HALLMARK Town players were

queueing up to have a crack at goal, and when the ball broke kindly to David Moss the winger responded with the sort of classic goal that has become a hallmark of his performances, a perfect chip into the far corner from a narrow angle on the left wing.

Wrexham had little stomach for the fight, but survived more pressure until the final minute when another touch of panic stations ended with Stein ramming in the second goal from close range.

It made a nice finale, even if the ritual pitch invasion did take place a little early — the youngsters poured on to celebrate the end of the season 35 seconds too soon.

Referee Ron Challis had to add on injury time he had pulled a muscle during the second half and needed treatment from John Sheridan. The incident brought a nice touch of humour as centre-half John Roberts picked up the man in black and lifted him over the touchline and off the pitch. Mr Challis joined in the laughter at his own expense.

Cheerful good humour at Kenilworth Road was in marked difference to feelings a year ago, when the Town only just scraped clear of relegation.

Said the manager: "We may have just missed out on promotion, but the overall picture now is of a club which is better all round than it was at the start of the season.

"Perhaps we haven't been consistent enough to go into the First Division. but when I look at the players we have in the team, and coming through, I know that we aren't far away now."

Four battle for three

AS IF missing promotion was not bad enough, the Town now seem condemned to facing Chelsea's supporters again next season.

Once favourites to win the Second Division championship, Chelsea are now favourites to be the odd team out among the top four still battling for promotion.

Leicester City are almost there after a 2-1 home win over Charlton put them a point clear at the top. They moved ahead of Birmingham,

who drew 0-0 at Cambridge.

Sunderland and Chelsea are joint fourth in terms of points, but Sunderland have a game in hand and a vastly superior goal difference thanks to a 5-0 thrashing of Watford at Roker Park, in front of the day's biggest Second Division gate 32,195.

after a 1-1 draw at Swansea, and the

Town are still fifth, Manager David Pleat believes that Leicester, Birmingham and Sunderland will be the three to go up. "Chelsea are like us-they need another year," he said.
