Tony Hardisty's Soccer Scene

I thought about George Best when I heard that Kevin Keegan had joined Southampton. And I thought about Mrs. Jean Keegan when I read Mrs. Angela Best's cri de coeur over her wayward Irish genius.

Keegan, the nice-guy Yorkshireman who has twice been voted European Footballer of the Year, has-as they say-got it made.

He did not break my cynical journalistic heart when he told us that he had 'lost' money by choosing Hampshire instead of Italy, Spain, America or the dozens of other offers he had had to display his footballing talents in the future.

Kevin, a model professional according to every manager he has played for, is still doing very nicely and I do not begrudge him a British penny or a German Deutschmark.

He has utilised his talents superbly on the field and, along with his shrewd Yorkshire-based agent Harry Swales, has exploited his commercial vaue to the full.

Kevin is the kind of nice-guy, self-made son all of us would like to have had. At 29 he is a superstar and it hasn't spoiled him a bit. If he hasn't made a million pounds yet he will certainly reach that magic milestone by the time he leaves Lawrie McMenemy and Southampton for an already agreed transfer fee of £100,000.

Shrewd, superbly shrewd. Golden boots with a vengeance—which is where we turn to the unhappy Best.

Now if ever a footballer was born with the right name it was Best. That's what he was through his teens and early twenties. Quite simply, the best. Better than Keegan in terms of sheer ability. Better than any other British player of this era—and please don't run away with the idea that that is only my opinion. Ask Kevin Keegan for starters.

But George was always hitting the headlines-off the pitch that is-for the wrong reasons. Birds and booze were his Achilles heels-and he has always had two great feet.

And now, at 33-just four years older than Keegan-George says "There's no point in beating about the bush-I've got a very big alcohol problem and I must sort it out".

Hibernian, the latest in a long line of clubs to try-and fail-to get George to the kick-off on time, have kicked him out. Wife Angie, at her wits end, has told him: "Get help-or I'll leave you".

Alcoholics Annonymous have offered to talk to a man who had enough talent to have won half a dozen European Footballer of the Year titles.

It's all so desperately sad. As Keegan goes on exploiting his talents George goes on wasting his. Yes I think of George when I think of Kevin. And I think of players like Ritchie Pitt, Bobby Park, Mick Docherty and Roly Gregoire.

All were very young men when they had their careers cut short by injury. And all, like Keegan and Best, set out as kid footballers with the same bright dreams of fame and glory and the big-time money that is there for the taking for the talented and dedicated.

I got to thinking how glad I was to have two daughters. But then I suppose there's as much chance of them marrying a George Best as a Keving Keegan!

Ken Knighton's Review

Bill Pattinson did not play in our 5-0 victory over Burnley at Roker Park a fortnight ago, but I assure you that he had a very great deal to do with earning us those two precious points.

After the F.A. Youth Cup match against Manchester City's kids on the previous Monday evening the pitch was in the worst state imaginable and Bill, our head groundsman, was almost in despair.

But he and his staff worked fantastically hard to lick the surface into shape for Burnley's visit and I want to take this opportunity of thanking him and everybody who worked alongside him for a quite magnificent effort.

Stan Cummins in particular was very grateful. The little fellow's four goals gave him a fabulous afternoon and I was naturally delighted with the way we outgunned a Burnley squad which had had such a good run prior to their Wearside visit.

But I was far from pleased with the way we performed at Preston last Saturday. Managers everywhere are used to taking the rough with the smooth and I am not squealing just because we got beaten.

What hurts me more than anything else is to let down the thousands of Sunderland fans who spend time and money to lend their magnificent support at grounds like Deepdale.

Preston manager Nobby Stiles came up with the post-match thought that supporters like ours, travelling in such great numbers, tend to inspire the home team to give a better-thanaverage performance.

I hope I have no need to remind my own players that the object of the exercise from our fans' point of view is to inspire their own idols. We simply have to do better, which is why I went into the transfer market again last week for Wigan defender Joe Hinnigan.

He is a big strong lad with two great feet who can play anywhere in the back four. If he plays this afternoon—and he will if an ankle injury has responded to treatment—I know you fans will give him the sort of Wearside welcome which can mean so much to a newcomer.

But a few more words about Bill Pattinson. A couple of days after the Burnley match he accompanied our general manager Geoff Davidson to Coventry City's ground to look at their system of under-soil heating.

Jimmy Hill was in the chair for a seminar attended by a host of clubs and Geoff and Bill's conclusions are now in the hands of our directors.

It's easy of course to insist that a club of

Sunderland's standing should have some form of pitch protection, but everything costs money and I understand that the Highfield Road system—a series of underground plastic pipes fed by hot water—would cost some £75,000 to install.

On top of that you have to run the system and this particular one will remove an inch of snow in about three hours.


That's fine, but if you have four inches of snow on your ground and you turn it into water just where does all that water go?

The second point I would like to make is that if you have four inches of snow on the pitch then you have as much again on some of the terracing—and that would take an army of men to remove.

And finally, if there is that much snow about the chances are that many roads will be impassable, which would mean that your 'gate' would be dramatically decreased because supporters simply could not get to the ground.

I am certainly not saying that we don't need pitch protection at Roker Park—and in any case before a final decision is made the directors will consider other systems, such as electric underground heating (like Highbury) and the balloon-like cover they use at Leicester.

But it is worth bearing in mind that Sunderland have had only five matches put off in the last five years because of ground conditions. Of course that could well be down to some extent to unsung heroes like Bill Pattinson. And that's where I began these notes.



GUEST SPOT

Was 1973 really all that long ago? When lan Porterfield moved into management recently you had to ask yourself that.

Rotherham United, who have failed to make any kind of impact in the Third Division this season, have given the likeable Scot—now 33—his first taste of a side of the game he has always believed he could work in effectively.

"It had been in my mind for some time to try and break into management", lan told **Roker Review.**

"And I have approached the job with one basic belief: that I will get out of it what I am prepared to put in—I hope.

"That being the case I am prepared to work every hour possible because there is no point in having ambitions if you can't muster the application to make them happen".

lan has spent the last few seasons in Sheffield Wednesday's midfield, clocking up more than 130 first team appearances since his move from Roker park.

And although Rotherham now have his registration as a player he has been too involved with managerial duties to pay much attention to his own game.

"Actually", he says. "I owe Jack Charlton at Hillsborough a big vote of thanks for the way he handled my departure from Sheffield Wednesday.

"He told me that he wanted to stay and that I had a real future with the club.

"But when I told him that the Millmoor job was mine he could not have been more co-operative.

"Jack said that I could play for Rotherham if I wished without having to bother about a fee. I can't speak too highly of the man.

"If I don't get involved in the playing side again with my new club no doubt there will be a few withdrawal symptons emerging.

"But everyone, no matter who they are, has to face up to them one day. And to

be honest, over the last few months, I wasn't really happy with my game.

"I was so involved with coaching at various levels that I wasn't able to concentrate properly on my own problems".

Rotherham, of course, are considered the poor relations of the more glamorous Sheffield clubs Wednesday and United.

"But", says lan "that is an incentive in itself. As a manager I can do so much myself, but I'm the first to acknowledge that I need a bit of help from Lady Luck. I hope she looks after me.

"All the same, the most important thing is that I am enjoying my work. I am trying to encourage the 33 professionals we have at the club to develop good habits whether they are on the field of play or just going about their daily work.

"In my book, discipline and organisation are so important to the success of any club".

lan retained his links with Wearside during his time in Sheffield and in fact he is only just in the process of selling his Sunderland home.

"We will be moving into a new place in Rotherham soon. I want to feel totally involved with the community in which I'm working", he says.

So the man who wrote his name into the Soccer history books when he scored that never-to-be-forgotten only goal of the '73 Cup Final against Leeds is embarking on a new challenge.

And if at some future date he is leading out a team at Wembley in search of further glory then life will have rewarded one of football's warmest individuals.

Roker Review wishes him every possible success at Rotherham United. And we are sure that thousands of Sunderland fans who will be forever grateful for that golden goal in 1973 will echo our sentiments.



JAKE FINDLAY

Luton's highest-ever fee for a goalkeeper changed hands when they tempted Aston Villa to part with the big Scot who had been on their books since leaving school. His chances at Villa Park had been limited, but he quickly became an established Second Division player when Luton signed him for £100,000 in November, 1978.

ALAN JUDGE

Recruited from schoolboy soccerin Hertfordshire, Judge made rapid strides through Luton's junior teams and became Luton's second-choice goalkeeper last season after joining the Club as an apprentice in the summer of 1976.

PAUL PRICE

Luton's longest-serving player, full-back Price was spotted by a club scout as a schoolboy in Hertfordshire. He became an apprentice at Kenilworth Road, in 1971, and had to fight harder than most to break through to the league side – he broke his leg, recovered, then broke it again less than a year later. The second come-back was permanent, and he has been a regular member of Luton's league team for the past four years.

KIRK STEPHENS

One of the best deals Luton ever made, took Stephens to Luton in the summer of 1978. He was signed from Nuneaton Borough, where Luton boss David Pleat had once been manager, and made a remarkable transition from part-time to full-time soccer. He went straight into Luton's side at right back, and became so effective and popular that his first season ended with him being elected "Player of the Year" by the Luton supporters.

MARK AIZLEWOOD

One of David Pleat's first moves as manager of Luton was to pay £50,000 to bring Aizlewood out of the Fourth Division, where his performances for Newport County were beginning to attract the interest of First Division Clubs. He was then 18, and the former Welsh Youth International has since also been capped at under-21 level by Wales. A stylish defender, who has the ability to play in several positions. His eventual choice for full International Honours would suprise no-one at Kenilworth Road.

PASQUALE FUCCILLO

Son of Italian parents who settled at Bedford, and known as "Lil" by his friends and the Luton fans, Fuccillo is another Luton player who has come up through the ranks. A skilful, hard-tackling midfield with a liking for joining the attack and scoring goals he became a regular Second Division player in 1976, when he was 19. Broke a leg in a league game at Brighton and was out of action for six months. Lonely hours of training through the close season put him on the road back to full recovery.

RICKY HILL

A midfield player of tremendous talent, Hill was signed as an apprentice four years ago from North London, after impressing David Pleat in a schoolboy game at Hitchin. Hill, has delicate ball control and explosive shooting ability. He was an established league player by the time he was 17, and was rewarded with an England youth cap in 1976.

GRAHAM JONES

Picked up from schools football in Manchester at the age of 16 in 1975, Jones made rapid strides through Luton's junior ranks to make his League debut at 17. He can play in defence or midfield, and is one of the younger men who keep up the pressure for places in Luton's Second Division team.

DAVID MOSS

Having given sterling service to Swindon in the Third Division for nine years, flying winger Moss proved that he was more than capable of upsetting Second Division defence after his £110,000 move to Luton in the summer of 1978. His pace and accuracy, allied with the ability to cross the ball at speed, give Luton's attacks strength on either flank, and he is always likely to pop up with a spectacular goal or two – he was Luton's leading league scorer last season with 13, despite missing a third of the campaign through injury.

BRIAN STEIN

The progress of attacker Stein reads like something out of "Roy of the Rovers". He was a local health authority clerk in North London, enjoying non-league football with Edgware Town when David Pleat, then coach, spotted him in the autumn of 1977. Within a month he had made his debut and rapidly became an established first-team star. His greatest asset is sharpness in the box, and it brought him 14 league and cup goals last season.

GARY HEALE

Made the breakthrough in Second Division soccer two years ago being with Luton since leaving school in Canvey island. He marked his league debut with a goal and is one of the youngest prospects who could become regular league players this season.

GODFREY INGRAM

After a summer on loan with New York Cosmos in the United States, former England schoolboy international striker Ingram, a local boy, is one of the youngest members of Luton's first team pool. Leading scorer in the Football Combination over last three seasons. A local boy of whom much is expected.

MAL DONAGHY

There were disappointed managers all over Britain when Luton nipped in to pick up defender Donaghy from Larnefor a bargain fee of £15,000. Already a Northern Ireland under-21 international, he settled immediately into Luton's league side after the transfer in the summer of 1978. An exciting future is predicted. He was in Danny Blanchflower's international squad last summer, after only one year as a professional in the Football League. Can play midfield as well as defence, Donaghy is a natural athlete.

WAYNE TURNER

Development of local talent is one of the priorities at Kenilworth Road and Turner, who plays midfield or defence, is now on the fringe of making the complete journey from schoolboy soccer to league duty with his home town club. Signed as an apprentice in 1977, he was skipper of Luton's reserve side within two years, and made his league debut in the final Second Division match of last season.



Torrential rain greeted Lesley Wilkinson when she called at Roker Park recently – but it did nothing to dampen her joy at standing on the pitch.

The 21 year old who left Sunderland when she was only two was just happy to be back on Wearside and to have the opportunity of seeing her favourite team in action.

From Sunderland she went with her parents to live in Cheltenham and from there – in 1966 – it was on to Australia.

But her father Leslie, a self-employed bricklayer, is still a fanatical Sunderland supporter and Lesley has been brought up to believe that Roker Park is the shrine of Soccer.

She is staying for a few weeks with relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Laverick in Heartside Road, Nookside, Grindon, Sunderland, and it was Mr. Laverick – himself a season ticket holder – who brought Lesley to the ground for a picture she will always treasure.

ROKER REVIEW caught Lesley's unforgettable moment and she told us: "We live at Lynwood, near Perth, in Western Australia and although I watch the game out there we consider England to be the home of 'real football' – and especially Roker Park of course.

"My Dad is always homesick for Sunderland and when the team was in Australia in 1976 it was a great thrill for him to go and watch them. We get the **Sunderland Echo** sent out to us every week and Dad reads it from cover to cover."

"It goes from us to a man who also lived in Sunderland, from him to a guy from Newcastle and then on to a Middlesbrough supporter.

"I'll be taking several copies of **ROKER REVIEW** back for him and you can be quite sure he will be tickled pink to see his daughter standing on the Roker Park pitch."

Mr. Laverick, who is 55 and a shipbuilding supervisor on the boilermakers side at the North Sands Division of Sunderland Shipbuilders, told us: "My wife Iris and I went out to stay with Lesley and her parents in October 1978 and had a marvellous holiday.

"Les Wilkinson, despite all the years he has been in Australia, is still a Sunderland fanatic and of course the big highlight for him – as it was for all of us – was the 1973 Cup Final victory over Leeds United.

"I suppose one of these days he will be back to lend his own vocal support at Roker Park. But for now he will have to settle for Lesley describing in detail the matches she sees during her stay on Wearside."

Lesley is in the last year of her Bachelor of Arts degree at the West Australia Institute of Technology and Engineering.

"I'm thoroughly enjoying my visit back to my home town – and it was a bit special having my picture taken at Roker Park." she says.
