

Gift goals put Rovers clear before late rally

NEWS that the Town had done no worse than lose by the odd goal in five at Eastville Stadium on Tuesday night may have sounded positively encouraging to Luton ears 130 miles away. But Luton eyes at Bristol had to look very hard indeed to find bright spots.

I for one could not disagree with Bristol Rovers boss Bobby Campbell when he said: "The score-line flattered Luton-if they had gone down 3-0 it would have been a truer reflection on the game."

Two late goals by David Moss, one a free-kick and the other a penalty, put a sheen on the result which

was rarely visible in the Town's performance.

The fact that four goals scored so far this season have all come from set pieces speaks for itself, and once again it was hard to see goals arriving in any other way.

NEW FAULTS

BATTLE

Holding on to a 0-0 scoreline at half-time, there was a chance that the Town might battle through to keep their point, even if they showed precious little sign of taking both.

But Findlay made a basic error in the 57th minute when he drop-kicked a pathetic clearance straight to Miah Dennehy, who col-lected the pass and strode forward to score a gift for his first goal in league foot-ball.

Seven minutes later Mike Saxby, who had been beaten on the round by Steve White earlier, slipped in an attempt to stop the same player reaching a high

clearance, and while Saxby was still flat on his back White collected the second gift goal of the night.

CAUGHT

Wayne Turner, who had played consistently well, came under increasing came under increasing pressure from the speed and trickery of Barraclough, the former Newcastle and Birmingham winger. With the Town forced to go further forward in the search for a coal Turner was caught for goal, Turner was caught for once and Barraclough's centre dropped perfectly for White to head his second goal.

Rovers goalkeeper Martin Thomas had to make his first save of the match in the 79th minute, when Moss went through on a solo run, but three minutes later the goalkeeper stood a yard off his line at a free-kick and from the edge of the penalty area Moss curled the ball over the wall and into the pet wall and into the net.

Two minutes from time Williams tripped Tony Grealish and Moss ham-mered his second goal goal from the penalty spot.

It left Rovers on edge for the last couple of minutes when they should have been home and dry, but all the Town's efforts broke down long before they reached the danger
