Well, well, well, how wrong can you be? After spending many hours pouring over figures and statistics and coming up with an idea to improve the revenue from the Main Wing Stand it would seem we have really stirred up the hornets nest.

There are now very few tickets available for the next home match against Queens Park Rangers and you may now also apply for tickets for the remaining matches against Bristol Rovers and Oldham at Kenilworth Road.

Tickets are available for the away game at Sheffield Wednesday price £3.20 for centre seats. To save telephone calls, we are afraid we do not have any tickets available for the FA Cup Final or the England-Scotland match.

DAVID'S DIARY

A rather frustrated group of players travelled back from Swansea last Saturday afternoon. Comparisons could be drawn from our previous week's game with Bristol City. They were notified on the morning of the match that there would be an inspection. Indeed, it was the tremendous hard work by certain people which confounded the pessimists and allowed the referee to say at 11 am: "The game goes on."

At Swansea, we didn't receive any notification of an inspection and arrived at the ground at 2 pm to be told that the match referee, Mr Newsome, had inspected and declared the pitch unfit as late as 1.15 pm. I respect his decision but he could have inspected before mid-day in time to prevent many people making wasted journeys or giving people the chance to re-route

or return if making the long trip from Luton. My sympathy was with that special group of our travelling supporters. If we can gain that elusive place in Division One, it should not be overlooked that our away support over the last couple of seasons has been tremendous. I know the effect away support has on the players when they are miles from home. Today, we have the opportunity to stay in the fascinating Second Division promotion race. Luton v Cambridge may not

have been considered a promotion encounter at the beginning of the season. But we have both won the right to be among the leaders. This year's much maligned Second Division has been criticised by respected football people and some quarters of the Press for lacking quality.

I disagree. People have fallen into a trap of associating standards with glamour. Some find it hard to reconcile the fact that Sheffield Wednesday, Grimsby, Blackburn, Cambridge, Swansea, Notts County and ourselves are meriting their

To achieve it, they have had to play every bit as well as last season's competitors, Birmingham, Queens Park Rangers, Chelsea, West Ham, Sunderland and Newcastle. The above clubs should not feel inferior or wary of First Division football. They could survive on the pitch with some of the mediocre sides I have seen this season. Our common struggle would be raising the finance to support First Division sides.

It is now more important than ever before that the fans on the terraces take a more active role in helping to support our aims. We now all accept that football cannot support itself through the turnstiles

I ask all our regular fans to contact Mike Hardwicke, our pools manager, whose hardworking efforts have held this club together. Become an agent or contribute and buy tickets. If the re-organisation of the Football League becomes a reality in a short time, then we must be in a strong position on and off the pitch. So, please, help our pools organisations.

Today's game looks good. Cambridge manager John Docherty is a big man, lacking in inches, with a sound knowledge and a determination to succeed. He has done exceptionally well so far, proving that good coaching and management can considerably increase the potential of lower League players if given an opportunity. Players like Reilly, Fallon, Spriggs, Smith and Donaldson have all been given a chance and are repaying the manager's judgement.

Get behind the team today. We could well be in the nervous nineties without realising it. Three or four quick victories could have Nots County shaking. It is difficult to play relaxed football, but we shall try and hope your support will carry us to a good win.



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John's Journal

Today, we welome our friends and near neighbours from Cambridge and, although we hope they leave the points behind, also hope they have a good day out and are treated to an entertaining match.

Formed in 1919, the club turned professional in 1946 but since being elected to the Football League in 1970 have done remarkably well in the 11 years that they have been members. They gained promotion to the Third Division in 1973-74 season but were back in the Fourth Division a year later.

In season 1977, they won their way back and were promoted to Division Two in 1978. Last season they finished eighth in the table which was their best so far in this Division. At one time they showed a liking for former Luton players, Peter Philips, Alan Guild, Alan Biley had a spell there, and more recent and probably in the team today, Chris Turner and Tom Finney.

Incidently, Alan Biley scored 75 goals for them in his four and a half vears at the club which is why Derby County paid £350,000 for him 12 months ago. Now under the leadership of John Docherty, they have become a side to be reckoned with and we will have to be on our toes today. The Abbey Stadium ground must be the smallest in the Second Division with a capacity of just over 12,000 but I believe plans are in hand to increase this.

Now, a word to our supporters who stand behind the goal at the Oak Road end. At our last home match against Bristol City, obscene chants were being voiced and that is something we do not want here. As you know, the Junior Hatters and children's enclosure is next to yours and as we are trying to build a young supporters club and to encourage young people in to watch us, we do not want them or their parents

who bring them, to stay away because of misbehaviour. So let's cut it out please.

Many thanks to the ground staff manager and players who were out on the pitch forking the water away for a couple of hours to enable the match to go ahead. To me, this shows the spirit that is within the club.

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Barratt the right buy right now

The old firm of Celtic and Rangers have quite rightly claimed most of the headlines among the Scottish clubs over the past years - for a time it looked as though there need be only one match a year when the two Glasgow Giants could decide who were winners of the League and Cup that year. Nowadays it isn't quite such a formality and I know the big boys welcome this healthy competition.

Scottish football has a fascinating history and has also provided many odd soccer stories. Indeed, some strike me as so eccentric that I sometimes think someone north of Hadrian's wall must have had a dram or three of the national beverage and next time they should 'take more water with it'. There was that splendid occasion beloved of schoolboys and quizmasters when Arbroath beat Bon Accord 36 - 0 to set up the highest score ever recorded in a proper competition in Britain. It was a Scottish Cup First Round game on the Fifth of September, 1885.

According to legend, Andrew Lornie was making his debut in Bon Accord's goal as regular 'keeper Jimmy 'Sniper' Grant was ill. But in truth Bon Accord were actually the Orion Cricket Club of Aberdeen and they were very surprised therefore to receive an invitation from the Scottish FA to take part in the competition. The cricketers decided to change their name to Bon Accord because they thought it sounded better then their real name. After the 36 goal slaughter the red-faced Scottish FA Secretary apologised and admitted that the invite should have gone to the Orion Football Club. No wonder none of the Bon Accord team played in real football boots!

John Petrie scored 13 of the Abroath goals and when you consider that in those days the goalkeepers changed end after every goal, there were no nets, no penalties, the players didn't wear numbers and goalkeepers were not restricted to handling the ball only in the penatly area, you begin to get some idea of the farce that was presented on that September day 75 years ago.

I particularly appreciate the report on the match in the 'Dundee Courier and Argus':-

'This match - the first cup-tie was played at Arbroath on Saturday, when, despite the rain, there was a good turn-out of spectators. The match was one of the drollest ever seen here or anywhere else, and baffles description. It was truly 'The Massacre of the Innocents', for a more helpless set of innocents never before met the crack club of Forfarshire. Though unable to describe the match, we can give the result, which we hope no one will doubt. Two forty-fives

were played. The first result was - Arbroath 15; Bon Accord 0; second - Arbroath 21; Bon Accord 0. Grand total - Arbroath 36; Bon Accord 0, Milne, the active goalkeeper of Arbroath, neither touched the ball with hand or foot during the match, but remained under the friendly shelter of an umbrella the whole

HARPS WIN 35-0

The ssecond highest score ever recorded in a proper competition in Britain is the 35-0 victory Dundee Harps had over Aberdeen Rovers. Now the interesting thing about this

is that it was recorded on the same day as Arbroath's record win, and in the same competition! Arbroath to Dundee is just 17 miles and so in that short distance the two highest ever scores were set up on the same

When you consider that it usually takes a couple of minutes to score a goal and with the goalkeepers having to change ends every time that probably added another minute then there was a goal every three minutes in the first half and a goal every two minutes in the second half. I wonder what the opposing managers said at half-time?

Another unusual Scottish set up is that of the famous Queen's Park club. The oldest club in Scotland, formed in 1867, and of course amateur, the club motto translates from the Latin as, 'To play for the sake of playing'. In 1873 Queen's Park became members of the Football Association and England adopted all the club's rules. The Scottish FA followed with the eight clubs then existing in Scotland. Before this, Queen's had taken part in the FA Cup and had reached the Final twice, meeting Blackburn Rovers both times and losing 1-2 in 1884 and 0-2 in 1885.

From the foundation of the club in 1867 they played for nine years, until 1876 without losing a game and in 1872 for the very first recognised International between Scotland and England the whole Scottish team was provided by Queen's Park!

At Queen's Park the President's Chain of Office is also unusual in that it is made of the various medals. such as International and Scottish Cup, won by the club's players who throughout the years have handed these personal awards back to the club in order to create this unique badge of office.

The club's ground is the famous Hampden Park. This present, the third, Hampden Park stadium, was built in 1903 and covers a total area of some 33 acres.

Another oddity of Scottish League football is that Berwick Rangers, although from the English City of Berwick on Tweed, plays in Division One of the Scottish League. Founded in 1881 the club's single honour came in the 1978-79 season when Berwick Rangers were Division Two Champions. These days Berwick's ground capacity is set at 10,687 although the record attendance is 13,365 and this was established when Rangers visited Sheffield Park for a Scottish Cup First Round match on the Twenty-Eighth of January, 1967. Although Second Division Berwick beat their illustrious First Division rivals Rangers 1-0 they went down by the same score when they visted Hibernian in the Second Round.

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IN FOCUS



We think there could be a few new nicknames in the Luton dressing room after the players' party night held at the Old Bell, now owned by former Town keeper Tony Read. Our lads responded magnificently to the fancy dress theme and we don't think you'll have any problems trying to identify them.

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Former Luton striker Alan Biley played a prominent part in Cambridge manager John Docherty's rebuilding plans after he sold Biley to Derby County for £450,000 just over 12 months ago.

Biley, given a fee transfer by Luton, eventually moved to Cambridge — and his progress at the Abbey Stadium attracted the interest of several clubs.

But he elected to join Derby, and Docherty has used some of the money to invest in his plans to strengthen the team. Cambridge have done well to consolidate in the Second Division after the bonus of joining the Football League only ten years ago.

Their compact Abbey Stadium ground holds only 12,000 fans. But this season, they earned national recognition for their exploits in the Football League Cup.

In the second round, they eliminated Wolves after winning 3-1 at home in the first leg and 1-0 at Molineux in the return. That result gave Cambridge confidence for their next hurdle — a game against another First Division team, Aston Villa, at home.

Villa were one of the favourites to win the Cup, but Cambridge had other ideas and recorded another shock result by winning 2-1. United could not have wished for a tougher match in the fourth round which paired them against Coventry City at Highfield Road. They faced the challenge with

relish to earn a replay.

Coventry proved to be too tough at the second attempt, but Cambridge proved they had the quality to compete against tough-class opposition.

Cambridge have fought their way into the Second Division since being elected to the Football League in 1970. And manager Docherty has his eyes quietly set on First Division status.

The departure of Biley does not appear to have been a great loss. Another former Luton player, Tom Finney — an Irish international — moved, to Sunderland before joining Cambridge. He's scored over 150 goals for United since joining them in 1976 and was the club's Player of the Year last season.

Striker George Reilly is United's most expensive signing. Cambridge broke the Fourth Division's transfer fee record when they paid Northampton Town £180,000 for the 6ft. 4in. frontrunner in November 1979 and he scored 11 times in his first 25 appearances in Cambridge colours.

Another former Northampton player, Derrick Christie, also figures in attack. Docherty employs him as an out-and-out winger after paying £50,000 for his signature on a transfer form. Born in Bletchley, Christie joined Northampton from school.

After Biley's departure, Docherty invested £90,000 on Millwall's John Lyons and he responded by scoring in his debut against Oldham. Another

Millwall player, Dave Donaldson signed for £50,000 and the full-back made his first appearance for United at Bristol Royers.

Midfielder Alan Taylor hit the headlines in 1975 when he scored in the sixth round, semi-final and final as West Ham went on to win the FA Cup. He was a £40,000 purchase from Rochdale but joined Norwich and then played in Canada before agreeing to join Cambridge when Docherty paid Vancouver Whitecaps £150,000.

There has been a change recently in the goalkeeping position where Richard Key, formerly with Exeter and Coventry, has taken over from longserving Malcolm Webster.

Steve Spriggs and Steve Fallon were regular members of the team which twice won promotion for Cambridge. Scot Jamie Murray has sampled Football League soccer with only one club— Cambridge— and has made about 80 appearances in the first team.
