Cardiff did the Town a favour by beating Watford 2-0 at Ninian Park, and Sheffield Wednesday, who had a day off, held on to third place.

Newcastle are mounting a late challenge. Their 1-4 victory at Charlton took their recent run to one defeat in 11 games, and put them a point behind Wednesday with a match in hand. They used up that advantage at Wrexham on Tuesday night and missed their chance of going into the top three for the first time this season. Battling to escape relegation the Welshmen ran out 4-2 winners — the first time this year they had scored more than twice in a match, and Newcastle's first experience this season of conceding four.

The top ten teams can still count themselves in with a chance of going up, with Leicester the dark horses. They are eighth and have enough games in hand

FA Cup dates have put them behind with league fixtures, but their push for Wembley ended when Spurs beat them 2-0 in the semi-final.

QPR may have done their promotion chances no

good at all by beating West Brom in the other semi-final. But if they have got half their thoughts on Wembley there was little sign of it on Tuesday night when they beat struggling Orient at Loftus Road. Their 3-0 win pushed them up into seventh place, three points short of the top three.

Remaining fixtures for the challengers suggest that the Town have the best run-in to the end of the season, with six games at home and four away. Watford have four at home and five away and Newcastle and Sheffield Wednesday each have four home and four away.

If every challenging team could win every remaining

- and that's impossible because some of them, including the Town and Newcastle, play each other—the maximum points obtainable are 96 for the Town, 89 for Watford and 84 for Leicester. Sheffield Wednesday and QPR can, in theory, reach 89 points, a total beyond Newcastle, Rotherham, Blackburn and Barnsley.

So 81 points will ensure promotion — and if the Town win their home games and lose the away ones they will be on 84.

PERFECTLY POISED to use Easter as the next stepping-stone to promotion, Luton Town this week convinced another rival manager that they are the best team in the Second Division.

Bobby Saxton had seen his Blackburn side opt for power and physical effort because they didn't fancy a contest of sheer skill. And they went home beaten on two counts - the Town were just as determined as the visitors, and produced the flair when it mattered.

"Luton could have scored a couple more," admitted Saxton, who had fallen victim to the classic dilemma every manager faces on a visit to Kenilworth Road.

With lingering promotion ambitions of their own, Blackburn had to be more positive than the teams who

come with a determination not to be beaten. On paper, with the strongest defence in the division until the Town's two goals — they were well equipped

to compete for three points. They were well organised at the back, resolute in midfield, and quick on the break But the Town still

looked the better side throughout.

Noel Brotherston, often Blackburn's attacking danger man in past games, was blotted out by Kirk

Stephens, and ruefully said afterwards that he was among those who had voted for Stephens as right-back in the PFA's Second Division side. "I was right, wasn't I?" he

Brotherston had only one chance, early in the second half, when Jake Findlay had to make a spreading save to prevent an equaliser, but the rest of Blackburn's shooting was off target or wildly optimistic.

"Plenty of physical effort and not enough good passing of the ball," was Saxton's criticism of his side. 'You can't get by on sheer effort against teams like Luton.

He might have added hat the Town more than natched Blackburn for effort and persistence in every department, without reaching the peaks we have seen at times this season.

There was a hint of dervousness, lifted in the 27th minute when Glenn Geeley and Derek Fazackrley, possibly the best entre-back pairing in the Division, were bamboozled by Brian Stein and Steve

From then on Blackburn threatened little as the Town's midfield and defence came out to play.

Clive Goodyear powered a header narrowly wide from a corner and early in the second half Stein showed Blackburn how skill can always outweigh power and effort. He robbed Keeley on the

edge of the penalty area, twinkled down to the by-line and pulled the ball back to set up a perfect chance. White swung hur-riedly and failed to make contact, and Ricky Hill, behind him, hit a first-time

Some of the crowd were

howling for White's removal when that happened, but it turned out to be the start of the Town's match-

winning spell. Hill and White organised a two-man raid which ended with White beating his man and hammering a drive past Gennoe and on to the underside of the bar.

Ten minutes later, with 20 minutes to go, White hit the goal he deserved, and it was another cracker. He took a pass from Stephens, turned his man and shot low into the net for his 17th goal of the season, and the end of a run of nine games without scoring.

It was party-piece time after that, with Billy Jen-nings getting into the act as substitute when Ricky Hill, carrying an ankle injury, was taken off.

RULED OUT

Jennings proved that he still has plenty to offer after being released Orient, and netted in the final minute from a pass by David Moss.

It looked a good goal to just about everybody, including the linesman, but referee Alf Grey ruled that Moss was offside and interfering with play as the shot

was made. Earlier this year Mr Grey made a worse mistake the same end when he denied Swindon a goal in a cup-tie, so perhaps we ought not to complain too much.

Town manager David Pleat believes Mr Grey was right this time, and took quiet pleasure from the victory. "It was a powerful game, rather than deft and delicate," he said.
"But I always thought we were the more likely side to score, although Blackburn deserve credit for

having a go.

"I was pleased with all our side — they were up against a good team and they were deserving winners."
