


No 1 . . . a solo effort as Brian Stein reduces the arrears

UNITED SENT PACKING WITH By Eric Harris PENATOSE

FIVE goals, three penalties and a pitch invasion by jubilant Luton fans at the end of the game added fire to a memorable 3-2 victory over Newcastle at Kenilworth Road on Saturday.

A hat-trick from Brian Stein almost sealed the Town's promotion hopes as manager David Pleat talked about the distinct possibility of now going for the Second Division Championship.

But when John Trewick ncreased United's lead in he 58th minute, none of he Luton supporters would have given a bean or the Town's chances of aking at least a point.

They hadn't reckoned

with the battling Hatters fighting qualitites on an afternoon where passion from both sides provided the crowd with full value for their money.

We will never know what Newcastle manager Arthur Cox thought of a result which virtually killed his promotion dreams because he refused to grant Pressmen an audience as he stormed out of the ground.

But Pleat had satisfaction of watching his team fight back from two goals down, although there was an air of doubt surrounding Luton's

second penalty which provided the winning goal.

"It was a good game and full of passion," said Pleat. "There was a lot of fire coming from their bench and three penalities sugested the game was full of hacking and pushing.

and, when we equalised, I was always optimistic we could win. Newcastle had good pace up front and may feel disappointed at the result.

"But we felt cheated

when they knocked in an injury time winner in our earlier meeting this season after we had fought back from two down.

"We didn't flow today and haven't done for weeks but the results have still gone our way and I was thrilled with the way my players performed today.

"But it wasn't like that "They showed bite and enterprise after second goal and were finally rewarded for hard work. For 30 minutes we really played."

> Pleat drafted Raddy Antic in to the team as an auxilliary striker with Wayne Turner taking Hill's position in midfield.

"Considering we were under strength, I think the victory was well earned," Pleat added. "We didn't have time to think how we would progress without a natural flank player.

"If we can win our next two matches, we can start to think about going for the Championship."

Stein's hat-trick — his first of the season — sank any hopes Newcastle had of winning. And although
