TURNER SET TO MOVE -TOWN ARE BEATEN

Town sink in a mud bath

DEFENSIVE king-pin Chris Turner may have played his last match for the Town at Leicester last night.

He made the shock announcement before suffering another bitter disappointment as the Town slithered to defeat on a rain-swept paddy-field of a pitch at Filbert Street.

Dissatisfied with the set-up at Kenilworth Road, Turner, bought from Peterborough eight months ago for £100,000, said he hopes to be transferred by the weekend to New England Teamen, of Boston, USA.

Turner said: "I was on loan there when Luton signed me, and I want to go back. The manager knows how I feel, and I hope that the deal will be done very quickly. I understand Luton will get back what they paid for me."

Manager David Pleat did not travel with the team to Leicester and is understood to have been looking for a replacement for Turner — he made a bid for Coventry's Jim Holton, formerly of Manchester United, but the player refused the Town's terms.
