top coaching appointment. Now what — well David is in charge at the moment and that's the first step,

MILIJA ALEKSIC: Luton paid £20,000 to Plymouth in January 1977 for Aleksic's services, and the fee turned out to be a bargain. Aged 24, he was unsettled at Plymouth, and the move to Luton turned out to be the turning point in his career. Son of Yugoslav parents, but born in the North of England, he broke into football as a part-timer with Stafford Rangers. He quickly became a firm favourite at Luton, where the locals call him "Elastic" in tribute to his agility and quick reflexes.

PAUL PRICE: His hopes of a career in League soccer had to overcome a double disaster before he made the grade — recruited by Luton as a youngster he was on the verge of success when he broke his leg. He fought his way back to fitness, only to break it again. He battled back again, and his performances at right back have made him Luton's first-choice at right back ever since.

RICKY HILL: A midfield player who has excited attention all over the country, Hill had a fairy-tale start to his League career. Signed as an apprentice from schools football in North London, he made it into the League team within a year and celebrated his debut by scoring once and laying on another goal. Now 19, he has been capped by England at youth level.

JOHN FAULKNER: Luton's senior pro. and vice captain, he has given Luton sterling service since they paid £6,000 for him in March 1972. He emerged from obscurity as centre-half in the

Sutton United team that played Leeds. Don Revie signed him on, but a broken leg interrupted his career at Elland Road. Strong in the air and a no-nonsense tackler, he has been a regular member of the Luton defence for five years.

PAUL FUTCHER: One of the brightest prospects in League football today, Luton risked their record transfer fee when they paid £100,000 for him in the summer of 1974. He was still only 17, and with only a handful of Fourth Division games behind him. Luton beat off opposition from bigger clubs to persuade him to leave Chester, his home town club, and he has developed into a brilliant sweeper, cool in defence and far-seeing in setting up attacks. He has already been capped by England at under-21 level, and Luton supporters are convinced that full international honours are just round the corner. Still only 20, he was one of the players described by Don Revie as "an outstanding prospect" when the ex-England manager looked back on his experiences with the national side.

JIM HUSBAND: Joined Luton in November 1973 with a string of honours already collected with Everton, and has served Luton with distinction. He plays as an attacking midfielder or as a front runner, and has provided a regular supply of goals. A Geordie, he was capped by England as a schoolboy, as a youth, and at under-23 level, and hit 75 goals for Everton before moving to Luton for a £70,000 fee.

GRAHAM JONES: Watched by a Luton scout while playing as a schoolboy in Manchester, Jones was signed as an apprentice in the summer of 1975. Big and brave, he made rapid strides through Luton's lower teams, and made his League debut at the age of 17. Originally played as a back four defender, he has also sampled League soccer in midfield, and seems equally at home whatever the department.

RON FUTCHER: Twin brother of Paul and identical in looks. When Luton paid £25,000 for him it was thought that he had been transferred from Chester because the boys wanted to be together, but Ron soon made his mark with a hat-trick in his second 1st Division game and has since established himself in Luton's front line.

PASQUALE FUCCILLO: Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford, midfield dynamo Fuccillo — "Lil" to his friends and the Luton fans — joined Luton as a 16-year-old apprentice in the summer of 1973. Strong on the ball, he made his

name with some storming midfield displays, and marked his League debut with a goal and has been a regular marksman ever since.

PHIL BOERSMA: It was the end of a patient search for talent by Luton boss Harry Haslam when he signed striker Boersma from Middlesbrough in July 1977. Three years previously Haslam had tried to persuade Liverpool to part with the player. He failed, and later went to Middlesbrough, and Haslam finally got his man two years later. Middlesbrough used him as a midfielder man but for Luton Boersma operates as a free-running attacker, with goals the main priority.

ALAN WEST: Luton's club captain and a brilliant midfield man, West is one of the many stars to emerge from the "production line" of Burnley. An England Under-23 international, he joined Luton for £100,000 from Burnley in October 1973. Still only 25, he is capable of turning defences inside-out with accurate passes.

TIM SMITH: Now in his third season with the Town. Plays mid-field but likes to come forward and score goals. Has had one outing in the first team so far but if he plays as well as the Manager knows he can then it won't be long before he will be in the senior side. Hails from Hereford.

BRIAN STEIN: Signed as a professional on 19th October 1977 and in less than three weeks had made his debut at Old Trafford in the League Cup replay against Manchester City. Born in Cape Town but educated in London, Brian previously played for Edgware Town in the Athenian League where his speed and skill on the wing prompted Luton to offer him terms.

MARTIN SPERRIN: Also signed on 19th October 1977 from Edgware Town, Martin, like Brian Stein, only had a couple of reserve games, scoring two goals before coming on as substitute in the Cup replay against Manchester City. Normally occupies the No. 10 position as his father did for several years with Brentford in the 1950's.

GODFREY INGRAM: A local product of Luton's youth teams, Ingram has been tipped for high honours since his outstanding midfield and attacking talents took him into Luton's reserve team when he was still only 16. Luton signed him on schoolboy forms, and he played for England Schools. He became an apprentice in the summer of 1976, and within a year had been upgraded to junior professional.

BY CAR TO SOUTHAMPTON

Saturday, 11th February, 1978 Kick-off 3 p.m.

Approximately 84 miles from New Cross
Compiled by the Royal Automobile Club

Leave from Queens Road to the one way system at Peckham. Follow the one way via Rye Lane and Peckham High Street to the one way system at Camberwell Green. Follow the one way via Grove Lane and Daneville Road to Coldharbour Lane. Continue ahead by Coldharbour Lane to the junction with Effra Road. Turn left and follow the signs via the one way system to Acre Lane and Clapham Common (North Side). Continue by the signposted route "South Circular, Wandsworth" via Battersea Rise and High Street to the South Circular (A.205). Follow the A.205 via Clifford Avenue to the roundabout. Leave by the A.316 and continue to the next roundabout and again continue ahead via Hanworth Flyover to the Intersection with the M.3. Continue by the M.3 - following the signs "South West, Southampton, Basingstoke M.3" to Basingstoke By-Pass. Follow the signs "South West, Southampton" to the end of the motorway and the junction with the A.33. Continue by the signposted route "A.33 Winchester and Southampton" and follow the A.33 to Southampton 84 Miles.

Enter Southampton by The Avenue (A.33) and follow the signs to the football ground.

There is parking space available near the ground and some street parking is allowed but controlled by the police, so watch for any special signs, including diversions.

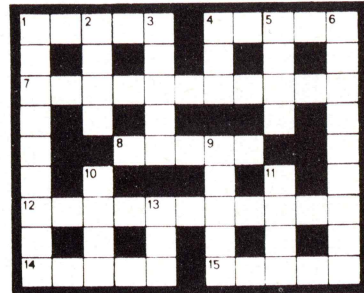

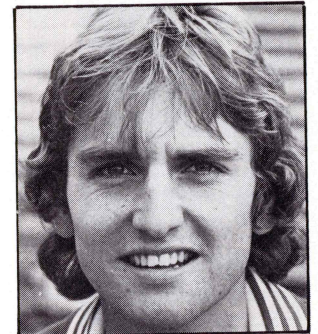
MEDAL WINNERS

Although Millwall have never won the F.A. Cup, or the Football League Cup, quite a few holders of medals have appeared in our colours over the years. Cup winning medalists to join Millwall included Jack Pearson (West Bromwich Albion), Jim Standen (West Ham), Frank Saul (Tottenham Hotspur), Jim Richardson, who caused controversy when middling the ball "from over the line" for Allen to score against Arsenal, who lost 2-1 to Newcastle; Pat Saward who began his career at The Den won his medal playing for Aston Villa. Two keepers, Malcolm Finlayson and Alex Stepney collected medals after leaving Millwall for Wolverhampton and Manchester United respectively. Gordon Hill collected his after leaving us for Manchester United. League Cup medalists, Dennis Burnet, Jim Standen and Brian Dear all won winners medals with West Ham before coming to Millwall, and currently in the Lions side Tony Hazell won his medal when with Queens Park Rangers.
