

### IN FOCUS...IN FOCUS...

Are we slowly losing our soccer sanity? The close season has suggested that, with gigantic transfer fees and some players' demands for better financial contracts, only six Football League clubs can claim to be free of debt and in a sound trading position.

The summer transfer rush was sparked by West Brom's Laurie Cunningham joining the exodus to European clubs by signing for Real Madrid for one million pounds. Then Preston striker Mick Robinson was transferred to Manchester City for £756,000, before Charlton's Mick Flannagan moved to Palace — again for a huge fee.

Yet Robinson could have been a Luton player last season. Manager David Pleat made a cash offer to Preston and was prepared to make up the deal with one of his own players. But Preston, realising they had a little gold mine on their Deepdale doorstep, were in no mood to sell.

Luton's offer was obviously only a fraction of the fee Robinson was eventually transferred for, and no-one can blame Preston for waiting and trying to secure the best possible price for their biggest asset.

Luton fans will remember the club's traumatic times when it almost folded under the burden of severe financial problems. But the directors, to their credit, maintained a tight hold on their purse strings and with the help of good house-keeping put the club on a solid foundation again.

Keith Burkinshaw, Spurs' manager, last month highlighted one of the big problems with the English game when he called for an easing of restrictions on the entry of foreign players after hearing one of his own players may join a German club.

"If we are going to lose our stars, we have to buy foreign players to replace them," he said. Burkinshaw's player failed to agree terms for a new contract, but Burkinshaw added: "He's prepared to stay with us for another two years if we meet his terms. There is a danger that we will lose more of our best players (an obvious reference to Kevin Keegan and Cunningham) and we will be like the Dutch League with crowds decreasing as the stars depart.

"The only alternative is to let the clubs buy more foreign players. The Players' Union won't like it but the transfer market here is so ridiculous that even the big clubs can't afford the astronomical prices being asked."

Who can blame Cunningham for trying his luck in Spain? At West Brom he was on a basic wage and tried to solve his problem by asking the club for loyalty payment. Albion said they couldn't afford it — and that was the end of Cunningham's career at the Hawthorns.

Two Arsenal players also highlighted the problem during the summer. One said: "I think loyalty should be rewarded. When a club sign a new player, they look after him. Why shouldn't they do the same for players who have given good service — players they know? I've thought about going abroad and, if I can't come to an agreement here, I'm prepared to do it."

But the biggest warning came from Liverpool chairman John Smith, whose club have signed a sponsorship agreement with advertising on their shirts. Smith stressed the need for a new financial boost for the game when he said: "Out of total takings of £2.4 million last season, Liverpool — one of the biggest clubs in England and Europe — finished with a meagre profit of £71,000. The overheads in our game are colossal and we have to generate more remunerative activity off the field.

"The days have gone when clubs like ours can control. their destiny in the financial sense by relying on the money which comes through the turnstiles. We are all desperate for money and we have to explore new ways of finding it."

It's frightening to see that Liverpool, the most successful club in England over the last ten years, should make such a small profit. What is the answer? If anyone does know, 92 Football League managers are waiting to hear from you.

### DAVID'S DIARY...

Today we welcome Orient to Luton and hope that the two sides can provide worthy entertainment for the fans. Last season we had an exciting finish to the game here when Ricky Hill scored on the last seconds to give us a 21 win.

Their manager Jimmy Bloomfield has been busy this summer recruiting Mervyn Day, Tommy Taylor and Billy Jennings from West Ham and John Margerrison from Fulham. Also, of course, we have signed Paddy Grealish from the O's. New players take time to settle as they adjust to different styles of colleagues and gain team understanding, consequently, early results can be misleading. Many clubs have made considerable changes, some enforced because of freedom of contract and teams will take time to get into a settled pattern. Results already in pre-seaon friendlies, Anglo-Scottish Cup and Football League Cup ties suggest this.

It is now more important than ever that we have competition for places for the first team. Although I am delighted with our progress at youth team level, boys of this age need to be fed in and out the League side with discretion. For the tough Second Division, a strong squad is essential. In this respect I am pleased that we should have Alan West back soon, also Lilly Fuccillo is fighting determindly to get over his injury. No side can progress without healthy competition so that the maxim "you're only as good as your last game" becomes a reality and we are in a position to change the side if necessary.

During pre-season we had a close look at two players from abroad. Both were players who had represented their countries at either full or 'B' level.

Although the gates of opportunity are opening for foreign players, I feel it is important to have the players working in our environment first.

Unless the player is much better than existing staff, the risk must be carefully considered. In most cases, the combined cost of salaries, signing on fees and accommodation are considerably in excess of what our players can earn.

I hope all our supporters like the new kit which we have introduced. Our players have always preferred the white strip and we have retained the orange and navy blue basis of the club's colours. There are several reasons why we have decided to allow Adidas to produce our kit — these include availability, quality, supply of footwear and a commercially fair deal. Every decision we take is in the best interests of our club so I can assure any supporters this will remain so. We may encounter criticisms or suffer from misunderstandings along the way, but our efforts and decisions are taken with only one goal in mind — success on and off the field.

Enjoy today's game and remember to get right behind the lads from the first whistle.

## PRESSIENT COMMENT

Our elimination from the Football League Cup at the first hurdle was a great disappointment. We lost 3-0 in the first leg and drew 1-1 in the second at Kenilworth Road to go out 4-1 on aggregate. Here is how the Press saw the second leg.

"Luton huffed and puffed in pursuit of a lost cause but they came to grief on a patient and organised defence built around John Overton and Mark Weatherly.

"They came with a late flourish to salvage some pride with an 87th minute goal from Mark Aizlewood but by then Luton were four goals in arrears."

"Gillingham withstood a 55 minute siege, then grabbed a vital goal on the break through John Crabbe to book their place in the second round. Crabbe increased Gillingham's 3-0 first leg lead, shooting home from a Terry Nicholl's pass from 15 yards.

"The goal ended a furious Luton onslaught fired by a 25 minute incident when nearly everyone, except referee Colin Downey of Hounslow, thought Gillingham's Ken Price had handled a David Moss cross.

"Furious at not being awarded a penalty, Luton battled on only to be denied by some fine saves from Ron Hillyard. Hillyard made fine saves from Brian Stein and Bob Hatton and Charlie Young cleared off the line from Mike Saxby".

"Luton fans jeered Hounslow referee Colin Downey for denying their side a penalty when Gillingham's Ken Price looked to use his arms to turn a cross for a corner."

"Luton attacked in waves which often resembled the charge of the Light Brigade and, on occasions, there were 21 players in Gillingham's half. For a short spell in the first half, the Town's continuous attacks suggested they could have been capable of erasing those three first leg goals.

"Brian Stein, Mal Donaghy and Bob Hatton tested the visitors' defence before Ricky Hill's shot was deflected for a corner.

'In the hectic opening minutes, Saxby's header was thwarted on the line with keeper Hillyard stranded and beaten, and a shot from Tony Grealish was saved following a decent buildup involving Hill, Hatton and David Moss."

### ORIENT



In 74 years in the Football League, Orient have played only one season in the First Division.

But now, they feel it's time they tasted life in the top flight again.

And with £300,000 worth of new talent in their line-up, manager Jimmy Bloomfield believes he has found the right formula for Division One.

Bloomfield didn't have very far to go for the players he wanted.

Tommy Taylor, Billy Jennings and Mervyn Day all joined from West London neighbours West Ham, while John Margerrison moved across London from Fulham.

For Taylor, it was a journey home after spending nine years with the Hammers. He first starred in 1970 when, with Terry Mancini as his centre back partner, he won a Third Division championship medal with Orient.

A few months later he was on the move to West Ham in a deal which saw Peter Bennett join Orient.

It was certainly a happy move for Bennett who has gone on to become Orient's longest serving player with well over 200 appearances.

Jennings is Orient's most recent acquisition. And he looks a bargain.

He first established himself at Watford with 35 goals in 81 League games.

Although he was dogged by injury at West Ham, he has never been short of goals and at the end of the season, it's a good bet Jennings' name will be figuring in the goal charts.

Moores never really hit it off at Tottenham after looking a player of enormous potential while with Stoke. But he has settled in well at Brisbane Road.

Probably Bloomfield's biggest disappointment during the close season was the loss of skipper Tony Grealish to Luton.

Orient asked for £350,000 for Grealish who came to Kenilworth Road under freedom of contract. But Bloomfield eventually had to settle for £150,000 after a hearing by an independent tribunal.

In defence Orient have the much travelled Paul West who played for the 'O' youth side and made his League debut at the tender age of 15.

He was transferred to Charlton for a record fee of £26,000 at 17 and went on to play for Fulham and Cardiff before returning to Orient last season.

Bill Roffey is another regular mem-

ber of the defence. he made 19 First Division appearances for Crystal Palace before joining Orient in 1972-73.

Another Orient player with plenty of Division One experience is striker Joe Mayo. After making his name with West Brom he joined Orient in 1977 and scored on his debut at Blackburn.

It was Mayo-Peter Kitchen partnership which was a leading feature of the club's tremendous FA Cup run.

Henry Hughton and John Kane are two players who have worked their way up through the ranks at Orient. Both joined the club after leaving school and made their senior debuts in last season's Anglo-Scottish competition.

Kevin Godfrey joined Orient as a schoolboy making his debut in 1976 and becoming a firm favourite with the fans.

Bobby Fisher is Orient's established full back. He was a midfield player in their reserve team but switched positions when a vacancy occurred in the first team. Since then it has been difficult to get him out.

John Chiedozie made his Orient debut at 16 and was the Player of the Year in 1977.

### CRICKET

A little bit of sporting history is made at Kenilworth Road this afternoon when, for the first time, the ground stages a cricket match. Soccer has been played here for 74 years, but this will be our first attempt to stage our national summer sport.

The game is played under normal MCC rules, except that a side has only six players. Each fielder, except the wicket-keeper, must bowl two overs, and the innings is over when ten overs have been bowled — assuming the opponents last that long!
