



## PERSONALITY PROFILE




One fan's personal view of some of the stars who have played for Luton Town. By BRIAN SWAIN

Of all the sights and sounds of football, nothing for spectators is more satisfying than the basic objectives of the game — a ball hitting the back of the net, preferably with considerable power and accuracy.

Goalkeepers can fill a career with consistent reliability and outstanding ability, yet the man we all want to see succeed more than any other is our team's number nine.

I missed seeing Joe Payne in action, and the first Luton Town centre-forward I idolised was Hughie Billington. Later I marvelled at the touch and skill of Jesse Pye, and I also had the good fortune to see Ron Davies at his best when he was a Town player.

#### MALCOLM MACDONALD



All have their right to a place in this column, but I suspect that for years to come I shall remember most the all too brief Luton Town career of Malcolm Macdonald.

I don't think any other Luton player has given so much pleasure to supporters through sheer basic power, speed and explosive finishing. I count myself lucky to have been around to see it.

It hardly seems possible that he had only two seasons at Kenilworth Road. He was a 19 year old left back when Harry Haslam brought him to Luton in the summer of 1969 for a fee of £17,500 from Fulham.

But he had also operated as a centre-forward on occasion, and in ten games for the Londoners had scored five goals. That average of a goal every other game was to be kept up for the rest of his career, and football was the loser when a knee injury forced him to retire at the age of 29.

I don't suppose any readers of this column need telling about Macdonald's supreme abilities. At Luton he scored so many memorable goals that you could argue for ever as to which was the best.

My outstanding memory was of a hat-trick at Sheffield Wednesday, with one goal from the left foot, one from the right and the other with a header.

Among many other incidents when Macdonald rendered Luton Town considerable service was a cup-tie against Nottingham Forest. The Town were losing and in danger of getting a roasting when Macdonald powered in on goal in the 15th minute and smashed the goalpost.

There was a long stoppage while it was repaired, and the delay halted Forest's smoothness and gave the Town time to catch their breath. They earned a draw, although Forest had the last word by winning a cracking replay at Kenilworth Road 4-3.

Some years later I felt like weeping for Supermac in another FA Cup contest, when he went to Wembley with Newcastle United and walked off a loser.

Luton sold him to Newcastle for £185,000 in May 1971 for the usual Luton reasons . . . they needed the money. Mac became a folk hero on Tyneside but moved on five years later to Arsenal for £333,333.

His career record tells the story of a remarkable talent for scoring goals. At Luton, in the Third and Second Divisions, he made 88 League appearances and scored 49 goals.

At Newcastle 187 League games in the First Division yielded 95 goals, and his three-year spell at Arsenal, with injuries becoming an increasing problem, produced 42 goals in 84 League games.

Just for good measure, he hit all five when England hammered Cyprus at Wembley, and his failure to become a regular international is still one of life's mysteries to me.'

But more than anything else I remember Malcolm Macdonald as a thoroughly nice bloke. He coped with fame easily and sensibly, and it's always a pleasure to see him back here on his old stamping ground when he visits Luton in his capacity as manager of Fulham.

He's done pretty well for a fullback they gave away for chickenfeed 13 years ago!

Today's game takes on extra significance in view of Blackburn's convincing recent results and our own difficulties in reproducing a good winning performance.

After today's game, we have a further six home games and four away fixtures. We feel we have the games to gain the results which will ensure a coveted First Division place, but this season has proved that nothing is easy.

The players and staff have been magnificent and everyone must continue to give every ounce of effort as we seek vital victories. When I look at the League table and compare the attendance figures, transfer fees paid and salaries of staff at other Second Division clubs, it makes me proud to see Luton Town FC riding high and attempting to play entertaining football at all times.

The days preceding the transfer deadline were posssibly the most hectic I have experienced. A deal involving Godfrey Ingram to the NASL club, was sidelined with a stomach injury, and Lil Fuccillo was not yet fit enough for consideration. Also, Mick Saxby had heard he would be unlikely valuable assistance to our promotion push. to kick a ball this season. Action was needed to the remaining weeks.

I was more than delighted when Bob Paisley from Liverpool. His performance at Derby, allied cheers. I understood his view. to a fine technique and attitude, auguers well for the future. We wish Richard every success and we hope the association will be cemented with a permanent transfer.

Football League during the past nine seasons, also joined us. I am convinced our service from



defence and midfield will be to Billy's liking and he will continue to score valuable goals. The addition of Billy to our staff does not mean that we have lost faith in any way with the youngsters Frank Bunn and Michael Small. At the moment, experience is called for.

## ODD HAPPENINGS

Goalkeepers are rarely caught more than a few yards from their goal-lines in the normal course of a match. No manager is very happy if the ball sails into an unattended goal and, if a goalkeeper does happen to be off his line, he tries to make sure that he clears the ball far enough for it to be impossible for him to be caught out of position by a surprise shot.

Yet, just occasionally — over the years, a speculative shot from a player's own half has caught out the goalkeeper who thought that he had the ball comfortably covered. One such occasion was a fourth round FA Cup-tie at Norwich in February 1966. Third Division Walsall were then leading the Canaries from Division Two 2-1 and with the minutes ticking away the Midlanders looked quite capable of pulling off a shock result.

Allan Clarke, now manager of Leeds, had been off the field for treatment but was back in the fray alongside George Kirby, another future manager, in the Walsall front line, which in general was looking at least as effective as that of Norwich, who fielded Welsh international Ron Davies.

It was after Walsall goalkeeper Terry Carling had beaten Ron to the ball in the air that this particular odd happening occurred. Terry punched the ball

cleanly as both players went up for it and although he had cleared it almost to the edge of the penalty area, he ran from goal to attempt to complete the clearance. It was probably the excitement of being so close to a place in the fifth round of the FA Cup for the first time in his career that caused him to try such a daring venture.

It seemed that fortune had favoured the brave when he made contact with the ball near the edge of the penalty area and sent it sailing almost to the halfway line. Unfortunately for him it landed right at the feet of Joe Mallett, the Norwich fullback, and he tried something even more ambitious than Carling's second punch.

He swung his foot to meet the ball on the volley, probably intending to set up another Norwich attack, but he needn't have worried. The ball arched perfectly as Carling scrambled back towards goal and fell just under the bar to put the Canaries level.

Almost immediately they got the winner but players and fans alike agreed afterwards that but for Mallett's freak effort this third goal would almost certainly not have come about. But it is odd incidents such as this which so often settle close-fought FA Cup-ties.





## FLASHBACK

#### A look at Luton Town a decade ago. By BRIAN SWAIN Sports Editor, Luton News

The speed with which football can build a man into a hero, then knock him flat again, provided one of the highlights of the season at Kenilworth Road 10 years ago this weekend.

It was Easter, and as any Town supporter could tell you, a time when the Hatters traditionally threw away any promotion chances they might have. It was also a time when barmy results followed each other with astonishing rapidity all over the country.

The weekend started off well for the Town. They had no hope of promotion, and not much fear of relegation, but felt they needed three or four points from the three Easter games to be completely safe.

On Good Friday, 30th March 1972, they went to Ayresome Park, where Stan Anderson was building a side good enough to give Jack Charlton a marvellous managerial start a year or two later.

Nobby Stiles had just been signed from Manchester United, but the Town did well to bore a crowd of 11,720 in a 0-0 draw.

The following day Sheffield Wednesday were the visitors for a match which will be long remembered by the 9,121 who saw it.

On a wet and slippery pitch, John Ryan's defensive mistake let in Brian Joicey to give Wednesday the lead in the 11th minute. The home fans got more and more disgruntled as the minutes ticked by.

Wednesday, managed by Derek Dooley, were desperate for success. Relegated from the First Division two years previously, they smarted in the knowledge that they had become the poor relations of Sheffield.

Wednesday's gates had slumped to an average of around 12,000 while at Bramall Lane Sheffield United were going well in the First Division in front of 40,000 and more.

But at Kenilworth Road that day Luton Town looked the poor relations. The team fumbled its way through an hour-long display of ineptness after Joicey's goal, and the jeers and slow handclaps competed only with the sound of shuffling feet as fed-up customers headed for the exits.

Then came the amazing transformation. Vic Halom, jeered as much as anyone, and with no hope of replacing

Malcolm Macdonald in Luton affections, followed up as Peter Anderson shot for goal, and put the Town level from a half-clearance.

The voices that had castigated Halom for so long suddenly decided that the man they had called a donkey was a thoroughbred after all. In the 85th minute the ground erupted as Halom scored his second, with a header from a corner by David Court, and two minutes later the big centre-forward was everybody's favourite player as he completed a remarkable 11-minute hat-trick with a crisp shot from a pass by Viv Busby.

Probably some of us read too much significance into the fact that it was the first Luton Town hat-trick for a year, since Malcolm Macdonald's in his last appearance for the club, against Cardiff.

At long last, we thought in our innocence, Luton Town were on the goal standard again. And for the third Easter match, at home to lowly Hull City three days later, the attendance rose by a few hundred to see a visiting side which included Terry Neill as player-manager and Stuart Pearson at centreforward.

Saturday's heroes were cheered onto the pitch . . . Vic Halom was lauded every time he went for the ball . . . and the game was an utter shambles. It was kick and rush, with each side making elementary mistakes.

Ken Knighton, now the Orient manager, scored the only goal in the 57th minute. And once more the ground rang to the sounds of jeering and barracking, even for hat-trick hero Vic Halom.





#### LUTON TOWN PLAYERS DRINK

I recently attended a meeting at Lancaster Gate, with David Coates and John Moore, called by the England Youth team manager John Cartwright to discuss various items on Youth football and, in particular the South East Counties League.

Subjects such as coaching in schools and the qualifications of those people who do the coaching: young players not having enough skills: are voungsters becoming stereo type players: are the young players getting too much football, and many other items were discussed

The majority will be brought up at the South East Counties annual general meeting in June. This looks like being a lively meeting and one I am looking forward to.

Another meeting, this time called by the Football Combination in early April, is to find out whether, next season, all matches will be played in mid-week rather than on a Saturday

I have spoken to many secretaries and managers on this subject and the feeling I receive is that most clubs want to play mid-week. This could cause a problem as far as referees and linesmen are concerned because if as some clubs do want to play in the afternoons, many of the match officials will not be able to have time off from work.

To play these matches in the afternoons will save clubs much money. Money will not have to be found for floodlighting, gatemen, tea bar personnel, VAT, etc. Supporters, I imagine, will be let in free for these matches, so the only expense will be for the referee and linesmen and, if they can be found locally, it will cost even less.

To illustrate the club finances for a Reserve match, let us take our match against Plymouth Argyle. Only 193 people watched the game - of which 150 were season ticket holders, leaving 43

paying customers at 50p each. Total gate receipts were £21.50 and the referee and linesmens' fees and expenses totalled £95.

VAT and gatemen totalled another £14.80 so, in fact, we had a loss on the day of £88.30. That doesn't sound much but, taking this match as an average and multiply it by the number of home matches (21), it then makes a loss of £1.854.30 over a season. No club can afford that

To add to that cost is floodlighting for evening matches so the total goes well over the £2,000 mark for the season. I

believe that is a good argument for playing midweek next season

### BLACKBURN THROUGH THE YEARS

 Blackburn Rovers played a record total of successive FA Cup-ties without defeat between December 1883 and December 1885.

During this time they played a total of 24 games and won the trophy three times. In both 1884 and 1885 they beat Scottish club Queens Park in the final.

- In the early 1900s a player named **J. Blackburn** played a number of games for Blackburn Rovers.
- John Roscamp scored in the first minute of the 1928 FA Cup Final against Huddersfield Town to set Blackburn on the way to a 3-1 win.
- In 1929-30 winger Arthur Cunliffe scored in each of his

first five games for Blackburn Rovers.

- In the latter part of 1935-36 Blackburn Rovers fielded no fewer than five different goalkeepers as they slipped towards relegation to Division Two for the first time.
- Bristol Rovers were leading 3-2 at half-time on their first visit to Ewood Park on 5th February 1955, but finally went down 8-3 with Tommy Briggs netting all six goals in the second half to extend his match tally to seven.
- Blackburn Rovers played one of the last two Christmas Day League games when meeting Blackpool in 1959, the other game on the same day being between Accrington and Chesterfield.
- Fred Pickering became their only player in the last 20 years to score a hat-trick on his international debut when he did so for England against the USA in May 1964.
- Blackburn lost 30 of their 42 First Division games when suffering relegation in 1965-66. Yet in the course of eight wins they beat Northampton 6-1 and Nottingham Forest 5-0 at home and Burnley 4-1 and Nottingham Forest 3-0 away.

Soccer in safety and comfort. That was the ambitious plan of Coventry City when they decided to convert their Highfield Road ground into England's first all-seater stadium at the start of this season.

'We believe it is the only positive way to beat hooliganism and attract families back to football' said chairman Jimmy Hill as the club launched their revolutionary plans.

So all the terracing disappeared to be replaced by individual tip-up seats with the ground capacity cut from 37,000 to 20,500. And, as an added deterrent to the hooligan fringe and visiting fans, a minimum price of £5 was imposed on rival supporters. This minimum price also applied for any tickets actually bought on the day of the match and for the more attractive games it increased to £6.

What Coventry hoped for was to fill the ground with their own supporters and, in an attempt to achieve this, they offered attractive and cheap methods of buying season tickets and also enlisted the help of travel agents in the area to sell matchday tickets at normal prices until Friday night.

Substantial publicity and advertising produced a season ticket sale of 8,000.

And it also became clear that many fans habits needed to be changed if match tickets were to be bought in advance as they do in America.

Many spectators complained about the departure of the terraces where they had stood for years and felt the club should have taken a referendum among supporters before making the decision.

So a genuine attempt to make life pleasanter for the paying customer was given a mixed reception — and it has continued in that way

throughout the season so far.

The club, of course, are still learning as they go along and a variety of problems have cropped up which they are striving to resolve.

For the majority of matches the ground has been trouble-free with very few visiting fans prepared to pay the price charged by Coventry even though it does provide them with a prime position in the ground — and under cover.

Many of the seats however are not under cover. These are the

cheaper ones at £2 which were built on the old terrace areas. It is perhaps significant that these are the least popular even though they are the cheapest. It seems clear that the average fan wants to be under cover if he is to sit down. If not he would prefer to stand.

Difficulties such as stewarding where, unlike the cinema or theatre, stewards in a football ground cannot show the customer to their particular seat.

There are too many people and not enough stewards. So if fans arriving only 10 minutes or so before kick-off struggle to find the seat they have bought for that match it can lead to congestion and confusion

There have only been two games this season where hooliganism has raised its ugly head. In the League match against Leeds and the FA Cup-tie against Oxford, visiting fans refused to sit down, causing trouble and damage.

However, it is easier for the police to spot the trouble makers but no easier to get to them, because they have to clamber over seats and past other fans who are not necessarily part of the disturbance.

So there is yet no real evidence that the all-seater stadium has improved attendances for Coventry. They are averaging around 13,000. But when the ground is full, the financial rewards are good and record receipts for a League game were established for the match against Manchester United and record Cup receipts of more than £60,000 collected from the Oxford tie. Generally receipts are up.

But filling the ground regularly is a problem all clubs face including Coventry. Providing seats is clearly only a small part of the answer.

## PROGRAMME CORNER

'Square' was a term very much in the teenage idiom of the late 50s and early 60s, meaning 'rather stiff and out of touch with contemporary trends'.

It may be rather harsh to suggest that our match programme of that era answered to that particular definition, but it was as near to the literal sense of the word as any progamme has ever been.

It measured, in fact, just over six inches long and just over five inches wide. There were, of course, no



colour photographs in those days and very little in black and white. In one issue before us, the only actual photographs, in fact are contained in advertisements, one of them extolling the products of a sports outfitters run by two of our former players, Wally Shanks and the late Gordon Turner.

The cost of four old pence (or one twenty-fifth of today's luxurious issue, may suggest, however, that it did present value for money. Of its 12 pages the equivalent of four were given over to advertisements and most of the information provided was contained in one 'umbrella' article labelled 'Club Notes'


This spoke of recent results both first team and reserves, introduced



the visitors with a potted history and then extolled the merits both of the youth team which had enjoyed a good win on the previous Saturday and of a Luton Schoolboys team which would be playing at Kenilworth Road on the following Saturday.

Sandwiched between this encouragement of young footballers was a welcome to young musicians, namely the Luton Youth Band that was giving its first public performance before the game that afternoon.

Precious space seems to have been used rather extravagantly in



devoting a whole page to the Second Division results up to that stage on a chart and in using almost the whole of a page in tabulating players' appearances and goalscorers for the season to date.

The 1962-63 season saw us plunging to relegation from Division Two and though scorers were rather sparse (only Gordon Turner had got as many as five goals by November) some 32 players had been used in either first team or reserves up to then.



The fact that local radio had not taken hold by then and that transistors were still in their infancy is reflected by the space given to a half-time code. Our board of those days extended from A to N and so three separate lists are given to cover the first three Divisions and the first few games in Division Four plus our reserve game.

Teams were of course listed in 1,2,3,5 formations and on the particular programme currently before us our line-up read:

Baynham, McNally, Bramwell, Morton, Pacey, Groves, Walden, McKechnie, Davies, McGuffie, Jardine.

The game incidentally was against Walsall and we recorded our highest score of the season in a 4-3 victory.



#### **BLACKBURN**

THE CLUB .

We could not have wished for tougher opponents this afternoon who arrive at Kenilworth Road to figure in a game which should be Match of the Day as far as the Second Division is concerned.

New Blackburn manager Bobby Saxton has been in the job only since last May. But it hasn't taken him long to make his mark after guiding his team to the fringe of the promotion race.

When Saxton took the job, he said: 'After two seasons in which Blackburn have won promotion and narrowly missed getting into the First Division, I have something to beat.

'But the task doesn't frighten me. Blackburn have a thirst for the First Division — and I want to get there too.'

Blackburn's grit was displayed in the earlier meeting between us in November at Ewood Park when it took a penalty from David Moss to give us the three points.

It would be foolish to think this afternoon's clash will be any easier against a team difficult to score goals against.

Saxton has plenty of experience in his team. But there won't be a chance for Luton fans to see Viv Busby — one of our former players — in action because he was given a free transfer earlier in the season after missing several games with a troublesome knee injury.

#### . . AND THE PLAYERS

John Butcher has had to be content mainly with a standby role; first to Paul Bradshaw then, later, to Jim Arnold. But he did enjoy a regular senior place for most of the 1978-79 season after Rovers had sold Bradshaw to Wolves and had, in fact, clocked up almost 100 League appearances by the end of last term.

Mike Rathbone was signed from Birmingham for £40,000 during the 1978-79 season following an earlier spell on loan and he soon established himself as one of the club's most popular players. The fans enjoy his cavalier, all-action approach to the game and it was this determination and enthusiasm that helped Rathbone fight his way back to a regular senior spot after losing his place for a time to experienced Roger De Vries last season.

Glenn Keeley was previously with Ipswich and Newcastle, Glenn has been one of the most dominant figures in record-breaking Rovers defence which established a club record for fewest goals conceded two seasons ago, then promptly shattered it again last term. One of only two ever-presents last season Keeley has probably played the best football of his career in the past couple of years and must now be worth several times the £30,000 fee he cost Rovers in August 1976.

Jim Branagan was signed from Huddersfield for £20,000 early in the Third Division promotion season of 1979-80, and quickly made himself an automatic choice in defence, despite having to alternate between the two full-back positions to help the team cause. The son of former Manchester City star Ken Branagan, Jim was formerly with Oldham Athletic.

Micky Speight proved an invaluable member of the first team squad last season, after joining Rovers from Sheffield United for £40,000. His ability to play in a number of positions came to Rovers' rescue on several occasions and there was no doubting his popularity with the fans who voted him their Player of the Year. A tough-tackling midfield man, who can also fill any of the back

four positions, Micky scored some spectacular goals last term and an explosive shot is one of his greatest assets — especially at free-kicks.


Marshall Burke Picked up on a free transfer from Leeds United, Burke proved an instant hit by his uncanny ability to score goals from midfield. He made his first full League appearance for Rovers against Bolton at Christmas and typically, scored a vital goal. He finished the season with half a dozen League goals and his timely running from midfield into the danger area nearly brought him several more.

Tony Parkes received a broken leg against Wrexham in February 1981 which put him out of the final stages of the promotion reckoning and that was a cruel blow to the long-serving midfield man, as well as the team. He joined Rovers from non-League Buxton more than a decade ago and has made well over 300 League appearances for the club. Recognised as an outstanding professional, he has given Rovers great service and is enjoying a richly deserved Testimonial year in the current season. David Hamilton is a young midfield

player who made several appearances as substitute last season without starting a League match for the club. Rated as a good prospect, he was signed on a free transfer from First Division club Sunderland in January 1981 and will be looking to make an impact on the senior squad this term.

Derek Fazackerley is Rovers longestserving player. He cost the club nothing when he joined them as a junior and he finished last season with almost 400 League appearances to his credit. An ever-present — the only one — when Rovers won promotion in 1979-80 he was also a member of the squad that won the Division Three title in 1974-75. A model of consistency, he enjoyed a well-deserved Testimonial season last term.

Noel Brotherston was hit by a knee injury against promotion rivals Sheffield Wednesday on the run-in last season and it cost Rovers the services of this talented winger at a crucial stage of the programme. It also cost Belfast-born Brotherston the chance to add to his total of international caps for Northern Ireland. He was signed on a free transfer from Tottenham four years ago and finished his first campaign as leading scorer. Shot to international fame in the 1980 Home Championships when he scored the goal that gave his country the title.



Simon Garner finished as Rovers' second leading scorer last season when they missed promotion to the First Division on goal difference. Boston-born, Simon has averaged nearly a goal every three games for his only professional club. His most successful period with the senior side came when he linked up with Andy Crawford in a partnership that helped Rovers clinch promotion in 1979-80. An aggressive, direct player he has filled most forward positions for Rovers.

Andy Crawford joined Rovers from Derby County for £50,000 in October 1979 and scored 23 League and Cup goals for the club during the remainder of that season. Injuries and other problems meant he played only a dozen League matches last term but is eager to prove he can score goals at a higher

level. An instinctive 'finisher' he has a burning ambition to get back to the First Division. Andy was previous manager Howard Kendall's most expensive signing during his time at Ewood.

Kevin Stonehouse was plucked from non-League football in July 1979, Kevin finished as top scorer last season with 10 goals, despite playing only 22 full games. The previous season, he scored two goals in only his third League match, at Gillingham. Previously with Shildon in the Northern League, Kevin has been described as looking very much like Liverpool's David Fairclough and he also has a habit of scoring important goals.

lan Miller was Saxton's first signing for Rovers after taking over as manager. A fast, direct winger in the old-fashioned style, Miller came to Ewood at the start of this season after three years with Swindon Town in Division Three. Previously with Doncaster, Nottingham Forest and Bury, Miller left Swindon because he wanted a higher grade of football and stepped up into the Second Division for the first time at Ewood.

Terry Gennoe (keeper) was snapped up by Rovers from First Division club Southampton for some £60,000 after Jim Arnold had been sold to Everton. A very experienced keeper, Gennoe had spent a period on loan to Rovers in 1974 when Gordon Lee was the manager. He played just over 50 first team games for the Saints in League and Cup competitions and has also played in the Football League for Bury and Halifax, as well as Crystal Palace, where he spent a spell on loan during the 1980-81 campaign.


