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Media experts who predicted that the meeting of Football League Chairman last week would produce nothing of consequence were made to look foolish when the eventual summary of recommendations proved to be one of the most revolutionary placed before us in the last twenty

In the guest to make soccer more entertaining and so win back disappearing fans, one recommendation stood out head and shoulders above all the others and this was the plan to give three points for a win instead of the present two. Already the idea is under attack from the critics and faint-hearts who say that, if it is implemented, visiting clubs will try to score an immediate goal and, if successful, hang on to those three invaluable points. Fair enough - but when did soccer ever consist of a game in which it was perfectly easy to score as soon as the match started? And suppose the early opening goal did take place, what do you imagine the home side will produce in the way of a counter-attack if they see so many precious points slipping out of their grasp? Far more important than these aspects, however, is the undeniable fact that we already see visiting sides turn up prepared to play for a 0-0 draw from the initial kick-off. At least, if the '3-Point Policy' becomes law, we shall see some attacking play from the opposition and, if we are lucky, an entire 90

We are rather more dubious over the suggestion to stage football matches on Sundays. So many factors weigh against this scheme. The opposition must be faced of considerable numbers of wives, mothers and families: protesting stadium neighbours who are entitled to peace and quiet on Sunday afternoons; public transport difficulties; and even the soccer fans who play the game themselves on Sundays. However, it seems this will not be a compulsory requirement but will simply increase the options open to clubs to allow them to choose which is the best day of the week-end on which to stage their games. Provided this is the case, the recommendation is a sensible one which will be welcomed by certain members of the Football League. But note that all the ideas which emerged from the Chairman's Meeting are proposals only and cannot be put into effect until they are passed at a General Meeting. If they do not go through, the media critics will have the last laugh; we sincerely hope the respective Chairmen will have the courage of their convictions when they eventually cast their votes.



Today's match will be our 3196th professional match, our 436th Second Division game, and the 91st time that we have played Luton. Up to 26th October 1980, Luton's full league record was:

The results against Luton, particularly in recent years are always close affairs, though (dare I say it?) Luton haven't beaten us for over 10 years.

In the past, Luton have always found points hard to get at Loftus Road. For example, they've only won twice on this ground since 1924 in the 25 League and cup matches played.

They won 3-0 in December 1948, and their last victory here was on 29th August 1970, when they won 1-0.

1925 and 1936 we won eleven and drew two of the thirteen matches at Loftus Road.
Our biggest ever victory was on 6th November 1964 — when a huge gate of 5175 (paying

Our biggest ever victory was on 6th November 1964 — when a huge gate of 5175 (paying £982) saw us win 7-1, Mike Keen 3 (including 2 penalties) Brian Bedford (3) and Roger Morgan scored our goals. Since our defeat in 1970, we have taken seven out of eight points in the four matches on this ground — Luton taking a point off us last season when they held us to a 2-2 draw.

For those of you who do the pools, don't forget to put us down for a draw when we visit Kenilworth Road in April.

All our last five League matches played there have ended in draws, and six out of the last seven have ended that way.

Our last win there was on 19th January 1952 (1-0) - one of seven matches we've won at Luton. Like ourselves, Luton's greatest run of successes on their own ground came in the 1920s and 1930s. Between 1920 and 1937 we played 17 matches there (in the League) and got three points from them — in fact, we lost eight out of eight matches between 1920

The League's top Feature Writer examines the past playing history and achievements of today's opponents. Tony also writes the Pen Pictures on the back page.

There is no logical reason in football why a team should finish one season in such commanding, promotion-chasing form, then open the next so lethargically as to bring the threat of relegation upon it. But that was the fate of Luton Town who were last season reckoned by most opposing managers to be "the best footballing side in the Second Division."

At the beginning of April, Luton were third in the table, just two points behind the leaders. But, as the pressure increased over the closing weeks, the Hatters managed to win only one of their closing five games and finally finished in sixth place.

With the advantage of hindsight, we could perhaps doubt Luton's wisdom in selling striker Bob Hatton to Sheffield United during the close-season. Last season he set up a prodigious scoring partnership with David Moss, scoring 18 goals himself while at the same time helping Moss to take his tally to 24.

The £75,000 fee offered by the Blades had to be a consideration, of course, for a club that still has to watch the pennies. Yet it is not cash alone that can compensate, or replace, scoring duos of the Moss-Hatton calibre.

Luck plays its part in how the chemistry of two individuals will produce an explosive result, as it did with Bob and Dave.

The fact has to be faced that, without Hatton by his side, Moss has scored only seven goals so far. So it must be conceded that the breaking of the partnership has contributed at least a little towards this season's decline.

However, looking on the positive side, Luton are probably lucky to be as well situated as they are today. When it is recalled how many quality players the Hatters have been forced to sell in recent years, since their near financial collapse, it is something of a miracle how they have survived as high as Second Division level.

Malcolm Macdonald, Don Givens and Chris

Nicholl rank among the internationals who have been sold. Our own Andy King can be counted among Peter Anderson, Ron and Paul Futcher, Steve Buckley, Barry Butlin and Vic Halom as just a few of the top players Luton were forced to sell in order to survive.

It was a tribute, initially, to former manager Harry Haslam — and, more recently, to David Pleat — that the club came through such a traumatic experience to survive at its present level.

Mr Pleat's only major summer signing involved the purchase of former Yugoslav international Radi Antic from Spanish club Zaragoza.

As expected, Antic has needed a period of acclimatisation and, while Tony Grealish and Ricky Hill have been holding firm places in midfield, Antic has shared the third midfield place with Alan West.

Brian Stein, Steve White and David Moss have been linking up in attack while the back four has settled with Clive Goodyear and Paul Price in the middle and Kirk Stephens and Mal Donaghy on the flanks. Goodyear, incidentally, has recently taken over from Mike Saxby.

Jake Findlay has been looking as confident as ever in goal, though he was injured at Cambridge last month and had to be replaced by a substitute. Mal Donaghy, the Irish international full-back, acquitted himself well in goal for Luton as they held on to win 3-1 and record their second away win of the season.

That win will have done much to boost confidence and, if they can build upon that, Luton clearly have the ability to make a sharp rise up the table.

OUR FASTEST EVER GOAL

(A special feature by Derek Buxton)

What time was our fastest ever goal scored in? There seems to be conflicting reports but. as fate would have it, I know exactly. I have a Seiko digital watch and, out of habit, always make a note of what time QPR (or their opponents) kick off. As they kicked off against Bolton on 11th October my watch said 3.00 and 43 seconds. Normally, I then light a cigarette, and only look at my watch when someone scores, or the substitite comes on.

As the ball hit the back of the net, my watch read 3.00 and 55 seconds — therefore, I am convinced that it was 12 seconds. I saw that there was a camera filming the match — did they film it from the kick-off — and perhaps can confirm my time?

Whatever the time, it was certainly QPRs fastest goal by a very long way.

- On 20th August 1949 Billy Painton scored a very fast one at Leeds United. Newspaper reports timed it at 25 seconds.
- Three very quick goals have been scored in the last seven seasons. On 29th September 1973, Dave Thomas scored at Newcastle inside the first minute. On 11th October (yes the same date!!) 1975, Don Givens scored inside the first minute in our home match with Everton (we won 5-0).
- The previous quickest goal however, was timed at 24 seconds. It was again scored by Don Givens in our home match against Manchester United on 19th April 1977.
- The fastest goal ever recorded is claimed by Jim Fryatt. According to the referee (Mr R.J. Simon) this player scored for Bradford against Tranmere Rovers — after only four seconds on 25th April 1964.



STEVE WICKS

Steve served his apprenticeship with Chelsea and later joined Derby, since his £300,000 transfer Steve's strength and skill have dominated the heart of Ranger's defence.

ERNIE HOWE

Ernie was recalled to the first team last week at Grimsby. He joined Rangers in November 1977 for a fee of £50,000.

GLENN ROEDER

Glenn joined us from Orient in August 1978 for $\mathfrak{L}250,000$. After touring Singapore and New Zealand with the England B team. He is Club Captain.

ANDY KING

Andy joined us from Everton in September for a fee of £500,000 and has scored two goals since then. He had previously been with Luton Town where he played 33 League and Cup games, scoring nine goals.

DEAN NEAL

Since being recalled to the first-team in late September, Dean has scored four goals in nine games. He is another product of the Rangers youth policy, signing professional forms in July 1978.

TOMMY LANGLEY

Tommy scored the fastest goal since the 1940's when he put Rangers one up against Bolton in just six seconds. He has scored five goals since joining Rangers in August.

BARRY SILKMAN

Rangers signed Barry from Brentford last week for a fee of £20,000. He was only prevented from scoring on his debut by a magnificent save from the Grimsby goalkeeper!

JAKE FINDLAY

Jake got only 14 chances to play in Aston Villa's League team and his career really didn't begin to flourish until his £100,000 transfer to Luton in 1978. Now he is hoping to get the chance to play for Scotland.

KIRK STEPHENS

Kirk joined the club from Nuneaton Town and went into the first-team in 1978/79. Now he is firmly settled at right-back.

MAL DONAGHY

Mal won N. Ireland under-21 honours in his larne Town days. Luton signed him for £20,000 during the 1978 close-season and now he has switched from midfield to left-back. Now he is a full international with 4 N.I. caps.

TONY GREALISH

Luton increased their club record payout to £300,000 when they signed Tony from Orient in 1979. He has spent the previous five seasons in the O's first-team. Tony won his 20th Republic of Ireland cap against France last month.

CLIVE GOODYEAR

Clive is another product of the club's nursery scheme. He made his League debut towards the end of last season and was recalled at centre-back last month.

PAUL PRICE

Paul was introduced to the Wales' team for last season's British Championship, he now has five full caps, plus one at under-21 level. Paul was introduced to the Luton side in 1972/73.

RICKY HILL

Ricky first signed for Luton as a schoolboy in May 1975 and later completed his apprenticeship with the club. He made his first-team bow in 1975/76 and has been holding his place for the past three years.

BRIAN STEIN

Brian is a local discovery who came into the first-team three seasons ago. He scored eight goals last season and has hit six so far this term.

Steve made his bow in Bristol Rovers' League eleven in 1977/78 and he was transferred to Luton for £175,000 last season.
