

LIFE WITH THE LIONS

At least no one can say that the 1977-78 season is not spreading its suspense out until the very last. Our fight against relegation seems to have been going for a life-time and there is obviously no way we can relax until virtually the last kick of the season.

Before Saturday's match at Fulham manager George Petchey was saying that we needed six points from our last four matches and even then it might be touch and go — but at least we still have our destiny very much in our own hands, which is more than some of our rivals can claim.

George was in very good spirits following the Sunderland performance — cheered by the performance of his team and by the support they have received over the last two home games.

"I think our supporters have been great since I've been here," he said, "but over the last two home matches they have excelled themselves.

"Supporting a team near the bottom of the Division is not very pleasant. It calls for a lot of spirit and loyalty. Over the past two matches our fans have been tremendous. The crowd we had for the Sunderland match was 1,500 up on the Blackpool attendance and on both occasions they got behind the team and gave the players a great deal of heart. We couldn't ask for more from them - and it is a pity that those who criticise our fans en bloc don't take notice of the truly genuine support we get from the vast majority of them.

"As for the players — I have nothing but respect and admiration for the way they are maintaining their determined efforts to get clear of trouble. The win against Blackpool was welcome but I thought Blackpool were rather a poor side and we won without really getting into a lather.

"But the first half performance against Sunderland was excellent — promotion football! Having built up a 3-0 lead in the first half we tended to coast in the second half and this let Sunderland back into the game. But don't let us forget that Sunderland had won their previous five matches and are a very good side.

"I was delighted that young David Mehmet scored — he got our first goal when he beat Tommy Docherty's son Mike in the air to head in a corner. Then Phil Walker got a great goal from 20 yards before adding another with a diving header.

"At least no one can complain that we haven't been scoring goals. Back in the middle of the season scoring was our big problem but by gathering extra confidence, and with a few adjustments to the playing style, we have greatly improved that department. John Seasman has certainly repaid his move to a forward role, and with Ian Pearson has formed an excellent attacking partnership. When Pearson has been out, Lee has moved into the middle with Hamilton going out to the right and the attacking force has been maintained. Hamilton has

played well in his new role on the right and although everyone has played their part I think Peter Allen (who's wife is expecting a baby any day now) has shown an improvement in every game" said George.





Welcome to the Hatters whom we meet for the third time this season. Way back in October we visited Luton in the League and lost by the only goal of the match. At the end of January Luton visited us at The Den for the Fourth Round of the F.A. Cup and with a hat trick from Ian Pearson and a goal from John Seasman we progressed to the Fifth Round of the Cup. Of all three encounters this evening's is probably the most important so far as the Lions are concerned as our future as a Second Division Club may well hinge on the result. Luton's history is as varied as any club in the League. Founded the same year as Millwall they have the distinction of having played in every Division of the Football League. In the space of four

seasons in the early sixties they dropped from the First to the Fourth. In 1959/60 they finished bottom of Division One. In 1962/63 they were bottom of Division Two and in 1964/65 they found themselves relegated to Division Four. Both last season's encounters between Millwall and Luton ended in wins for the Lions. At The Den the scoreline was 4-1 and at Kenilworth Road 2-1. There was a period earlier on this season when the Hatters were amongst the leading contenders for promotion but inconsistency over the last couple of months have seen them drop out of the running, and they look like finishing in a comfortable middle of the table position. During this season there has been a change in Managership at Kenilworth Road, Harry

Haslam departed to take over the reins at Sheffield United and his place at Luton was taken by David Pleat who had served under Harry as Chief Coach. David gained considerable experience as a player and the soccer wheel of fortune turned full circle when he was appointed as Haslam's successor in January, 1978. A decade ago he had been one of their star players. Born and brought up in Nottingham, just across the River Trent from the City Ground, young David was an outstanding schoolboy footballer, and was capped by England at schoolboy level. He joined Nottingham Forest straight from school and moved to Luton for £8,000 in 1965. His speed and ball control made him a feared right winger and his career suffered a major

setback when he broke a leg. After three seasons at Kenilworth Road he moved to Shrewsbury where Gordon Lee was coach. He was transferred to Exeter and while he was there he won his full F.A. coaching badge. He then moved to Peterborough and ended his playing career as player manager of Nuneaton Borough in the Southern League. Three years of managerial experience stood him in good stead. Harry Haslam engaged him as coach to the Luton reserve side, and when the then chief coach Roy McCrohan took up an appointment at the American club Detroit Express at Christmas 1977, David was well prepared to step up into the top coaching appointment. Amongst the players David can choose for tonight's match are the following:

MILIJA ALEKSIC: Luton paid £20,000 to Plymouth in January 1977 for Aleksic's services, and the fee turned out to be a bargain. Aged 24, he was unsettled at Plymouth, and the move to Luton turned out to be the turning point in his career. Son of Yugoslav parents, but born in the North of England, he broke into football as a part-timer with Stafford Rangers. He quickly became a firm favourite at Luton, where the locals call him "Elastic" in tribute to his agility and quick reflexes.

PAUL PRICE: His hopes of a career in League soccer had to overcome a double disaster before he made the grade — recruited by Luton as a youngster he was on the verge of success when he broke his leg. He fought his way back to fitness, only to break it again. He battled back again, and his performances at right back have made him Luton's first-choice at right back ever since.

JOHN FAULKNER: Luton's senior pro and vice captain, he has given Luton sterling service since they paid £6,000 for him in March 1972. He emerged from obscurity as centre-half in the Sutton United team that played Leeds. Don Revie signed him on, but a broken leg interrupted his career at Elland Road. Strong in the air and a no-nonsense tackler, he has been a regular member of the Luton defence for five years.

PAUL FUTCHER: One of the brightest prospects in League football today, Luton risked their record transfer fee when they paid £100,000 for him in the summer of 1974. He was still only 17, and with only a handful of Fourth Division games behind him. Luton beat off opposition from bigger clubs to persuade him to leave Chester, his home town club, and he has developed into a

brilliant sweeper, cool in defence and far-seeing in setting up attacks. He has already been capped by England at under-21 level, and Luton supporters are convinced that full international honours are just around the corner. Still only 20, he was one of the players described by Don Revie "was an outstanding prospect" when the ex-England manager looked back on his experiences with the national side.

DAVID CARR: After learning his trade in defence or midfield in youth and reserve teams, Carr is now competing for regular first-team football. He comes from Margate, and became an apprentice at Luton when he left school in 1973.

JIM McNICHOL:Ex Luton Manager Harry Haslam was used to looking for bargains, and defender McNichol rates as one. Ipswich, prolific producers of youth players, allowed him to look for a new club after ending his apprenticeship at Portman Road in the summer of 1976. Haslam nipped in and although Paul Futcher's brilliance is hard to replace, McNichol has filled the sweeper's position with distinction whenever he has been called into the League team.

GRAHAM JONES: Watched by a Luton scout while playing as a schoolboy in Manchester, Jones was signed as an apprentice in the summer of 1975. Big and brave, he made rapid strides through Luton's lower teams, and made his League debut at the age of 17. Originally played as a back four defender, he has also sampled League soccer in midfield, and seems equally at home whatever the department.

department.

PASQUALE FUCCILLO: Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford, midfield dynamo Fuccillo — "Lil" to his friends and the Luton fans — joined Luton as a 16-year-old apprentice in the summer of 1973. Strong on the ball, he made his name with some storming midfield displays, and marked his League debut with a goal and has been a regular marksman ever since.

ALAN WEST: Luton's club captain and

ALAN WEST: Luton's club captain and a brilliant midfield man, West is one of the many stars to emerge from the "production line" of Burnley. An England under-23 international, he joined Luton for £100,000 from Burnley in October 1973. Still only 25, he is capable of turning defences inside-out with accurate passes

ate passes.

RICKY HILL: A midfield player who has excited attention all over the country, Hill had a fairy-tale start to his League career. Signed as an apprentice from schools football in North London,

he made it into the League team within a year and celebrated his debut by scoring once and laying on another goal. Now 19, he has been capped by England at youth level.

JIM HUSBAND: Joined Luton in Nov-

ember 1973 with a string of honours already collected with Everton, and has served Luton with distinction. He plays as an attacking midfielder or as a front runner, and has provided a regular supply of goals. A Geordie, he was capped by England as a schoolboy, as a youth, and at under-23 level, and hit 75 goals for Everton before moving to Luton for a £70,000 fee.

PHIL BOERSMA: It was the end of a patient search for talent by ex Luton boss Harry Haslam signed striker Boersma from Middlesbrough in July 1977. Three years previously Haslam had tried to persuade Liverpool to part with the player. He failed, and later went to Middlesbrough, and Haslam finally got his man two years later. Middlesbrough used him as a midfield man but for Luton Boersma operates as a free-running attacker, with goals the main priority.

GODFREY INGRAM: A local product of Luton's youth teams, Ingram has been tipped for high honours since his outstanding midfield and attacking talents took him into Luton's reserve team when he was still only 16. Luton signed him on schoolboy forms, and he played for England Schools. He became an apprentice in the summer of 1976, and within a year had been upgraded to junior professional.

NIGEL JOHNSON: He is also in his first season as a professional after serving his apprenticeship. Formed a good partnership with Ingram in the reserve and youth sides last year. Is very quick and has two good feet and is always looking for goals. He also comes from Welwyn Garden City.

RON FUTCHER: Twin brother of Paul and indentical in looks. When Luton paid £25,000 for him it was thought that he had been transferred from Chester because the boys wanted to be together, but Ron soon made his mark with a hat-trick in his second First Division game and has since established himself in Luton's front line.

TIM SMITH: Now in his third season with the Town. Plays mid-field but likes to come forward and score goals. Has had one outing in the first team so far but if he plays as well as the Manager knows he can then it won't be long before he will be in the senior side. Hails from Hereford.

THE FIGHT AGAINST **HOOLIGANISM**

The announcement last week from the Home Office that as an experiment the authorities in West Yorkshire and the Midlands will be empowered to detain in special centres on match days those hooligans apprehended at Football matches is a step in the right direction and welcomed by those clubs plagued with this menace. However, it would appear that this is only touching on the problem, especially as it is confined to the age group 17 to 18. As the majority of us know the bulk of the culprits seem to come from the age group 12 to 15. Unfortunately these also appear to be the 'untouchables' being subject to the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Courts. It is hoped that something can be done about these, and that the experiment due to commence on the 1st August 1978 in West Yorkshire and the Midlands will be extended as soon as possible to London and the South of England where our own experience tells us that the problem is an acute one. The move is welcomed let us hope that it will be extended and that in the long run it will produce results and help to eliminate the scourge of hooliganism at football matches.


