The first half had been less than entertaining, with Wrexham using a 4-4-2 formation, pulling everyone back behind the ball when the Town were in possession, and tackling hard and often.

Ricky Hill beat the off-side trap from a through pass by Brian Horton, but was foiled when Eddie Niedzwiecki raced 10 yards out of his area to make a spreading save.

The goalkeeper was booked for hands, but no

doubt thought it worth it. Dixie McNeil shot over from six yards on one of the rare occasions when the Town defence was caught out, and it looked

like stalemate after David Moss missed a penalty in the 47th minute.

The winger had an unhappy night, with Joey

Jones staying close all the time, and dishing out some harsh treatment at times. The penalty was given when a linesman saw Steve Dowman push Moss over. Wrexham disputed the decision, but goalkeeper Niedzwiecki was able to make a fairly easy save because Moss put the penalty too close to him.

Clive Goodyear kept his place in defence, but was taken off in the 55th minute when the Town gambled by sending on Godfrey Ingram as substitute and playing with only

three men at the back. It gave them more attacking threat, but they struggled to get through an overcrowded midfield and Wrexham might have gone three up on aggregate in the 67th minute when Town defence caught stretched, but Kirk Stephens made a marvellous goal-line save from McNeil's header.

White's winning goal came from sheer deter-mination and if the Town had shown as much of that in the first half as they did in the second the result could have been very different.

But Wrexham played much better on Tuesday than they had done in the league game, and Mr Pleat confessed: "Saturday's result may have made them more wary of us, and more determined. Wrexham seemed to have an attitude of 'they shall not pass' and they fought for every ball."

The manager refused to call the cup defeat a blessing in disguise, but Wrexham boss Mel Sutton commented: "Luton are a very good team. I think they are good enough to win promotion."

Splashing ouf to kil

WREXHAM 0, LUTON TOWN 2 HAVING SAID before kick-off that League points were more important than a cup run, Luton manager David Pleat was given the perfect response by his team on Saturday.

They splashed out with a surprising amount of style on a pitch so wet that it seemed the game might not be completed.

In cold driving rain, tackles and passes were a lottery, but Wrexham were always second best in skill

and control.

The Welshmen could not match the Town's astonishing enthusiasm for the task in hand, and two cracking goals wrapped up the points before half time to give Mr Pleat the pleasure of watching his first Town win

in Wales since he became boss four years ago.

It would be unfair to pick out individuals as the stars of a Town performance which was an all-round team effort, but Clive Goodyear deserves special mention.

He came in for his first match of the season because Mark Aizlewood was injured, and played superbly
By winning the ball consistently and making better use of it the Town ensured that Wrexham made the most mistakes. Players in all departments got into the right

positions to support colleagues and give the man with the ball two or three options. They almost went ahead in the 20th minute when

Kirk Stephens set up an attack down the right and David Moss hit a volley which crashed against the bar. Brian Stein did well to reach the rebound first, but put the ball wide.

The opening goal, in the 28th minute, was a gem in build-up and finish alike.

Moss, Steve White, Stephens and Joey Jones were

all involved as the Town built an attack from midfield. Jones blocked Moss as the winger tried to get in a shot, but the ball broke to Donaghy and from just outside the area he hit a crisp first-time drive into the top

corner of the net. A few seconds before half-time another break from midfield carved Wrexham open, and this time White was put in possession in front of goal and just outside the penalty box. The water splashed knee-high as he controlled the ball, drifted past an attempted tackle, and hammered his tenth goal of the season before any other

defender could get near him. Lil Fuccillo had another storming game in midfield, and his relentless driving power almost brought him a hat-trick, with one good shot saved and two more slightly

wide of the target.
