**TONY BURNS (Goalkeeper)** recalled to 1st team duty half way through last season when Paul Hammond left for America. Tony made 20 league appearances to help clinch promotion back to the second division. He is himself shortly going to America.

**JOHN BURRIDGE (Goalkeeper)** Signed from Aston Villa just before the transfer deadline after being on loan at Southend. Previously with Blackpool.

**PAUL HINSELWOOD (Defender)** Back four player made 49 appearances in Palace 1st team last season. Bristol born, joined Palace as a schoolboy and made 20 first team appearances as a Striker before converting successfully to a Defensive role.

**KEN SANSOM (Defender)** Captained England Youth International team and ever present in Palace 1st team last season. 55 Appearances plus 6 in F.A. Youth Cup winning team – voted Palace "Player of the Year".

**JIM CANNON (Defender)** Glasgow born and Scottish Youth International ever present last season in centre of defence after playing left back throughout the previous season.

**PHIL HOLDER (Midfield)** 47 appearances last season showing fine form. London born joined Palace from Spurs February 1975.

**GEORGE GRAHAM (Midfield)** Joined Palace from Portsmouth last season and made 26 appearances showing the skill he was renowned for with Scotland and Arsenal.

**NICK CHATTERTON (Midfield)** A regular for Palace over last 3 seasons. Nick is a Londoner and joined Palace from school. His father is groundsman at Selhurst Park.

**BARRY SILKMAN (Forward)** Joined Palace in August 1976 on free transfer from Hereford United. Made 28 cup and league appearances.

**RACHID HARKOUK (Striker)** London born. Joined Palace in 1976 from non-league Feltham. Made an impact with some fine goals in a tally of 13 from 26 full appearances.

**DAVE SWINDLEHURST (Striker)** London born England Youth International. Made 51 appearances and was again a leading scorer for Palace with 13 goals.

**VINCE HILAIRE (Striker)** London born English Youth International. Member of the Palace F.A. Youth Cup winning team. Made 3 league appearances as a substitute last season but is now established.

**PETER NICHOLAS (Defender)** Welsh Youth International. Member of F.A. Youth Cup team and regular central defender in reserve side. Played for 1st team in friendly, and since got a regular place.

**IAN WALSH (Striker)** Member of F.A. Youth Cup team and current Welsh Youth International. Made his 1st team debut in 1976 in league cup and made one league appearance last season.

# LUTON LATEST

TODAY WE extend a very warm welcome to our visitors from South London Crystal Palace. Adversaries for many years in the old Southern League both our Clubs were founder members of the 3rd Division in 1920/21 and the Palace won the Championship in that first season by five clear points from Southampton with ourselves in ninth place. Four years of struggle culminated in relegation at the end of 1924/25 when league contests between our clubs resumed. Although runners-up on three occasions, 1929, 1931 and 1939, Palace could not clinch the Championship and only promotion place again and eventually, in 1958, they had the dubious distinction of becoming founder members again, this time of the Fourth Division. In their third season they achieved promotion by finishing as runners-up to Peterborough in the latter's first ever Football League campaign and three years later they regained 2nd Division status which they had last held forty years earlier. The League paths of Luton and Palace crossed but twice during this period and the fact that the latter were aiming for the top whilst the "Hatters" were destined to travel in the opposite direction was reflected in the scores. After a four nil home defeat at Kenilworth Road, the 1-1 draw at Selhurst must have come as quite a relief. In fact Luton had the lead at half-time through a goal by Freddie Jardine, then operating on the wing. Five Second Division years ended in 1969 when Crystal Palace accompanied Derby County into Division 1 for the first time in their history and most of South London flocked to Selhurst Park. In their first season only one place separated the newcomers from relegation and they again finished in 20th place two years later. The following season there was to be no escape and along with West Bromwich Albion they slipped back into Division Two. In 1973/74 Luton and Crystal Palace were to meet again in one of those situations where one team is destined to rise and another fall only this time the roles were reversed compared to a decade earlier. The "Hatters" achieved the 'double' with two desperately close 2-1 victories which helped them into

Division 1 and Palace, despite a valiant rear-guard action became a victim of the new three up and three down rule and once again dropped into the 3rd Division.

Including the 3-3 draw at Selhurst last Boxing Day our two Clubs have now met in no fewer than thirty-one Football League encounters with Luton's record reading as follows:— Played 31, Won 11, Lost 11, Drawn 9, Goals for 62, Goals against 62.

Records just don't come any closer than that! In over 40 years Palace have won only twice at Kenilworth Road, 2-1 in 1930/31 and 4-0 in 1963/64 and only on the former occasion did they complete the double. Luton's two victories at Selhurst both came in promotion years, 4-0 in 1936/37 and 2-1 in 1973/74 and on both occasions we were also successful at home, 5-2 in the former case and 2-1 four years ago through goals by Peter Anderson and Barry Butlin. Luton's largest victories were by six goals to nil in 1935/36 and by six goals to one in 1927/28 whilst our opponents avenged one of those defeats by winning 5-1 in 1935/36. The only other match in which they scored five goals against us was in 1930/31 when we could also manage only one in reply. On two occasions the aggregate number of goals has reached twelve for the two matches and after the six goal thriller on December 29th we are half way to equaling that record.

Terry made 16 first team appearances for Palace in season 1974/75 before becoming first team coach, a move which prompted Manager Malcolm Allison to state that Terry was one of the few top players who would become an even better Manager. On Malcolm's departure at the end of the 1975/76 season, Terry became Manager and took Palace back to the Second Division in his first season.

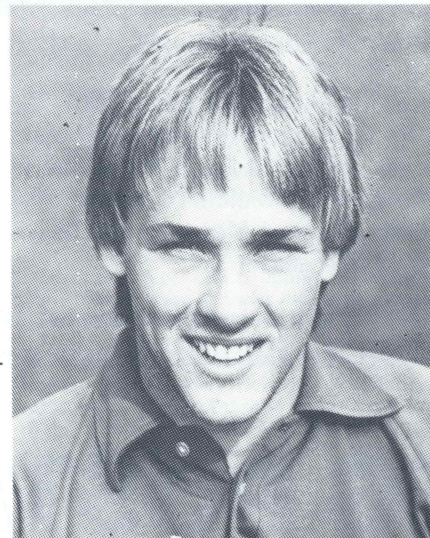

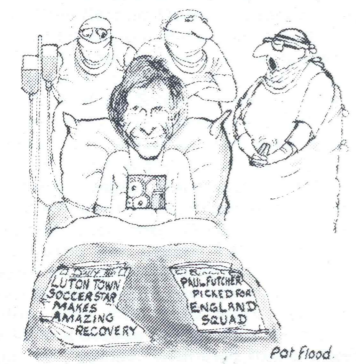

# ANATOMY OF A GOAL

## Luton Town 4 Blackpool 0

*THE TEAM* responded well to Manager David Pleat's calls for more effort and an improved team spirit. He said before the game that Blackpool were likely to catch the backlash as the side got previous poor form out of its system, and how right he was!

Blackpool boss Jimmy Meadows sportingly admitted afterwards that we well deserved our success, but was puzzled by the fact that we scored only once in the first half, then had to wait for a late burst to make the points safe.

They were all good goals, but as in most games the first was the crucial one. If Blackpool could have hung on until half-time we might have faced a harder task after the interval.

In the event, although only one was scored in the first half, it was a beauty and our pictures show how Blackpool's attempt to defend in depth was foiled by Alan West's 39th-minute header.

On the left Ron Futchter rises well to reach a cross on the far post and send the ball back across the face of the goal — and notice how far from the goalmouth Alan West is, just behind Brian Stein.

John Faulkner had got round the defence almost to the goal-line beyond the other post, and headed the ball back.

On the right is the scene in the crowded goalmouth as West dives in to score. You can just see him between Paul Price and Blackpool's No. 6 Peter Suddaby. Full-back Paul Gardner is the defender making a vain attempt to head clear on the line.

## ALL OUR YESTERDAYS

A look back at Luton Town a decade ago.

HALF THE Third and Fourth Division clubs in the country decided to postpone kick-off until the evening ten years ago this week. The problem, they decided, was that the Grand National was on the telly live from Aintree, and that Saturday afternoon crowds would be thin.

But here at Kenilworth Road, with confidence sky high, the Town stuck to the normal 3.00 pm kick-off time. And naturally, it belted with rain and the crowd for the visit of promotion rivals Aldershot attracted only 10,618 – and in those days, with the Town storming towards the Fourth Division championship, that was a disappointing gate!

In the event the game was also disappointing, although the Town duly won 3-1 to complete the double over Aldershot.

They started at whirlwind pace, and it looked as though there would be a riot of scoring in the mud. Bruce Rioch hammered in the first goal – a drive deflected off a defender's legs, when the match was only a minute old, and in the next ten minutes the Aldershot goal survived miraculously as Rioch, Keith Allen, Ian Buxton and Graham French all went close.

Rioch made it 2-0 after 19 minutes, at the end of a brilliant passing move involving Allen, Mickey Brown, George Potter and Fred Jardine.

But nine minutes later we were shaken when Aldershot produced a quick break led by Jack Howarth and the Town defence was in a terrible tangle as Gowans reduced the arrears.

Some of the tackling got a bit wild as the game deteriorated, but the referee was noticeably firm and quick to act, and the Town eventually weathered the storm after Brown knocked in the third goal in the 64th minute.

And when the match ended there was the rare sight and sound of the crowd applauding the young referee off the park after he himself had applauded both teams for their efforts in the mud.

The man in black is still contributing his personality to soccer – his name was Roger Kirkpatrick, of Leicester.

There were some other well-known names in the sports pages of that day, March 30, 1968. It was FA Cup quarter-finals day. Birmingham beat Chelsea 1-0 with a goal by Fred Pickering. Paul Madeley was the scorer as Leeds beat Sheffield United 1-0. Leicester City, prompted by Rod Fern, got a 1-1 draw with Everton with David Nish and Jim Husband the scorers, while West Brom and Liverpool couldn't manage a goal between them.

In the First Division Nottingham Forest were crushed 3-0 at home by Sunderland, and up at Stoke a 19-year-old university student named Alan Gowling made his league debut and scored to help Manchester United to a 4-2 victory. George Eastham was on the same score-sheet, and so was George Best.

And to finish off the list of the day's top names the Grand National was won by Red Alligator at 100-7.

## YOUTH

THE YOUTH team, finding themselves with a free Saturday from league or Cup duty, arranged a game v Bedfordshire Under 17. This not only allowed us to play several trialists but it also helped the Bedfordshire Youth F.A. in assessing boys for their representative sides. The Luton boys won 3 goals to 0, all the goals being scored by trialist Albert Holden. Saturday 18th was also free due to a representative game Chiltern Premier v British Army to be played at Barnet. 6 of our boys have been selected to take part. A. Judge, R. Eaton, A. Pearson, M. Pacey, J. Woodward and M. Conquest.

Further commitments for the younger lads are on Easter Sunday and Monday when they play in the Ski Vicking Cup tournament in London. This is by invitation to 8 English League clubs and 8 from Sweden. Two English and two Swedish teams make up a group each playing one another, 25 minutes each way. The leading team in each group go into the semi-finals. We wish the lads taking part every success.

One of the assets of all Football League Clubs is a strong schools and youth league in the area. The Chiltern League, Sunday Section is no exception as they cater for 10–12 year olds in the morning and the 12–14, 14–16, and 14–18 in the afternoons. This comprises some 90 Clubs and nearly 1000 players every week, Clubs coming from Milton Keynes in the North down to Stevenage in the South. The work involved in arranging these games is tremendous and the work put in by Secretary Phil Blamire, who is a schoolmaster at Lea Manor school and Match and Referee Secretary Peter Brown, who works for a local Engineering factory deserves more than the thanks they receive at the end of the season.

On Sunday a competition was arranged by them for 10–12 year olds. This competition was between league representative teams with the Stevenage, Hemel Hempstead, Chiltern and Bedford youth leagues taking part.

One more highlight on the youth calendar is a continental tour. The Chiltern league is taking an under 14 and under 16 team to meet Luton's Friendship town Bergisch Gladbach during the Spring Bank holiday break – around 32 boys and 8 adults will be making the trip.
