PUTTING A RUN OF good results together when it matters most, the Town set themselves up for a genuine tilt at promotion with their third win on the trot at Stamford Bridge on Monday. They gave manager David Pleat the perfect tonic as he went home to pack for a week's stay in hospital for a minor operation.

If anyone looked sick in London, it was Chelsea boss Geoff Hurst, who has seen his collection of expensive stars slide right out of promotion contention after being near the top just before Christmas. "We just aren't good

enough at the moment," he confessed.

And he wouldn't be surprised to see the Town pick up a promotion prize

which seemed to have slipped away a couple of weeks ago.

"They're one of the best footballing sides in the Second Division," he said. "They weren't at their best against us, but they deserved to win. I like to see good football rewarded, and the kind that Luton play deserves to take them into the First Division".

The Town still have a lot to do as they wind up the season with Saturday's home match with Oldham and away games at Swansea on Monday and Bolton on Saturday week. And it has to be said that Chelsea, lacking confidence and short of any sort of brain in attack never really stretched them.

Even the first goal was down to eccentric goalkeeper Petar Borota, who took the field looking like a refugee from Billy Smart's circus - white socks, blue tracksuit trousers and shorts, and a bright red jersey.

His kit was the nearest any Chelsea player got to being dazzling. They managed to create only one clear chance, wasted in the fifth minute when Jake Findley was able to make a simple save from Colin Lee.

Mike Saxby was the man of the match in a defensive formation which left Chelsea completely baffled — Raddy Antic stayed behind Saxby and Paul Price for the whole 90 minutes and the Chelsea attack fizzled out, with Lee noticeable only for some bad-tempered aggression which

eventually brought him an overdue booking, Ricky Hill and Tony Grealish were more than a match for three opponents in midfield, and Kirk Stephens again made himself available for surges down the right.

If the Town did not look as good as they can be,

Chelsea's wretched display was significant.
All the good chances came at the other end, with Moss hitting the side netting from one opening by Stephens, and then putting the Town ahead in the 26th minute with a goal which had Hurst exasperated with his

goalkeeper.

The move started with Findlay punting a clearance to Moss. He knocked it inside to Brian Stein, took the return pass on the left-wing and moved in to shoot from near the angle of the penalty area, in the inside-left position. The ball bounced once as it skipped past

Borota's late dive into the far corner.

Stephens put a couple of shots just wide and Antic curled a low free-kick agonisingly close before a superb goal killed off Chelsea in the 77th minute. Saxby won a tackle near the half-way line and slotted a perfect pass forward. Chelsea had given Hill yards of space, and he took the ball ten yards forward before driving his shot

past Borota from just outside the penalty area.
"A lovely goal," agreed Hurst, who has every right to pass judgement on such matters. "It was just a pity that a goalkeeping mistake gave Luton their first. We didn't really look like pulling one back, did we?"
