A BRILLIANT goal by Ricky Hill two minutes from time robbed Orient of a point which veteran 'keeper John Jackson almost earned on his own.

They had been given a marvellous start when Findlay dropped a Bill Roffey cross to give Moores a soft second minute goal.

Then came Jackson's oneman show of defiance as Luton fought back, and the only blemish on his performance came when a Chris Turner header squeezed under his body for the 27th-minute equaliser.
