TWO terrible defensive errors gave Malcolm Allison's struggling Manchester City the right to enter tomorrow's draw for the fourth round of the Football League Cup.

But those Luton fans who claim that the First Division team's appearance in the next stage of the competition bears an element of luck, will not find many to argue against them.

There were long periods when the Town matched anything City could offer and the real losers on the night were the fans who stayed away, leaving an alarmingly low attendance of just over 10,000.

Both teams contributed much to an entertaining game where the result was in dispute until the final whistle. And no one was more relieved to hear it than Allison.

Instead of going to Maine Road for a replay, Luton will now entertain Tampa Bay Rowdies in a friendly at Kenilworth entertain Tamp Road on Monday.

There can be no doubt that the Town deserved at least a second bite at City, whose two goals had an element of luck about them while Luton's effort was based on pure skill.

No one needed a victory more than Allison. But he must have been worried throughout the 90 minutes that Luton could help put him out of a job.

"Apart from one tenminute spell, I never felt confident about the final result," he admitted. "It was a very difficult game for us and I was disappointed with many of the things we did during the game.

"We had done our homework on Luton and, as expected, they stretched us to the limit. They are a very good attacking team and didn't surprise us with the problems they posed."

Instead of demoralising the Town, the goal served only as a boost and with Raddy Antic again operating as an emergency striker in the absence of anyone else capable of finding the net, City knew immediately they had a fight on their hands.

Luton's pressure, however, was rewarded after 25 minutes when Antic equalised with a superb goal.

It came from a free kick awarded for a foul on Alan West. City built a strong de-fensive wall but Antic showed his skill from dead ball situations by bending his shot around the wall and well out of Corrigan's reach.

Corrigan saw further hectic corrigan saw further nectic action as the Town realised they had the ability to compete against First Division opposition. The keeper was forced low to West's shot before diving at David Moss's feet to block the rebound.

But two minutes before the But two minutes before the break, City struck again. A quick counter attack sent Steve Daley wide down the left and from his accurate cross, Tony Henry was left completely unmarked to head the ball past Findlay.

That goal could not have come at a worse time for the Town but they boldly went in search of an equaliser after

Findlay saved at Daley's feet and Reeves shot wide before Luton hit back when Saxby headed a shade wide and Stein's shot was deflected for a corner.

The action was fast and furious — but it wasn't enough to provide Luton with that elusive equaliser in a tense tie where they deserved much more than the applause of the fans and Allison's accolades.
